





Pirco's Newest charter member achieved this status within a few weeks. He is Robert Cochran of Chicago. For your benefit he has submitted a number of his regression forms and analysis.

The tracks that he plays are Arlington, Hawthorne and Balmoral.

Balmoral, more than the other two, is considered relatively difficult by the uninitiated because it is cheaper and is only a 5/8th mile track. What can we immediately perceive from Cochran's first 17 race regression model of this track?

First: Only three winners were lower than 4th ranked in A.P.V. Hence the TOP FOUR WON 82.4% of the races. The AVERAGE RANK of WINNERS Was 2.8. The AVERAGE RANK Of Placers was 2.64.

With two exceptions the WINNERS came from the TOP THREE Ultrascan + Variant Rating. That's 88.3%! The average RANK of winners was 1.94 in the US+V category. That information alone was enough to make Cochran a consistent winner at this track. To this store of information Bob added the facts that winners should be in TOP 3 Early Pace but NO WORSE than 4th ranked in Sustained Pace. He played the contenders that fit the model and WON.

Balmoral Race Track
(formerly Lincoln Fields)

Balmoral Race Track: Nursing home of the Midwest racing scene. The economic Saviour of many small racing stables who for one reason or another are unable to obtain stall space and other accommodations granted to the larger, higher class stables. The working place for the many jockeys with average ability, who will be denied mounts in deference to the better riders.

Home of many older animals plagued with infirmities such as arthritic joints, tender feet, and bad legs. Home to the many horses who since birth, have been doomed to slowness for one inherent reason or another. Exile for numbers of animals unable to compete at claiming levels higher than 3,4, and 5 thousand dollars.

One would probably assume after reading the above epitaph, that this tiny countryside 5/8 th mile Race Track has no offerings for the sophisticated, and knowledgeable handicappers across the country. The assumption would be totally incorrect! Thars GOLD in them thar Hills!

If the Spirits of past Horseplayers could present themselves, they would tell you of blissful memories of what was formerly known as Lincoln Fields. The track was over a mile in circumference, and housed some of the classiest horses, and some of the countries top jockeys.

The track was shut down, sold, and re-opened. When it re-opened part of the land it occupied was sold, and the size was reduced to 5/8 ths of a mile. No handicappers, it is only after re-incarnation that produced what is called Balmoral, with its deep cushion, and razor sharp turns. The deep cushion causes the track to remain sustained for long periods after heavy rains, and the sharp turns account for the many spills that occur week to week. In spite of the negative factors pointed out, and the quality of the contestants, this tiny gold mine called Balmoral, has more formful racing than larger, higher classed tracks.

The track surface favors early speed as do most bull rings, but early speed prevails up to a mile distance at Balmoral, and this is going around 2 turns. Generally speaking, the bias ^{is} average early speed with good sustained energy. The track surface variant seems to remain fairly constant from week-days to week-ends. At least 80 % of the races carded are 6 furlong sprints. This in it self should should provide an unusually reliable model (track profile). Below are some useful stats:

Class delineation: LOW = \$3000-\$6000 AVERAGE = \$6250-\$10000
HIGH= \$10500-up.

I use ULTRA SCAN + VARIANT W=0 O=0
eliminate all but 5 contenders - from these 5, I start with the #1 ultra+variant that fits the energy pars and go down the line until i have 2 contenders that fit the energy pars. I don't even have to wear a Mask.

How well do I know Thee ? Let me name the many ways !

I know for a fact Arlington. That you are basically an early speed race track. 1.2 on a regular basis, but after a good watering during a dry spell, or after a light down pour, you have been known to become as early as 1.3 .

You are faster than normal on week-ends and holidays. You become sustained after heavy rains, but usually only a day and a half, after the rains stop. It takes several days of heavy rain to keep you sustained.

Arlington, when your surface is initially sloppy, early speed is king, and the largest % of wins are front-running , wire to wire wins.

I know that your surface dries extremely fast in hot weather, and your rail positions provide few winning horses during this drying out period.

I am aware of your 8 furlong races run from a chute and only go around 1 turn. Consequently, many 8 furlong races are won by early speed, as are the sprint races. Sometimes the early bias is higher than 1.2 on the dirt surface.

I am aware of your classier horses dropping into soft spots. They sometimes defy the track energy profile, and the early-late energy %. They go wire to wire when the track is supposed to be sustained, and they come from off the pace when the track is supposed to be early. I know this Arlington, and I understand it.

Oh yes Arlington, I'm on to you.

I know all about your energy requirements, at most distances, and at each class level. Here are my figures on your dirt surface at the most popular distances.

I even knew your turf races run at 1 mile and over, run predominately sustained. Try that on Arlington !

Arlington, I know for a fact, there are certain times you try to conceal your true bias after inclement weather, or when the track surface is plowed deeper than normal, for reasons that are privy only to the track maintenance supervisor. That won't hold me back Arlington, because the Methodology has warned me of this condition, so I will play the top early contender, and the top sustained contender, providing they meet the energy %'s and the total energy requirements. You can't hide your true condition for more than 2 or 3 races Arlington! I will not be denied.

WHY do I know Thee so well Arlington ? Because I am a student of the Sartin Methodology, and I possess the Ultra Scan Handicapping Program. I have watched you Arlington since the day you opened. I have recorded and documented proof on the quality of your horses, the condition of your track surface when it is manipulated by Mother Nature, or the Track Supt, and I maintain a daily Track Profile with the Brohammer Model as prescribed in the Ultra Scan Manual.

I know the energy requirements for all levels of competition, and how that energy should be used on an early/late percentage basis.

Arlington , you belong to me. When this information reaches Dr. Sartin at the Institute, you will belong to any PIRCO member that desires you!

Lastly Arlington, all of the tempting new gimmicks, the contests, the Maiden races and other non-playable races will not distract me from the money management guidelines provided in most of the Manuals. Sure, I'll probably play some gimmicks, but only with 6% of my bankroll. The biggest portion 10 % will be placed on my 2 horse bet. Forget about your exotic wagers eating up my bankroll. No Way !

Greetings , Dr. and Mrs. Sartin. I hope I didn't inconvenience you both with my untimely phone call. My original intention was to inform you by mail. I needed to share this with others who could appreciate the Euphoric Cloud which had totally consumed Wanda and I. My first thoughts were those similiar to an athlete that bowled a 300 game, or pitched a perfect baseball game, or a golfer who just accomplished a hole in one.

After listening to the Seminar tapes for the umpteenth time, I decided to perform the 20 race cycle to record my win-loss proficiency. As it happened to be a Saturday, there was a good racing card, including the \$100,000 added Futurity Stakes.

Using the money management program with Ultra Scan, I started off with a \$300.00 bankroll and decided to use the .16 of bankroll level. This of course, would include my gimmick wagers.

After the first race, I decided to ignore the gimmicks, and concentrate on win bets only. This was my first experience with the money management program, and it taught me quite a bit about the possibilities that were available to me with little risk.

I won 4 races in a row. The computer suggested a wager on the next race which was sizeable in ratio to my bank. The selection was the only bet in the race for me and was less than even money and dropping. No bet on horses less than 3-1 is a rule I imposed upon myself some time ago, and has worked well for me in the past.

Well now, do I listen to the Computer ? It hasn't failed me so far. Should I stick to my own rule ignoring the Computer ?.

The decision was No Bet ! The horse won. So what I said, I've selected horses before and passed the race because of low odds. Right? After this internal struggle with myself, I proceeded to prepare my wager for the next race. I followed the instructions given by the Computer to the letter as shown by the enclosed records.

I hate to admit this, but I felt as though the Machine (Computer) was taking over and at the rate I was winning, would eventually recommend a very large on a chalk and if the chalk lost the day would become a disaster. Call it paranoia if you will, but I had doubled my bank without the aid of Gimmicks, and I'll be dammed if the Computer was going to make me give it back. I was beginning to choke further and this is not like me. I usually stay very calm at the track, WIN or LOSE ! I think its' time to leave and give this some thought.

It wasn't the money Dr. Sartin, as I have won large sums at the track with no sweat, but I was always the one in control. Now the Computer wants me to do something which causes me much dis-comfort. I can't do it I won't do it !

After examining the results of a perfect score in the safety of my home, I've come to the following conclusions.

I started with too high a betting level. When I first began to wager at the track I was a \$2.00 bettor. As time went on and I learned more about racing and systems , the advance to a higher level came natural and easy. \$5.00, up to \$10.00, up to \$50.00 and I didn't feel a thing. Apparently, the same type of acclimation is needed with the money management program. Naturally, I speak for my own emotional temperament.

This is what I have decided to do:

Start with a fresh \$300.00 Bank and a 60/40 dutch of 2 horses at the .10 % level. Each time the Bank is doubled, I will start from the original \$300.00 and put the surplus in reserve.

If I decide to wager on a gimmick , the same .10 % of Bank will be divided proportionately. After a while, I'm sure the relaxed attitude that I'm used to will return. Those anxiety attacks sure undermine a persons character.

If the Computer at some later date recommends a large wager on chalk, I might just place the full amount in the show or place pool.

Above all, KNOW THYSELF and KNOW THY TRACK . Full steam ahead, no looking back.

The most interesting thing about Robert Cochran's success story is that prior to our May Seminar in Chicago he had not quite achieved the 63% minimum standard win level, nor the psycho-emotional level of confidence that permitted him full access to the Methodology. It was still using him rather than He Using IT.

One of the most important factors contributing to his ability to grasp the Method so quickly lies in his ability and WILLINGNESS to abandon his previous attitudinal sets and discard all prejudice frames of reference set up by such sets. He accepted totally MY frame of reference and read the manuals with complete openness. From the examples of Bob Lee, Sandra Smith and Mike King, he was able to grasp the fact intellectually that it WOULD work. He then deduced that it could work as well for him if he adapted THEIR procedural dynamic and emulated THEIR attitude.

From an attitude of total belief and acceptance he then proceeded to make it work for HIM.

In short, he never fought it.

He made it his own in a perfect symbiotic state with its author. His mind became as my mind for so long as he needed this condition in order to succeed.

Had he tried to impose his mind or his personal ideosyncracies over mine and thus REDEFINE my words, he would have failed.

When thorough understanding took place he then disengaged his handicapping mind from mine and became an independent entity, thankful for the initial nurturing but capable of creating new and viable aspects to make the Methodology even more productive. These will take the form of articles in our FOLLOW-UP Newsletter. The metamorphosis of Robert Cochran, handicapper represents an ideal pattern for others to follow.

Because he achieved success in such an ideal manner and so quickly we are dedicating a lot of space in this Workbook to his evolution.

NOTE: DO NOT CONFUSE RISKY RACES WITH WHAT DICK MITCHELL
REFERS TO AS CONTENTIOUS RACES. I will discuss that at the end of this
short piece. HGS

Greetings, Howard and Mary:

Enclosed, find a short piece on the subject of Risky Races.
The shortest road to a dwindling bankroll is traveled by the
Horseplayer who persists in playing blindly, every race on
the card. There are times when you may safely play more than
the 3 or 4 good plays available on the average week-day. This
occasion will probably manifest itself on a Holiday, or week-
end when the Racing Secretary provides the best racers at his
or her Track.

When a horseplayer bets too many races during the week-days, they
undoubtedly wind up selecting plays in what I term Risky Races.
Bluntly put, a Risky Race is one in which 1 or 2 horses have a
definite edge in either class or speed or condition and are going
to post at less than desirable (profitable) odds, OR a Race where
there are no contenders with an edge in the categories foremen-
tioned and not enough available info in the past performances to
warrant a serious wager. In other words, the race involves too
many unanswered questions and what-ifs?

I would venture to say, that when a race takes more than the nor-
mal time to handicap, you are probably attempting to handicap a
Risky Race. Normal time, being the time it takes the individual

Handicapper according to their speed and proficiency level.

Statistics, recent and otherwise, have proven beyond a reasonable doubt, that playing every race on the card consistently, will lead to the poorhouse, or someother place where losers congregate. Of course, there are exceptions to every rule. The best example of an exception to the rule that comes to mind is the Sartin fps Methodology using the Ultra Scan Program.

While Ultra Scan may responsible for an unusually high number of winning selections, even it will succumb to a risky race. No system or Methodology should be expected to produce favorable results in risky races. Risky races should be passed. Take yourself a short break, or grab a sandwich and wait for a race where you have an advantage and can make some money .

To my knowledge, the Ultra Scan program in conjunction with the fps Sartin Methodology, is not the only way to play, or handicap the races, it is only the best way ! Nothing else will work at all Tracks during all Seasons under all conditions, but Ultra Scan will and does. Below are some of the races I consider to be Risky Races.

1. Turf races where 1/2 or more of the contestants have not raced on turf.
2. Maiden races, and races for Winners with 3 or more first time starters.
3. Races for nw of 2 lifetime with 3 or more non-winners and or maidens.
4. Races where 3 or more horses with high APV are coming back after lengthy lay-offs.
5. Races for winners where 4 or more contenders have never raced at today's distance as shown by the past performances.

6. Races where 3 or more horses are listed less than 3-1 odds at post time.

*7. Races where less than 1/2 the field have ratable, recent pace lines.

It is always better to PASS THE RACE than to PASS OUT from being involved in a race where you have made a sizeable wager and the horse in the RISKY RACE you bet in, finds itself in a PHOTO!

Who needs it ?

Robert Cochran has given us an excellent definition of Risky Races. Contentious Races are another matter.

A contentious race is one in which several -more than two-horses meet the PUBLIC standards of Top Ability. The public dwell on speed and class factors, trainers, jockey's and post position along with the number of times a horse is mentioned by public selectors. When there are a number of such horses in a race the public has difficulty in assigning proper odds. Hence, a wider odds spread. Contentious races like this lend themselves best to analysis because the match-up factors are obvious. We can look at the PP lines and visualize how the running of the race will shape up. Whereas in a RISKY RCE the number of Knowns are inadequate, a CONTENTIOUS RACE presents an over-abundance of KNOWNs.

In such races Energy and TRack Profile are prime eliminators.

The public will bet most heavily on Early Speed as they perceive it. i.e. Front Runners. If, indeed a track is favoring early ENERGY we have an advantage because it is not the same as Early Speed in so many instances.

If the track is running sustained we can determine the difference between Sustained ENERGY horses and Closers. The Public does not usually make this distinction.

In short, pass RISKY Races, embrace contentious ones.

After the fire at Arlington the meet moved to Hawthorne..

The public, naturally, played the horses to run the SAME WAY at Hawthorne as they did at Arlington. They did not.

Each distance shows wide variances in Early-Late Energy requirements; as well as Total Energy. As a result many false favorites were bet way down at Arlington AT HAWTHORNE. Our people, keeping a track energy profile, got exceptionally high mutuels, especially during the first few weeks.

Dick Quigley's Condition Factors

POSITIVE FACTORS:-----

1- EARLY PACE: First Fraction Velocity, more than any other fraction, represents a horse's ACTUAL condition. When a contender's FIRST CALL velocity is the highest in the race - or within .69 f/P/s of the highest in the race, AND is no more than .45 f/P/s behind the highest 2nd CALL velocity in the race, it qualifies under EARLY PACE. ALLOWING for possible GATE Problems, accept a contender within .66 f/P/s of the FASTEST contender at the 2nd CALL, IF it was within .35 f/P/s of the fastest time in the race at the STRETCH CALL.

(see: FIGURING THE STRETCH CALL, Next.) 2-When a contender maintains its Early Velocity ranking to the Stretch Call it is an even MORE Positive sign. (Note, all velocities should be adjusted by applicable variant figure.)

The stretch call is 1/8th of a mile from the finish AT ALL DISTANCES. The formula for determining velocity to this call is as follows:

Distance in feet of total race divided by the PACE OF RACE time. = ?

Distance in feet of race minus 660. Enter this as Race Distances. Figure horse beaten lengths to the stretch call:

Example:

6 furlongs=3960 feet

less 660 feet = 3300 ft.

3300 feet = 5 furlongs.

Enter as a 5 furlong race. Follow the exact Procedure you now use in entering a horse BUT instead of using FINAL BEATEN lengths, use the STRETCH CALL Beaten lengths.

TIME for Use of Stretch Call:

EXAMPLE: King Of Calif:

Final time; Pace of Race @ 6.5 F= 77.8. Number of feet in 6.5 f= 4290. $4290/77.8 = 55.71$
Number of feet to stretch (5.5f) 3630. There is a .90 positive * distance adjustment that must be given to the horse for going a full furlong less. So it's adjusted final f/p/s time becomes $55.71+.90$ or 56.61.
Divide 3630 by 56.61 = 64.12 or (1:04:06)

Enter 64.06 as King of Cal' final time at 5.5 furlongs and use the other times as is. Final B.L. = Stretch Call b.l.; Hd (.10)

Now, using the same procedure, Extrapolate Jolly Business' Stretch Call final time;

3: GAIN: When a horse GAINS VELOCITY over the PACE OF THE RACE in the Second or third fraction - or both, PROVIDING the gain in f/P/s

Example:

1st Frac. Loss = 5.0 2nd Frac. Loss=.40

POR 60 57.80 52.80

3rd Frac. Gain, only = .20

POH 57 57.40 53.00 THIS IS NOT GOOD. The horse was 3 f/P/s

behind at first call; gained but .20 at finish.

Example 2:

2nd Frac. Gain = .16

POR 60 57.80 52.80

3rd Frac. Gain = .44

POH 57 57.96 53.24

This is GOOD. The horse started gaining on the PACE of the RACE early and continued to gain thereafter.

4: RECENT WORKOUT: Regular interval workouts are the most significant, but a RECENT (within 6 days) workout of 5 or 6 furlongs is meaningful when a horse has shown little in last two races.

5: CLASS DROP: When a horse is returning to a Claiming or Allowance level at which it did well (win, Place show or 4th) beware. If no such race is showing, look for a 40% drop in claiming value or Purse (AW) PROVIDING the animal shows AT LEAST one other Positive Factor.

6: DISTANCE SWITCH: ROUTES last and 2nd call (3/4 Mi.) was within 3 5ths of a second of the best of today's sprinter's FINAL TIME. apply Alternate Sprint to Route Procedure. (See Manuals)

SPRINT LAST, Route Today: True Speed is at least 2.10 f/P/s GREATER than today's best Router's final true speed, AND contender SET or GAINED on the final Fraction PACE OF RACE. OTHERWISE ask for a final sprint velocity at least 2.45 Greater than today's best Router.

7: CLOSE UP: When a contender stays within .25 f/P/s of the PACE OF THE RACE at no less than 2 of 3 calls in last race, REGARDLESS of PACE times or of final time.

8: PEAKING: when a contender's fractional velocities are equal to, better or within .20 of the f/P/s velocities of its last GOOD EFFORT (Win or Place) regardless of the Pace of its last race.

9: PACE RACE: Horse set or forced the Pace in either of its last two races and maintained this condition to the stretch call but did not win. (See #2, Stretch Call.)

10: WIN: led or was within .25 f/P/s at stretch call. Wins by 2 or more. Most likely sign of repeat win, PROVIDING 2nd call velocity was within .45 f/P/s of the best of today's competition.

11: 2nd Place Finish (or 3rd if within 3/4 length of Place last.): Gained on Pace of Race from Second FRACTION to finish and was within .45 f/P/s of winner last or next to last. PROVIDING today's Class Level is acceptable.

NEGATIVE FACTORS

When a contender does not show at LEAST one Positive Factor. Two Positive factors are Preferable and since the Positive Factors are inter-related, most "in-form" horses will show two or more.



Saturday, March 30, 1985 was a banner day for Glenn Smock, beginning with this first race at Santa Anita. It had been raining and the track was a trifle off. However it showed little early or late bias. It was in fact running what we used to call average. Under such circumstances 3 is an ideal ranking, Early and Sustained. Our old 3-3-3 and 3-3-X line scores that produced so many long-shots, reflected this condition. You will note that the winner had a Early Pace Ranking of 4 and Sustained: 3. Eliminating Adrianus, which the computer ultimately did, the winner was a 3-3 Early/Sustained and number 1 in Ultrascan. Glenn won this quinella because he has learned that when seeking the Place horse one does not eliminate contenders because of lower class. Neither does he eliminate extremely HIGH class ranked horses because of a slower Pace. It is from these two categories that most of the high Priced Place horses come. Pizzolla, Purdy and Sartin, thinking about WIN HORSE eliminations, discarded SAVOUR. We had the winner but NOT the quinella. Smock left SAVOUR in, believed his numbers and collected the maximum Las Vegas Quinella Payoff, 100 to 1.

Mountain Bear's Victory at \$135,40 is a tribute to the public's ritualistic elimination of lay-off horses. Princess Criole's 2nd place finish for a \$4,183.50 Exacta Payoff added to the fiasco. Southern California fans tend to eschew Bay Area Stakes runners, discounting them regardless of finish.

American fans seem reluctant to use the minimal information supplied on foreign horse.

Note That MOUNTAIN BEAR, in England, was laid off from Oct. 14, 1984 to April 24, 1984...and returned to WIN.

Layoffs are customary for English horses. Training concepts and racing conditions in general are different.

Mountain Bear's long layoff in this country -considering the level of the race, should not have been an eliminating factor.

Ditto for Princess Cariole.

By doubling the actual value of the deflated English Purses, the BEAR is 103% of Purse Value.

Another factor to note: Mtn. Bear ran against a 19 Daily Variant, the other horses came off of 07, 06 and 04 Daily Variants.

UltraScan, yes adjusted, did the job as usual.

THE PSYCHOLOGY OF WINNING

A CONDENSED OVERVIEW OF "WIN THERAPY"

Certain Life-Games, played in Boardrooms and
Bedrooms, can be won by deception and deceit.
Winning at the Races can not.

What has become known as the SARTIN METHODOLOGY had its roots in psychotherapy. The persons who first contributed to the development of the Methodology were openly and admittedly patients in therapy with a clinical contract demanding that they refrain from any form of wagering until they had cleansed themselves of all contamination that prevented a healthy adult ego state from functioning as the rational executor of their behavior as handicappers, selectors and investors.

They were required to abandon the 'The Games Losing Gamblers Play,' which are, incidentally, the precise, same "Games that Alcoholics Play." **

Chronic horse-race bettor losing patterns are, as Alcoholism, derived from a Hamartic (tragic) life-script characterized by a series of transactional 'games' that are at once obvious and definitive. Like the game of "alcoholism", "losing gambler" requires a "connection" (race-track or bookie) and a "patsy." With the alcoholic it is the bartender or liquor store.

The role of Patsy in both games is a revolving one because both games are played on the Drama Triangle consisting of - Victim, Persecutor and Rescuer. The "horseplayer" always starts out in the victim role with wife, friend, therapist as Persecutor and/or Rescuer. The "victim" then manipulates himself into Persecutor/Rescuer roles, deftly making wife/ friend/ therapist the victim.

As an information source alone, the Methodology can only take clients so far toward the goal of WINNING without re-asserting the fundamental therapeutic concepts upon which it is based. Hence, this section of the work-book.

In the beginning was the word. And the word was WIN.
And they said to me, "don't bug us with a bunch of psycho-
logical crap; just teach us to win!" And I replied,
"If winning were a matter of information alone, you would
all be winners now because all the information you'll ever
need lies before you in The Daily Racing Form."

And while they all had eyes, they saw not what was truly
there but only that which they wanted to see. And what they
wanted to see was what was made knowlegeable to them by
soothsayers and purveyers of myths who themselves were
contaminated by superstition and fallacy.

Were they as little children, uncontaminated by injunctions,
myths, attributions and other negative cultural indoctrin-
ations, they could have become winners in a few weeks. As it
was it took almost a year.

The art and science of Handicapping is a function of learning
to assimilate facts and put them into a sequential order of
procedure.

The art and science of WINNING demands, first, the abandonment
of all functional obstacles that obscure the path that leads
to the goal of synthesizing knowlege and Winning.

If that ultimate goal is NOT winning, but rather learning, alone,
then surely the obstacles will be the only winners.

To WIN races alone is relatively simple. There are numerous
Systems and Methods, Public Handicappers and Tout Sheets which,
on any given day, will produce a plethora of winners-that day.
They will not make you a WINNER.

A WINNER has achieved a state of autonomy manifesting itself
in self-esteem and self-reliance that will cause him/her to select
winners every day; and further, wager on them in a manner that
insures regular monetary profit.

It is said: That which we fear the most will surely befall us.

Thus, Fear of Losing is the sperm from which losing is born.

All philosophical and scientific knowlege from the beginning of time was born of FEAR. When the second person on earth watched the first person die, he was sore afraid. Thus the God which created man was, in turn, re-created by man to provide an after-world assuring life everlasting. The fear of death remained but the panic was dulled by the perceived solution. The heavenly rationale was never fully accepted, however. The essential FEAR remained. Fire was "invented" to prevent death by freezing; weapons were conceived to stave off the brutish beasts of all species.

Fear was the mother of medicine and the cure and prevention of disease. All fear is fear of death. Be it dying permanently or only after the ninth race. All hope is the alleviation of fear; the forestalling of death. All death is loss. Loss of life, loved-one, wealth or that same ninth race.

Fear of any kind of death has instilled man with an intrinsic Death-Wish. When its power supercedes EROS, the life-wish, one gives in to fear. The internal message is, "I fear it, so I'll court it. I cannot bear the suspense so I'll get it over with. (suicide.) Hemingway made a career of it.

Each day we are subject to hundreds of little deaths. If our parental, (cultural) injunctions are: You can't win, don't fight it, accept things as they are, you can't fight City Hall, Don't ask, don't think, don't touch, et al, we accept these little deaths fully adapted to a non-winning life-script.

And, no matter how heatedly we might deny it: we fully expect to lose the ninth race.

Those self-determinists who tell us that we can abandon death-wish oriented patterns merely by willing it so, are admirable if misled creatures. It is a sound theory but does not work in practice. We live in a land with over thirty-million KNOWN Alcoholics and a growing number, also in the millions, of narcotic addicts. There is no psychological distinction between the two. But don't tell that to the heavy drinking father of a son caught using pot.

Alcoholism, Narcotic addiction and Losing at the races are ALL functions of the SAME DISORDER.

Of the three Drug Addiction alone demands total abstinence. There are no "social drug users." None of the three meet the true medical definition of "disease." They are manifestations, but NOT of a disease; unless life itself can be called a disease. What they are manifestations of is "adaptability." We are ALL born innocent little princes and princesses completely vulnerable to the witches and ogres who will begin preying upon us from the moment we are hatched. They, themselves, having been so preyed upon are merely passing on the legacy given to THEM. Filled with witch and Ogre messages we adapt to exist.

Physiological adaptation is learned from example. We learn to walk, talk, dress ourselves, speak, read, write, drive a car, use weapons, develop job skills and to physically protect ourselves.

By example we also learn to adapt to reality; OR AT LEAST THE REALITY PERCEIVED BY THOSE WHOSE EXAMPLES WE FOLLOW.

And there lies the rub.

Psychological Adaptation is IMPOSED upon us by our forebearers.

It is derived NOT for our individual benefits but for the gratification of the IMPOSERS who have convinced themselves that what they are doing is for our own good when in reality it is for their own good even as it was for the good of their predecessors.

Of course, we have to do the adapting ourselves, but the imposition comes so early in life our capacity to fight is limited.

Most of us adapt psychologically to life by playing out a life-script written for us by our forebearers. Seldom are we such robots that we play a single role, however. Dual and multiple roles are common. Or at least, so we think. A discriminating audience knows that we playing but one role with a change of costume. In our daily performances we will say one thing and mean quite another. When this is done with an ulterior motive it's called a GAME.

Alcoholism is a game. Losing Gambler is the SAME GAME.

Note: In providing the most universally effective alternative to Alcoholism, A.A. has chosen to call it a "disease." With one of America's most powerful lobbies, they even got the Medical Profession to accept it as such, albeit with tongue in cheek and hand on wallet...since diseases belong to M.D.'s. The medical definition of disease precludes the inclusion of "Alcoholism." Let the AMA and its worldwide counterparts alter the definition of disease so that alcoholism can be included, or we must accept it for what it is: one of many forms of adaptive behavior.

One positive aspect of calling Alcoholism a disease is that it dramatizes it into a morbid state requiring immediate treatment through A.A. or one of many rehabilitation centers. Many alcohol abusers have become sufficiently frightened by the "disease" conspiracy to accept help. Some have even replaced alcoholism with the 'disease' of abstinence. I use the term 'disease' here in the same context as A.A. refers to Alcoholism as a disease. They demand acceptance of the absolute that alcoholism is incurable. If we are to believe that there is no cure for a disease we are bound to accept the dichotomous alternative as a benign but equal opposite. If the only alternative to heads is tails and both are on the same coin, their generic definition is COIN. Hence, if Alcoholism is a disease and abstinence the only alternative, it, too, must be a disease. To a rational person that is patently ridiculous.

Alcoholism as a disease is equally ridiculous. A.A. is doing a marvelous job despite their bending of medical terminology.

Even with A.A.'s great efforts persons afflicted with the non-disease of Alcoholism grow in number each year.

Ten years ago there were an estimated 22 million alcoholics in the United States. Today the estimate goes as high as 30 million.

With the 'success' of A.A. came a spin-off organization called G.A., Gamblers Anonymous. Following the example of A.A. they declared Gambling an "incurable disease." "Compulsion-Obsession" are their buzz words. They throw these words around as if they know what they mean. Psychiatry itself has never been able to give them a universally accepted definition. Compulsion is action due to irresistible impulse. Compulsions are usually the result of obsessions which are emotionally charged IDEAS existing in the mind of an individual. Hence a manifest compulsion is an obsession acted out.

What most people call 'compulsive' is in reality 'impulsive' behavior, actions resulting from the stimuli of the moment.

Only when impulsive behavior is repetitive regardless of stimuli can it be considered compulsive. In Las Vegas, for instance, slot machines present a "stimuli of the moment" and few persons can resist the temptation to feed these little creatures in the green felt zoo. It is impulsive but normal behavior.

Away from the stimuli the impulse dies. On the other hand, if you get to Barstow and find that you're feeding coins with careless abandon to every cigarette and candy vending machine you can find, you may indeed be compulsive. Compulsions are seldom fixed; "cure" one and another breaks out. When they are fixed and systematized they get a morbid label, like paranoia. Classical Psychoanalysis never tried to "cure" compulsive gamblers. They merely attempted to impose compulsive limits on the amount of monies wagered. Penny-Ante, and two-bit limits were viable alternatives to squandering the family fortune. Freud was convinced that eliminating one compulsion merely agitated another-possibly more dangerous-one into being. Arrest the gambling compulsion and a kleptomaniac or a Jack the Ripper might emerge. Nowhere in the literature on the subject did any of our psychiatric forebearers suggest WINNING as an alternative.

If Freud was right, and he probably was, why NOT impose WINNING as an alternative? Winning is at least as good an escape valve as cutting women's throats or strangling people.

It is Human Nature to want a piece of the pie.

Somebody out there is winning.

Every day in the sports pages we can read the payoffs at our local race-track. We see monies paid out for Win, Place, Show, for Exactas, Trifectas, Quinellas, Daily-Doubles, Pick-Six's....etc. At least SIX payoffs per race. SOMEONE got that money.

Why not me? Why not YOU?

That was the question asked of me by my original "Win Therapy" group.

The answer was, "IT CAN BE YOU."

But first, become autonomous. Discard your prescribed loser life-script; write yourself a winner-script and live IT. Above all, stop playing the GAME ALCOHOLICS PLAY - THE GAME LOSING GAMBLERS PLAY!

Well, I convinced them to CONVINCED THEMSELVES it was true..Most of them succeeded.

Now it's time to CONVINCED YOU TO CONVINCED YOURSELF.

With them, a certain amount of "Psychological Crap" had to be undergone. In the end, they thanked me for it. I hope it will be likewise with YOU.

A SIMPLE DEFINITION OF TERMS

All persons who drink on a fairly regular basis - On occasion to excess- ARE NOT Alcoholics. ---Except in the eyes of reformed drunks. All persons who gamble and lose ----- on occasion to excess - are not Losing Gamblers.

Only when the NEED to Drink and/or the NEED to Lose becomes the prime Energizer of one's personality can we apply the terminology:

Alcoholic and/or Losing Gambler. Neither drinking nor losing by themselves are GAMES. They are either Activities or Pastimes.

The fledgling psychologist often confuses Games with Activities and Pastimes. The same fledgling would also confuse the great social quips of a Shaw, Noel Coward or the Oscar's Wilde and Levant with GAMES. Fledgling psychologists, emulating their senior peers, often have very little sense of humor and view most social gatherings as a smorgasbord of neuroses waiting to be cured. Only after an apprenticeship in a mental hospital or maximum security prison, does one learn to temper one's judgement with the gift of laughter and a sense that whole damned world is mad.



I personally believe that if what I know is good for you, YOUR knowing it, too, is even better for you. Hence the following definitions:



Here also is the tender baby who can become fear-ridden and anxious if not stroked, nurtured and loved (recognized).

LOSER BEHAVIOR emanates from the **ADAPTED CHILD** Ego State. The Adapted Child is the Great Imitator. It imposes upon the whole persona the worst interpretation of all the negatives imposed by social forces. Further, it conspires to subdue the Little Professor and the Free Child with false information and restrictive, unhealthy inhibitions. It is the true enemy within. When energized it will destroy your chances of being a successful handicapper.

P A R E N T

Is the first Ego State because this is the first entity encountered by the newborn person.



Parent is a dual Ego State because Parents Play Two Roles. The first is that of NURTURER. The Nurturing, protective Parent feeds us, gives us warmth, food, clothing, shelter and comfort. These are the initial STROKES of recognition all human entities require in order to live. The newborn is totally dependent upon the nurturing parent. With total dependence comes trust. The Parent represents power. For about the first two years of our lives we give total allegiance to this figure. From Nurturing Parent example come our own concepts of nurturing, love, affection. In our first two years of life we are like a sponge, absorbing parent stimuli which, later in life, we will mirror in our behavior.



The other role of Parent is Punitive. This the parent who punishes us when we are perceived to be bad or naughty. To the infant punishment is STROKE DENIAL. However, if punitive parent behavior is dominant, the Child adapts, accepting punishment as strokes. Thus Masochism is born. The love of punishment; since love is PERCEIVED as punishment. The Punitive Parent is like a video-tape playback of all the socially inflicted rules of history. The key word here for the handicapper is RULES. Both halves of the Parent Ego state impart rules, injunctions, Attribution. In order to receive parental strokes, we adapt to these rules. Some of these rules are sound and adult oriented forming our moral fibre. Most of them are fallacious. Myths, old-wives-tales and self-serving lies are accepted by us up 'til about the age of 7 as absolutes right along with the Ten Commandments* of sound moral behavior.

* My statement concerning the Ten Commandment is an excellent
 * example of Parent disguised as Adult. If you accepted the state-
 ment you might also accept --as gospel--- "Horses away from the
 track longer than 30 days should not be considered." The moral val-
 ue of the Ten Commandments must be subject to Adult scrutiny. To a
 Polytheist the First Commandment would be unacceptable. Living in
 harmony in a polygamous society would preclude acceptance of "Thou
 Shall Not Commit Adultery." "Thou Shall Not Kill" has never been
 accepted any group of persons forming a political entity, especially
 those to whom the commandment was given. America's Manifest Destiny
 would never have been manifest following this commandment. "Thou
 Shall Not Steal," would leave the Native American's in sole
 possession of much of the North American land mass. "Thou Shall Not
 Bear False Witness-" construed as, "Don't Lie," would make any
 elective form of government unworkable if truly followed.
 Rules, even fallacious ones, are necessary to maintain an orderly
 society. FAMILY is the first alleged orderly society we are ex-
 posed to. Hence we are conditioned to ADAPT to rules.
 When we commenced WIN THERAPY in 1975, my clients brought me a
 dining room table full of systems and methods that did not work.
 ALL OF THEM CONTAINED SETS OF RULES.

RULES ARE ABSOLUTES.

THOROUGHBRED RACING IS NOT ABSOLUTE. IT IS SUBJECT TO
 A NUMBER OF VARIABLES.

BY NATURE VARIABLES CANNOT BE SOLVED BY ABSOLUTES.

Ergo: Rules don't apply in handicapping Thoroughbreds. That was
 the first and greatest commandment. Until we perceived it we failed.
 Once we accepted it we WON. It is just that simple.
 Winning Handicappers are those who can correctly evaluate and
 weigh a set of variables, reducing them NOT to a constant, but
 rather to a control dynamic.

There is ONLY ONE RULE. 1: There Are no rules.

Period

All my statement are, of course, Parental because they are charged
 with emotional zeal. However, they represent ADULT in Parent pre-
 cepts because they are resultant from Adult inquiry. Which leads
 us to the next Ego State:


ADULT



**COLD, REASONING, PLANNING, LOGICAL, UNEMOTIONAL.
NOT MUCH FUN TO BE AROUND. AN EGO STATE TO BE CATHECTED ONLY
WHEN NECESSARY. SHOULD BE TEMPERED BY "LITTLE PROFESSOR"**

The Adult, ideally, is not subject to warped perceptions, rules, myths or injunctions. It is an emotionless computer sifting fact from fallacy and prints out only fact. I say 'ideally' because, like any other computer, it can only process data fed to it. When energized Adult will make proper decisions, formulate plans and execute logical responses to all stimuli.

If you subscribe to Right Side, Left Side Brain topography theories, Adult is the Left Side. The cold, calculating scientist within us all. It's a very dull individual, incidentally. No one, including the other parts of self, can stand being around it for very long.



"The Little Professor"


Is born at about aged two and matures at about seven years. This is the Adult within Child. Right Side brain activity originates here. Intuition, insight, creativity, philosophical concepts and, above all, a sense that much of what is being fed to it is garbage. Being part of Child, the LP has both a sense of the Ridiculous AND the Sublime. It is our greatest ally in time of need.

It is not a function of IQ. Successful Handicapping is NOT a function of IQ. The LP is the world's BEST handicapper; let LP work for

YOU!


CONTAMINATION

PUNITIVE PARENT (PIG PARENT) MESSAGES INFESTING THE FREE-CHILD EGO STATE CAUSING NEGATIVE EMULATIONS FREQUENTLY DISGUISED AS ADULT BEHAVIOR. PRECONCEPTIONS, PREJUDICE, HOSTILITY, LOGIC TIGHT REASONING AND BEHAVIOR. A CESSPOOL FOR BREEDING GAME PLAYING AND DESTRUCTIVE OR NON-CREATIVE BEHAVIOR. GENESIS FOR NON-WINNING ATTITUDINAL SETS. COMING ALWAYS FROM ADAPTED CHILD.



CAN THE ADULT EGO STATE BE CONTAMINATED??

Yes. When the Little Professor is stifled at an early age and all the information fed into your adult computer is false, your Adult, non-emotional computer will malfunction with absolute precision. This produces the most malignant of conditions, requiring Reparenting. None of you are in this condition or you wouldn't be reading this. What may appear to be Adult contamination is usually ADAPTED CHILD in the Executor role.



STROKES

UNITS OF RECOGNITION

THE UNIVERSAL PAYOFF-REWARD

A STROKE IS ANY UNIT OF RECOGNITION. POSITIVE STROKES ARE LOVE, APPROVAL, AFFECTION. WHEN POSITIVE STROKES ARE NOT AVAILABLE

NEGATIVE STROKES ARE MORE ACCEPTABLE THAN NONE AT ALL. BEATINGS, OPEN CONTEMPT, DERISION, ANGER, REPRIMAND, ET AL

ARE SUBSTITUTE STROKES.

Strokes are the essence of life. Call them what you like. They are nutrition, affection, love, care, instruction, protection...

In short: RECOGNITION. We live because of them. We die without them.

As infants ALL behavior is Stroke Oriented.

We get strokes any way we can.

We adapt to our Parent world (society) in order to get strokes.

If they were obtained in a healthy, overt manner, we will probably grow up to be overt and happy.

If they were obtained through covert, deceitful behavior, we will probably grow up to be covert and deceitful.

Social pressures and human evolution being what it is, the latter is most prevalent.

With most of us it was a combination of the two. Unfortunately, Negativity is a more powerful human catalyst than positivity.

Our behavior is more frequently influenced by that which is than by what should be. Adaptation is protection against negativity so adapted behavior is essentially negative.

What ever adaptations we made in order to get strokes in our infancy we will continue to apply throughout life. (Barring therapeutic change)

LOSING GAMBLERS GET POWERFUL STROKES

They are in the MAJORITY. A stroke-plus in itself. They always manage to get FORGIVEN. They are PITIED. They ARE VICIMS in a Victim-Oriented society. They are EXAMPLES held up as living PROOF of Parental Injunctions that Gamblers NEVER WIN. Think about it.

CATHEXIS

CATHECTING AN EGO STATE IS PUTTING IT INTO GEAR AND ENERGIZING IT BY STEPPING ON THE GAS PEDAL. IF YOU CANNOT CONTROL CATHEXIS YOU WILL LIVE MOSTLY IN AN ADAPTED (CONTAMINATED) CHILD STATE

The Ego State we will cathect the most frequently will be the one in which we received the most stroke gratification as infants. If we were normal, nurtured babies, our free bubbly, gurgly child probably earned us a lot of coo-chee-coo's and isn't it adorable's. If we cried and wailed a lot -and if this brought us our prime source of strokes, we will grow up using this device. Screamers, shouters, whiners and cryers evolved thusly. With most of us both played a part, so our adapted behavior combines the two. As we grew older most of us didn't stay all that cute so in our 'terrible two's' we became hostile and rebellious. While it may have brought a few spankings along with it, rebellion brought attention:-STROKES. If they were powerful enough rebellion might become a life-long stance.

The "Little Professor" should emerge about now. In families where precociousness was encouraged, strokes came in the form of praise: "Isn't he/she a bright kid. Only three years old and already reading Einstein. She tap dances better than Shirley Temple. You've got a budding genius on your hands, Abner...." etc. Such infants are given books, erector sets and chemical sets and are allowed to speak at the dinner table. PROVIDING there is no antiintellectual prejudice on the part of the parents. All too frequently there is.

When the "Little Professor is told to be seen and not heard, to stop asking all those "for adults only" questions and to keep away from Dad and Mom's books and/or magazines, it may be squelched to a degree sufficient to render its contributions secondary throughout life. So deflated, the Adult Ego state will seldom be the one cathected by our child-executor. This leaves only compliance or rebellion as adaptation alternatives. Neither is conducive to successful handicapping. The ideal state is a merger of Rebel and Little Professor. The LP teaches the Rebel how to wage revolution with non-malicious precision, earning strokes along the way.



SCRIPTS

**A BLUEPRINT FOR A LIFE COURSE WITH A BEGINNING, MIDDLE AND END.
FOLLOWING THE ARISTOTELIAN PRINCIPLES OF DRAMATURGY.
WRITTEN BY "PARENT" SCRIPTWRITERS AND ACTED OUT BY THE
ADAPTED CHILD EGO STATE.**

As we repeat the behavior pattern that earns us strokes we become a type-cast player in soap-opera like play. We have been scripted.

CATEGORIES: HAMARTIC (TRAGIC) & BANAL, ORDINARY.

Life-Scripts fall into Two Categories; as dictated by the Adaptation process. Rebels usually take a tragic role; compliance a banal, ordinary one.

Over-compliance lends itself to a Hamartic role in the form of total helplessness, Chemical reliance, insanity and suicide. The Hamartic Script always ends tragically but the rebel goes out with a bang, not a whimper, as does his compliant counterpart. Hamartic Scripts are often, in the larger sense, winner scripts since they produce world leaders and Titans of Industry. NO SCRIPT is good for handicappers, as we will see.

WINNERS

Of wars, presidential elections, corporate take-overs and Nobel Prizes often have Hamartic Scripts. A person with a Hamartic Script might also get involved in gambling or Handicapping; but usually as a bookie, casino owner or operator, perhaps the one who engineers the "big fix." As a gambler, alcoholic or handicapper, he/she is the "go-for-broke big plunger" who will never be satisfied to grind it out - or to quit- until the final tragic end dictates it.

LOSERS


Can also have Hamartic Scripts. But theirs is to ONLY lose. Compliance is their adaptation tool; although they may have attempted rebellion once, it was thoroughly quashed. They are like the last of the the Romanoff's living in exile hoping to be recalled to rule Russia but knowing they never will. Their adult is TOO DORMANT to make use of any handicapping tool.

NON-WINNERS

Have a Banal Script and make excellent employees and social workers. They are joiners and committee servers. They can be taught handicapping and so long as the teacher is near-by and all things go according to form, they can actually become reasonably successful. It is still possible to cathect a healthy adult and live a script-free life without the necessity of re-parenting.

DRAMA TRIANGLE

Steve Karpman, M.D. conceived the Drama Triangle on which all scripts are lived and all transactional games are played. Each player rotates around the the triangle, alternating roles throughout life.



A simplistic, but typical example of the process is as follows:

A: Playing Victim: "I'm lonely. Nobody cares about-me."

B: Playing Rescuer: "I'll care. Here, let me comfort you."


A: Becoming Persecutor: "Why do you have to hang around and bug me?"

B: Turning Victim: "And after all I've done for you."

A: Now Rescuer: "Don't get upset, I was only kidding."

B: Turns Persecutor: "The hell with you. You deserve to be alone."

In varying forms, this drama game is played out daily by millions of people throughout the world in many different languages. The lines may be more sophisticated but the plot is the same. It's manipulation through adaptation.



The Players: LG (losing gambler) PT Pirco Teacher

LG: As Victim: "I can't pick winners like you. Who you got in the 5th?"

PT: As Rescuer: "I won't pick your horse but I'll teach you to do it."

LG: Now Persecutor: "I'm from Missouri, you gotta prove it to me first."

PT: As Victim: "I was trying to help you and you turn on me."

LG: As Rescuer: "I'm sorry. I hear the Method's really good."

PT: As Persecutor: "It is, but YOU have to work at it."

LG: Victim, again: "All I wanna do is win."

TRANSACTIONS

In that Game Transaction, PT was just as much a player as LG. Both got a Payoff by virtue of playing ALL THREE positions on the triangle. By winding up as Victim for the second time in one short game, LG got two payoffs and is ready to go around the triangle again.

THE SAME TRANSACTION - GAME FREE(by LP)

LG: Trying to be Victim: "I can't pick winners like you. Who you got in The 5th?"

PT: "Nothing." or: "I haven't handicapped the 5th yet."

PT has avoided the game by giving a straight adult response to LG's opening gambit. PT may have been lying but not for an ulterior motive. He/she avoided getting on the Triangle by refusing to be Victim, Rescuer OR Persecutor. So..LG tries again, demonstrating that "Nothing" was the better answer.

LG: Trying to disguise Victim role: "Oh, great. Since you're really so great at it, I'd like to watch you."

PT: "I'm through for the day."

LG: Decides to play another role: Persecutor: "Must not be very good if you can't figure THIS race."

PT: (No response)

LG: Plays Rescuer: "Listen I gotta great tip on this one."

PT: "No thanks." (walks away)

LG tried playing ALL THREE roles in order to lure PT into a Game Transaction. The first was a version of "Gee, you're wonderful doctor." It usually ends up in "gotcha" since appeals to vanity seldom fail. As Persecutor LG tried the challenge appeal; and as Rescuer, appealing to curiosity and/or greed. Games require at least TWO players. Game Transactions can be stifled only by straight adult response. A response from any other ego state sets the game in motion. Most of us, in practice, cannot resist getting into the game, so game initiators are seldom thwarted as was LG.

GAMES ARE COUNTER PRODUCTIVE AND CANNOT

BE PLAYED IN AN ADULT EGO STATE

IF LG had really wanted to learn PT's method he would have asked for adult information. i.e. LG: "How can I learn your method?"



AN OVERTLY HONEST, STRAIGHTFORWARD TRANSACTION BETWEEN TWO (AT LEAST) PERSONS, CONTAINING A HIDDEN, ULTERIOR MOTIVE AT THE PSYCHOLOGICAL LEVEL DIFFERENT FROM THE SOCIAL LEVEL; AND RESULTING IN A PAYOFF FOR BOTH (ALL) PLAYERS.

THE PLAYER

Accepting any of the three roles on the DramaTriangle makes one a player. There are no innocent players, no losers of the game since all participants get some kind of eventual payoff.

The INITIATOR of the game is perceived to be the inveterate game player. So long as we do not lose sight of the fact that anyone who plays the game is a player, we will concentrate on the INITIATOR.

THE PATSY

The Patsy is not essential to reciprocal games. The Patsy thinks that he/she is too wise to be hooked into anything and thusly is made a featured player in the Alcoholic/Losing Gambler Game. The Patsy is often the understanding spouse/friend/lover or therapist upon whose reaction the subject playing IT (Alcoholic or LG) depends as catalyst for the next MOVE.

THE CONNECTION

LG and Alcoholic need a connection to play the Game. Connection is the supplier of the commodity needed to play the game. i.e. Booze, Race-track, bookie or betting establishment. The Connection is both the Rescuer (friend in need) and Victim (If it ~~were~~'nt for you I'da..")

The purveyor of the Methodology is sometimes perceived as the connection, (If it ~~wern~~'t for you I'da quit long ago...or if it ~~were~~'nt for you I'd still be playing SWEEPS top choice and winning, etc.)

Despondent wives also tend to view the Methodologist as a connection if not THE connection. By design, however, the Methodologist is set up as a Patsy.

"OH, THE GAMES THAT PEOPLE PLAY NOW, NEVER SAYING WHAT THEY MEAN, NOW, NEVER MEANING WHAT THEY SAY....
OH, THE GAMES THAT PEOPLE PLAY....."



GAMES ALCOHOLICS & LOSING GAMBLERS PLAY



My reason for linking the Game of Losing Gambler with the Game of Alcoholic lies in the popularity and notoriety of Alcoholism. It must be a popular game because over 30 million Americans are playing it.... notorious because of wide television and other media exposure. So, losing gamblers, come out of the closet. You're playing a version of one of the world's favorite games. Perhaps it is like comparing touch football to tackle football. But the touch gets pretty heavy when you blow the mortgage money on a nag that's still running or the health insurance payment on one that shouldn't have run in the first place....because it finished in last place.

To save space from now on we'll refer to the game as LG for Losing Gambler.

Even as there is High School Football, College Football and Professional Football, there are three divisions of the game. With Alcoholics the divisions are DRUNK BUT PROUD, LUSH and WINO.

In our game of LG the divisional names are changed to:

Lose with Pride/arrogance

Lose with shame/guilt

Lose with abandon.

Drunk but Proud and Lose with Pride/Arrogance are treatable and subject to cure. Lush and Lose with shame/guilt are tough cases. Wino and Lose with abandon are tougher still.

Alcoholic and LG can be played by only TWO persons but the Game is essentially a five-handed one. When only two are involved one person will have to play FOUR roles since A or LG is always IT.

Here is the Cast: IT (the LG or A) Chief Supporting Role:PERSECUTOR.
RESCUER, CONNECTION & PATSY.

Before going into the variations of the Game itself, let us present the thesis of Dr. Eric Berne, author of GAMES PEOPLE PLAY and father of Transactional Analysis. He said that there was no such thing as AN ALCOHOLIC (or Losing Gambler*) But rather the roles of Alcoholic (Losing Gambler). Dr. Berne gives full credence to the organic disorders that may follow in the aftermath of continued excessive alcohol abuse, saying they belong to the realm of internal medicine. The roles themselves are chosen by the player and have no medical basis. In the final analysis drinking or gambling is not the PAYOFF in the game. They represent incidental pain/pleasure advantages that lead to the real culmination, which is the hangover. In gambling it is the same concept but called the aftermath; 'the big mess we're in as a result,' syndrome. The mess attracts attention. Attention is the form of recognition (strokes) that IT is playing for. The hangover, the remorse, the self-punishment and, especially the punishment (attention) wielded by the Persecutor role, take the player back to when, as a naughty little person, he/she got all the attention of parents. The final pay-off is the inevitable forgiveness, the return to loving arms - poor baby, just can't help it. This the clue to begin the cycle all over again.

Just as there are heavy drinkers who NEVER have hangovers, there are losing gamblers who have no remorse. These people are NOT playing the A/LG game and should not be regarded as such. The mere act of drinking to excess or losing at gambling is nothing more than that. All games must have a pay-off for at least TWO persons.

VARIATIONS OF THE GAME

- 1: Look how bad I've been; see if you can stop me. (please stop me)
- 2: Kick Me. (Don't kick me. love me.)
- 3: Now I've got you, you S.O.B. (you made me what I am)

The aim of the first Two versions is self, and persecutor imposed, castigation. In the third variation the aim is justification.

The hidden message is: "See What YOU made me do!"

- 4: The above is a variation on the theme of "I tried to be good but nothing I ever did pleased you." This is designed to cause remorse in the persecutor (parent substitute)

* Losing Gambler is our contribution to TA

The parent substitute is usually spouse/friend/lover who cannot fully comprehend that he/she is not the villain of the piece but only someone IT has cast in that role. The anguished cry of "What am I doing wrong, where am I failing?" et al, is common among these surrogate parent figures. The only thing they are doing "wrong" is playing the game at all by allowing themselves to get on the triangle and play the roles of Persecutor, Rescuer and ultimately Victim.

→ LG is seldom as intense a drama as Alcoholic because LG's don't usually put as much in jeopardy. LG's can function in their jobs and don't get arrested for DWI. If they are minimal losers the game can be played forever and nobody is really the wiser. It is also possible for them to score fairly big wins. Most of the big Daily Double, Exacta and some Pick Six wins are scored by LG's. This is true vindication for them until it's all been blown back. They gamble in accordance with the laws of chance which gives and takes without regard for individual differences. While the dynamic is the same only the heavy betting LG poses the same problem as the alcoholic player. Extreme cases of LG's play the Stock and Commodities markets and do cause frequent ruin to themselves and their families. But these pursuits are socially approved and the ultimate Persecutor-Victim roles are played by Big Business or 'conditions.' rather than by an individual.

Our concern here should be only for how the game of LG may be affecting us -you and me- personally in our contract to make you a WINNER. ←
If you are playing the game, and I am foolishly playing it with you, now is the time for us both to get off the drama triangle. By ME I include any Pirco Member or Associate who may unwittingly-or wittingly- be sharing a role in the drama.

If you made your contract with me never meaning to keep it, never truly intending to be a winner, you are NOT playing the LG game. You're just along for the fellowship. If you are winning consistently but want to insure your bets with more knowledge, you are NOT playing the game of LG. You are here to ask for adult transactions. If you are not sure whether you're playing the game or not, let's examine some of the clues.

LG GAME TRANSACTIONS

OPENING GAMBITS

1: Is there someone in my area who I can go to the track with who will help me?

This the most common and destructive of the LG games. It completely ignores the essential basis of the Methodology as a self-help course designed to help you to help yourself. Persons who open the game with this gambit consistently refuse to do do the following:

a: Make a Track Profile. b: do regression. c: keep a Brohamer

Model. d: comply with our request to send some losing races with their own pace line underlined and their read-outs.

The underlying theme of this game is DO ME SOMETHING. The role is HELPLESS.(Victim) Played out, the ultimate payoff comes when someone DOES go to the track with IT, wins less than 70%. Now IT becomes a PERSECUTOR saying, "well I knew it didn't work." Now IT is justified in going back to Sweeps or Mike Warren. Or, as so often happens, 70% IS achieved and IT becomes more firmly entrenched in the VICTIM role because his Rescuer won't go with him/her every day. "I'm only trying to learn," or "I'm not smart like you." are favorite VICTIM rejoinders.

Other versions of this game are:

2: Just handicap ONE race on tomorrow's card so I can see how YOU do it.

The sought-after payoff is the same. (key word: One)

The rationale is that IT can't learn from last week's races, only tomorrow's.

3: Here are my figures for the 5th race tomorrow. Would you check it out and see if I did it right.

4: Which of these Pace Lines is the right one?

The questions seem innocent enough but each one is an invitation to a Game in the Context of our Methodology. The use of the word RIGHT invites us to play persecutor and repeat our oft-stated position that in handicapping there is no right or wrong only accurate or in- accurate as determined by the results in a 20 race cycle, NOT ONE RACE!

In so phrasing these questions IT is trying to get us away from our Adult in Parent Ego state and into Adapted Child where IT is living. IT needs this because of IT's refusal to read and digest the material in the Methodology in an Adult Ego State.

NON GAME VERSIONS-SAME QUESTIONS

- 1: When I've fulfilled my contract and am hitting 63% MAY I go to the track with you or one of the Pirco Charter Members to observe you in action? —
- 3: Have YOU handicapped the 5th race tomorrow. I have. Here are my predictions.
- 4: Here is my pace line selection for this race. Would you comment?

These are straightforward adult to adult requests for additional information. They do not invite role playing, merely peer exchange of analysis.

OTHER GAMBITS

Any transaction wherein the question-asker places himself in a Victim/Persecutor/Rescuer role is an invitation to a game. Any teacher who accepts a role in the game is inviting trouble

PERSECUTOR QUESTION

I bought all your stuff and followed all the rules and I'm still only getting 41%. Something's wrong somewhere.

INVITATION: Persecute me back. Rescue me by DOING ME SOMETHING or Go on the Defensive and be my Victim.

RESCUER QUESTION

I'm not doing too well myself. But, shucks, I'm a slow learner. But my friend, George, he's smart, still he can't figure it out. Says it's hogwash. I stood up for you, though. I think it's great even if I can't understand it.

INVITATION: Persecute me through George.

We get many versions of this one. Such as:
Phillips Newsletter says it's hard. Guess that why I don't understand it. I read a lot of good letters, though. So you must be right.

INVITATION: Persecute me.

Since the question (non-question) embraced both the victim and rescuer roles, Persecutor was the only one left for the respondent.

SAME SCENERIO NO-ROLE INVITATIONS:

I'm still only getting 41%. I did a regression on my problem areas. Here they are. (Enumerates) Will you kindly address these factors.

I have a great deal of respect for my friend George as a handicapper. I took my problems to him but he could not supply answers.

I know others have solved my problems. Here's what they are. (enumerates)

I read a letter in Phillips from someone saying he was having problems with Ultrascan adjustments. I'm having difficulty in this area, too. Would you please cover this ground.

ARE WE NIT PICKING OVER PHRASEOLOGY?

No. We answer all questions as IF they were posed adult to adult. This is our only hope of getting an Adult Ego State learning response. When questions are asked in an adapted child ego state it is safe to assume that our response will be received in the adapted child ego state. This is not conducive to accurate learning. For this reason we frequently answer the question twice. FIRST in Child, jokingly. This is intended to cathect the Child of the asker in hopes of alerting his/her Little Professor who will then cathect adult so that our secondary response will be accurately perceived. We have imparted more pertinent information through the Child Ego State than we have through Adult in PARENT.

The main barrier to learning the Methodology (or anything else) lies in the difficulty most people have in cathecting their adult. Parent in Child Ego state is often mistaken for Adult and hence becomes a substitute for many.

Cathecting the Child is far more simple since, in essence, the child within us all does the cathecting. I'm speaking of Natural Child aided by the Little Professor, not Adapted Child. Get into a 'let's have fun and games' Ego State and you'll discover learning the Methodology is relatively simple. Your little professor is just waiting to show you how to get 70% winners with an average mutual of \$1240.

All games have objectives, rules and scoring procedures. This is as true in a life-game as it is in football or baseball. While games CAN be played for just the fun of it, without regard for the outcome, this seldom happens. Both LG and Alcoholic are played for a definite payoff: STROKES. Recognition. I ~~don't~~ like the word 'strokes' because it does not seem sufficiently powerful to convey what it truly means. But since we are stuck with it, let's focus on its true significance.

We come into this world with no conscious knowledge of ourselves or of our social environment. Our physical needs are as one with our physical environment. We require food, shelter and, because of our post-natal helplessness, protection. These are provided by parents or surrogates and constitute our initial strokes. Our brain has now accepted the message that we are dependent upon others of our species for survival and survival is our first and possibly ONLY instinct. This is EROS: The life force.

Shortly after birth and before conscious memory, we experience some momentary threat to EROS. It can be hunger because the need for food wasn't immediately answered; discomfort from soiled diapers; the crib blanket covering our breathing apparatus; a foot caught in a sheet. Because these are our first terrors they are cataclysmic. We have seen light, hence darkness, once so comforting in the womb, becomes a source of fear.

We cry out in anguish and our needs are met.

Interpersonal dependency becomes firmly and permanently embedded in our new brain. The first seed planted in that fertile garden was NEED; the second was gratification. These two plants will never die until the brain dies. They will persist over all the other varieties in the garden. Need will flourish without water or tilling. So will Gratification. But without proper care the potentially sublime flower of gratification can become a grotesque weed, distorted, perverted and twisted beyond recognition. When this happens it seeks need sources that are similarly perverse. Sadism and Masochism in pathological form are results of this process.

Psychopathology is the end game, the final gambit, the ultimate withdrawal from interpersonal need fulfillment. Functional (no brain damage) insanity is the ONLY game that can be played alone since the brain has allowed the player to divide his/her persona into several players. Catatonia is the return to the womb where all needs are supplied. Schizophrenia is the ultimate internal dialogue and Paranoíá the grandest stroke of them all.

Psychosis is the Superbowl of Games.

All other life-games are minor-league versions that are sufficiently imitative of the Big Game to get the players to the Superbowl if they really want to work at it.

Alcoholic and LG are weed forms of the genera Need/Gratification and are a (initially) non-pathological variety of Sado-Masochism.

As with all manifestations that are contrary to ultimate human potential, they stem from stroke deprivation real or perceived; and are adaptations devised by our growing brain in order to satisfy our ever growing hunger for strokes which in themselves create an insatiable appetitite.

It is unfortunate but necessary that all schools of psychology and psychiatry hold parent figures responsible for behavior problems and disorders. Many individuals resist therapy because they object to the implication that their mommies and daddies might have been witches and ogres. This why I use the word "perceived" in regard to stroke deprivation for it is not what the parent figures actually did or failed to do, it is the individual's PERCEPTION of parental influence that is the dynamic.

Parental strokes are like the proverbial Chinese meal: an hour later, you're hungry again.

When clients do go into therapy they ultimately reveal a love/hate ambivalence for their parents. Gestalt Therapy clients, visualizing parents in empty chairs, scream invectives; and, imagining parent figures as pillows, beat them unmercifully. Stroke need and feelings of deprivation are the strongest motivating force in human behavior. Once you accept this we can treat LG which is the specific purpose of this dissertation.

MOMENTARY NIRVANA

Like the effects of the first drink, the wager, be it big or small provides temporary Nirvana: a glimpse at the infinite. Or, as the protagonist in THE LOST WEEKEND said, 'a ride on Cleopatra's Barge, a view from the top of Everest, Residence in the Taj Mahal.' Life begins with the walk to the teller window. Anticipatory delight grows as post time draws near. They're off and running and, the wagering ticket, symbol of power - that marvelous stroke- is clutched in hand. The finish line; either death or life anew. Like Bull Fighting it is ritualistic.

PARADISE FANTASY

The Paradise Fantasy is a life script within a life script. In the game of alcohol the stimulant itself opens the doorway to fantasy. The rationale for the game of alcohol is escape, punishment or vindication. It is the same in the game of LG but is disguised as a means of augmenting income through low cost, high yield investments. Here is where the social dynamic of the Alcohol and LG games differ. An LG can play indefinitely by convincing the other players: wife, lover, friends, et al, that monetary profit is the desired payoff.

To sustain the game, some kind of system or method becomes a requisite. Millions of these are sold each year with no positive effect on LG who will buy new ones periodically in order to support the game. The systems or methods may or may not have intrinsic value. It matters little to IT because LG is the game, NOT horseracing itself.

By purchasing and attempting to use a system or method the LG has **prolonged** the life of the game by demonstrating him/herself to be a Handicapper instead of a gambler.

At THIS POINT the LG player becomes vulnerable.

The LG player might have found a method that, through his/her own application, produces a consistent win cycle.

IT is now faced with a choice. Continue applying the win procedure and become a WINNER, or return to the LG game. WINNER is an unknown, uncharted area; it is also very lonely. The LG player USUALLY returns to the game matrix.

"IT WORKED FOR A FEW WEEKS AND THEN SUDDENLY QUIT ON ME."
This is the universal cry. I see it in letter after letter to Phillips Newsletter; systems that worked for awhile then suddenly were no longer effective. The system didn't stop working. The system user did. Anything that will work for a few straight weeks has sufficient seeds of merit to provide an informational base from which subsequent success can be negotiated. LG players always manage to tamper with any system shortly after "giving it a try" so that any intrinsic value it might have is destroyed by the LG player. The rationale is "working to improve it." The motive is: "Excuse to go back to the game."

LG SYMPTOMA

LG players generally display some very distinguishing symptoms.

BODY LANGUAGE

Because they are functioning in the Adapted Child Ego State their body language is that of a child imitating an Adult.

RIGIDITY

Children think of parents as rigid, inflexible creatures. So, in imitation they carry themselves in such a manner.

PARENT WITHIN CHILD BEHAVIOR

The Free Child/Little Professor are squelched so the **Parent** within Child-Adapted Child Ego State makes pronouncements. LG players will often make more absolute, definitive, presented-as-fact statements between two races than a winner will in a month.

A casual observer would have to be astonished at hearing so much misinformation coming from one person in so short a span.

INABILITY TO CATHECT CHILD EGO STATE

PARENTAL STROKE REPLACEMENT CENTER

Both alcohol and gambling provide us with an instant source of stroke need gratification. The obvious narcotic, hallucinatory effects of alcohol as a physical stimulant are easy to come by and socially acceptable. In most areas of the U.S. Horseracing is the only legal form of gambling. The race is the spectacle. Betting is the true lure and is as heady a narcotic as alcohol.

There are those who love racing because they love horses. They are not the subject here.

The universal appeal of gambling, be it on horses, roulette or the stock market, is that it pits eros against thanatos. Life force vs. death wish. The thrill of the hunt or chase; risk, flirting with danger are favorite literary themes because they are projections of the theme of life itself. Contemporary psychology calls it "fear of intimacy." Intimacy is supposedly that sublime state between humans where the animus and anima, the yang and yin form a perfect union. I seriously doubt if any of the psychologists who write about it ever experienced it. Freud called it "substitute erotic activity." To Freud virtually everything was substitute erotic activity. Again, he was probably correct. Sex as a subject is the first of the great taboos confronting an infant.

SUBSTITUTE EROTIC ACTIVITY

There are those who dwell on the act of sex itself as the life force; but generally speaking it is considered a prime expression of the life force. The orgasm, or whatever passes for it in a given individual's life, is momentary death. Since Adam and Eve, more fear and anxiety has been attached to the simple human sex act than to anything else. Guilt, shame and fear of inadequacy, as instilled by parental messages, have contributed more to substitute activities than all other factors combined. Alcohol and LG are two noteworthy substitutes. My experience in working with elderly handicappers who manage better than any others to overcome LG, has me convinced that they have found a viable substitute for their youthful sex drive.

PEER GROUP

Aside from our own there have been a number of excellent studies of Horseplayer attitudes and behavior. One by Ceci and Liker of Cornell University confirms our own findings that while WINNERS may share with a peer group their process of selection, and analysis, their true ACT of selection and wagering is done in the cloister of loneliness. Exceptions to this would be syndicates of professionals who invest heavily in multiple exotics. The Cornell study also shows that Losers and Non-Winners tend to make both handicapping and wagering decisions in group settings

GROUP PROCESS SELECTION VS. DECISION

We have ample evidence from our own seminars that the Group Process is a positive force in selecting horses most likely to win. Mark Cramer, Horseracing Editor for Gambling Times, conducts a group selection seminar every Saturday before the races. In both of these examples, however, the groups were led by an authority figure who subtly kept the group rudder on course. In both cases, when the group broke up and betting time came, very few members of the group were "on" the winning horse. Group process handicapping without a strong and capable authority figure is almost always disastrous. Two, possibly three exceptionally good handicappers may form a union with division of duties providing their ego state cathexis is in perfect symbiosis. Unfortunately typical groups are structured on the basis of misery loves company and are dominated by the most negative force in the group. The LG peer group is synonymous with Alcoholic's bar room crony group and presents a feeding trough for the LG game.

THE COMPANY OF LOSERS/DRUNKS

GROUP PROTECTION AS SUBSTITUTE FOR PARENTAL PROTECTION

This is a key factor in the game of LG. Deviation from group standards can bring banishment. Rejection is the hardest to bear of all human emotions. The snobbery of loser groups is far more pronounced than that of the elite; as is the snobbery of the proletariat and the ruffians who beat up on the kid who gets all A's.

FEAR OF LONLINESS LOSS OF PEER SUPPORT

Keeps the LG player from making any serious attempt to put his/her system or method to effective use. WHEN THE ENTIRE GROUP IS MAKING AN ALLEGED ATTEMPT AT USING A GIVEN METHOD they make it fail by a tacit undercurrent of agreement.

ALONE IN THE CROWD

In every study of horse bettors to date, the winner was a minority figure who, while not anti-social, was perceived as being alone in the crowd, keeping his/her own counsel and making decisions without reference to outside opinion. The winner neither sought nor gave advice.

I have yet to meet a true professional - except for the aforementioned wagering syndicates-who made a consistent profit from handicapping who did not make his final selections and wagering decisions ALONE and without any peer support or interference. Fear is contagious. Fear of fear even more so. Only the adult, emotionless computer Ego State is immune to the atmosphere of anxiety. When one cannot or will not catch this Ego State, winning will always be elusive.

LG players in the Pirco Associate Member group are less common than in society in general but it would be self-deception to suggest that they did not exist. Our purpose is to get them to stop playing the LG game by exposing them to themselves through this medium. The main underlying theme in the LG game and script is: "I'm Trying."

THRILL OF "TRYING"

"I'm trying" is the cry of the infant who is in reality asking a parent figure to accomplish the task for him/her. "trying" and "trying harder" are key phrases in diagnosing game players. The phrases are used repeatedly and are often followed by, "but you gotta realize I'm a slow learner." This is because the typical parental retort to the "trying" syndrome is, "Johnny is sure a slow learner." It didn't have to be verbalized. Many a teacher said it with facial expression while awaiting a classroom paper. Most people are truly shocked to learn that "trying hard" is a misdemeanor. It is frequently a life-long servant and to discard it is like throwing away an old Teddy Bear.

SISYPHUS SYNDROME

Is the result of an "Try Harder" game script. Rolling the stone almost to the top of the mountain only to have it roll back on us at the moment of triumph is classic and characterizes the "non-winner" life-script.

THE ENEMY I HAVE ME THE ENEMY AND IT IS ME

Destroying this enemy is the only way to heal alcoholism and to get the LG player out of the game and off the Drama Triangle.

The enemy is fear disguised in many faces. Fear is fear of death. Death is stroke denial and rejection. Since all strokes subsequent to the very first ones were gained through adaptation, only by altering unhealthy adaptation processes can we destroy the enemy.

Information alone cannot replace fear. Information received in the Adapted Child Ego State is merely distorted through re-adaptation. The solution lies in abandoning the Contaminated Child Ego state; decathecting it in favor of the Natural Child/Little Professor combine, cathecting Adult when necessary and becoming autonomous.

LOOKING FOR DIFFERENT STROKES

Strokes will be no less necessary for survival. But they will be different strokes coming from the here and now; from reality not fantasy. Reality strokes demand more strokes. This is why success breeds success.

CAN IT REALLY BE THAT SIMPLE

It can be to anyone willing to take the chance. The supreme risk of cutting the umbilical cord joining them to Witch/Ogre symbiosis.

EGO STATE EXERCISES

PERMISSION is the therapeutic word. Permission from without to give yourself permission to decathect Adapted Child.

The first prescription is laughter. Get into a Free Child Ego State and laugh yourself silly. Let your Natural Child-accompanied by your Little Professor-have free reign. Once they have a REAL taste of freedom they will be reluctant to let old Adaptive take control again. All of YOU must join in the laughter. Above all, don't just try to do it. DO IT!

SUCCESSFUL HANDICAPPING

**MUST BE DONE IN AN ADULT EGO STATE GIVING FREE ACCESS TO
THE "LITTLE PROFESSOR!".
DEMANDS NO EGO STATE CHANGE WHEN AT THE TRACK AND BETTING.**

All-too often we hear that "It works on Paper but NOT at the track."
This is because when alone at home, just you and your computer, you are functioning in an Adult Ego State giving free-access to your Little professor. The circus-like ambience of the track creates an external threat against which you call on your Adapted Child to cope. The Adapted Child is filled with every anxiety and fear that was ever enjoined upon you. IT cannot make accurate predictions or Adult analysis. You have decathected the Ego States that can make accurate decisions for you, and left yourself at the mercy of the Witches and Ogres who caused you to adapt in order to get the strokes that were yours by NATURAL child right.

SUCCESSFUL WAGERING

**DONE FROM THE SAME EGO STATE AS SUCCESSFUL HANDICAPPING
THE CIRCUS-LIKE AMBIENCE OF TRACK AND/OR BETTING PARLOR TEND
TO CATHECT THE PARENT CONTAMINATED CHILD EGO STATE.**

Perhaps you have overcome the first obstacle and have been able to cathect enough ADULT to survive the selection process. You have the Winners in hand but fail to bet them correctly if at all. Your cry of anguish is, "I had 7 out of nine but lost money!!" This is as common as the first phenomenon. Money Management is also a learned skill and must be done in the same Adult Ego State. Bypassing Parent injunctions here is even more important because money is involved. Parental Injunctions on this subject are usually very strong. "To think how hard I work." How I skimp and save...." Your Adapted Child is working very hard to stay in control as Executor at this point. Refrain from large wagers until you KNOW that you can decathect the Adapted Child and Put the ADULT EGO state in Charge. Ask your Little Professor for help.. Laugh Adapted Child off the premises. Don't listen to Parent oriented money management schemes: Doubling up, due columns, et al. Use a sound plan that passes Adult/Little Professor examination.

You may have noted that ALL LOSER responses are the result of Punitive Parent and Adapted Child Ego State functions and that WINNER Response is generated from from Adult, Free Child and Adult within Child Ego States.

Our use of the word WINNER is specific to to subject at hand: Thoroughbred Racing. Many winners in the game of life itself succeed by functioning only in the Contaminated, Adapted Child Ego State, Cheating, lying, stealing, murdering, plundering are all adaptive forms of behavior. This is why Horse Racing is a microcosm of Ideal Life as opposed to real life. Ideal Life is a state where reward is given for accomplishment within a logical, orderly and non-malignant frame structure in which payoff is the measure of true achievement rather than perceived achievement. Winning must be actual fact and not disguised as fact by any force other than the results on the tote board.

OTHER life games declare winners on the basis of fantasy and fiction posing as fact, subject to warping and manipulation.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT TO MENTORSERIC BERNE, M.D.

Beginning in 1955 and continuing until his death in 1970, Eric Berne re-wrote Freudian Psychology and, quite probably, improved upon it. The Freudian triumvir consisted of Freud, Jung and Adler. Eric's consisted of himself, Claude Steiner and Ray Poindexter...and later, Steve Karpman, who conceived the drama triangle. Berne and his followers re-defined and demystified the Freudian Super-ego, Ego and Id; giving them new meaning as ego states characterized by behavior manifestations emanating from PARENT, ADULT and CHILD. From Adler's Inferiority-superiority complex studies and his Over-Compensation concepts came GAMES. Adler also contributed to SCRPT theory with his writings on Life-styles; but the mainspring for advanced Script Analysis is Carl Jung and his brilliant works on Archetypes, Racial Memory and the Collective Unconscious. Little can be done to improve upon Jung. But two out of three isn't bad at all.

T R A N S A C T I O N A L A N A L Y S I S

(Child prodigy of Psychoanalysis)

Is the name that Berne gave to his new "school" of psychology. He demanded that its nomenclature consist of simple words in common useage that would be easily understandable to the lay person. This was both the strength and the ultimate weakness of Transactional Analysis. Because of its overt simplicity, simple-minded persons with no depth or background in fundamentals began practicing Berne's concepts as therapists and teachers. Corporations embraced it to increase sales and to better customer-employee relations.

While Berne opposed -and forbade- Practitioner, client physical "touching," his neo-followers produced the "touchie-feeelie" school of therapy characterized by giving Strokes in the form of backrubs and even sexual contact.

The end result was a decline in the influence of Transactional Analysis where it is needed most: serious professional circles. This unfortunate scenario notwithstanding, TRANSACTIONAL ANALYSIS, in pure form, remains the most viable contribution to Psychology in the second half of the twentieth century.

I am constantly amazed at the number of clients who insist on tampering with their computer programs, adding, deleting, weighting, supposedly refining what took so many months of testing and research to produce. While I am cognizant of the fact that it is man's nature to tinker, I would suggest that you tinker with our programs and instructions with the full awareness that everything you could do has already been tried, tested and discarded in favor of what we have provided you with:

**"IF IT

DON'T FIX IT"**

We have on record many cases where clients ignored this old sticht and wound up losing badly. Unfortunately they forgot that they were NOT using our programs but their own adaptations and "improvements." Ultrascan, especially, has brought out people's inclinations to tamper. Many cannot accept read-outs that favor slower animals over faster ones; they go against the figures and they lose. Nothing in this Methodology is perfidious. Every aspect has a positive purpose based NOT on theory or personal opinion but on FACT. Our goal is singular: To Make

YOU A WINNER

MONEY MANAGEMENT: Whether your win proficiency is 55% or 80% is secondary to HOW you invest your money. Trying to eschew the two horse win wager concept may work for awhile in streaks, but in the long run betting a fixed % of bankroll as prescribed is optimal!


