PRIORITIES

An assortment of physicians and a surgeon have made it clear to me that if I wish to see Michael Pizzolla's 7th state of handicapping consciousness come to fruition -(Phase VII, Synthesis)- I had better reexamine my priorities. It seems I am currently living Phase VI of the Methodology: DECELERATION. My Phase V ENERGY shows a deficiency Late. My Median is still good for sprints but over a mile I fade in the stretch. These M.D.'s have proved to be pretty good trainers, so I'm inclined to go along with their program. They'll enter me only in short Allowance races up to a mile carded for entrants 60 years old and above. I've always run for small purses, so that will be no problem. They still think I have some intellectual stud value, however, so my progeny - the Charter Members - can carry the bloodline into the next century.

What this means, in short, is that I have to apply my Total Energy quotient to the areas in which I am most valuable to YOU. This, I feel, is research, development AND continued dedication to working with clients in the area of personal psychotherapy to eliminate the psychological roadblocks to success.

With the advent of ENERGY!, we have reached a milestone in our development. No procedure EVER devised by ANYONE has even approached ENERGY'S demonstrated capacity. The Triumph of Saratoga

Maybe it's just a trick of memory, but it does seem to me that we get better at giving seminars all the time. This year, with the Trackside Clinics, we seem to have done a lot of them. I attended every one, and at least in my mind, Saratoga was the best of the lot. We reviewed old concepts and presented new information.

New clients who were just starting made 6 months progress in one weekend. Those using Phase III and Synergism II profited, and those testing ENERGY! had a special session just for their problems. During the week after the seminar, I talked to a dozen or more who attended and the response was universal: it was the best ever.

The real proof came on Monday, after the end of the official seminar, when most of us went to the Queen of tracks for what turned out to be a royal day at the races. Saratoga is known as a "tough" track, a "favorites graveyard." Maybe, but after the 4th race, 5 different clients told me that they had already paid for the weekend; seminar, hotel, travel and all.

The card wasn't anything special. In fact, Michael and I offered to review two races for those going to the track before the bus left, and we had a hard time finding two races we liked. Not only did we nail both races, including one that paid \$19.80, but we went on to have one of the best days ever. Bert Mayne, who had been up late the night before helping his parents start repairs after a serious fire in their home, said he was too tired to really handicap. Besides, he had to look after his 7 year old daughter at the track. He was just going to fool around and have fun. By the time he left, he could hardly walk, his wallet was so heavy.

Even Howard, a child of the depression who rarely bets more than \$20, was making \$50 bets and leaking \$100 bills. (You can make money just following Howard around a racetrack on a good day. He drops as much as most of us make.) Michael was putting on his own personal ENERGY! clinic at one table, while Tom Brohamer was racking them up with Phase III at another. It was raining money, and we all had buckets.

In fact, that day at Saratoga turned out so well, we've decided to make it the centerpiece of our first new manual in more than a year. What we're going to do is present the races for you to work, then walk through each of them. Any given race may be analyzed by several PIRCO Charter members or the Doc himself, each with his own unique perspective. You'll get race analysis from handicappers using all of our programs. Each race will be analyzed using both Synergism II and ENERGY!.

Establishing Energy Parameters

For the past few weeks, I have been privileged to read parts of the rough draft of the book Tom Brohamer is writing for William Morrow. Based on what I have seen, it should be the absolutely best book on handicapping available to the general public, period. Nothing even comes close.

I have prevailed on Tom to rewrite small portions of the book, converting his general handicapping terms into the specific language of the Sartin Methodology, and he has most graciously complied. We'll print bits and pieces when we can until the book is ready.

Tom's book should be on everyone's "Must Have" list. It is the first book available outside the Methodology that is truly useful to everyone using any aspect of the Methodology. Phase III users, Synergism users, ENERGY! users; all will find this book both a fascinating and a profitable read.

Percent Median is most effective when used as a supplementary factor in the handicapping process. Generally, it will not stand alone, but is most effective in selecting and separating contenders. % Median will seldom isolate who to play, but can be deadly accurate in eliminating non-contenders.

Day to day application is dependent upon the handicapper understanding the nature of his racetrack. The pace handicapper's advantage lies in an accurate perception of local demands. The task is to establish accurate parameters. Fortunately, that's relative easy and not too time consuming. Once established, they can be maintained with only five to ten minutes work a day.

The Procedure:

- Using the results charts, calculate the Energy expenditure of the previous day's winners.
- 2) Separate sprints, routes and turf races, and add each to the appropriate cumulative base. At some racetracks, it may be necessary to separate the various distances within the same distance structure. i.e. keep the three sprint distances separate, etc.
- 3) Calculate the highs and lows for each category and set the boundaries on each side. Do not use aberrant races, and be alert to changes from the norm.

PRACTICAL EXERCISE ESTABLISHING ENERGY PARAMETERS DEL MAR SPRINTS

Each racetrack has certain definite characteristics that can be anticipated at the beginning of each season. Santa Anita route winners average a % Median Energy output of about 68.30%. Sprints average around 69.20%. That's consistent from season to season, but not from week to week. Weather and maintenance activity often cause significant changes or biases.

When that occurs, upsets prevail, and most handicappers complain about the lack of form. It will pay to stay in touch with the everyday status of the surface. Two or three days of data is usually enough to establish acceptable boundaries. Two year-old and most maiden races should be excluded from your database.

Let's take a look at a typical race from Del Mar:

FIRST RACE Del Mar AUGUST 13, 1989 7 FURLONGS. (128%) CLAIMING. Purse \$15,000. 3-year-olds and upward. Weights, 3year-olds, 116 lbs.; older, 121 lbs. Hon-winners of two races since June 15 allowed 3 lbs.; of a race since then, 5 lbs. Claiming price \$16,000; for each \$1,000 to \$12,000 allowed 1 lb. (Races when entered for \$12,500 or less not considered). 17th DAY, WEATHER CLEAR, TEMPERA-TURE 81 DEGREES.

Value of race \$15,000; value to winner \$2,250; second \$3,000; third \$2,250; fourth \$1,125; fifth \$375. Multiel pool \$3\$7,397.

POLYSEMOUS, outrun early and wide down the backstretch, came into the stretch four wide, railied to get the lead in the final sixteenth and proved best. EXPLODED JR., close up early, vied for the lead on the far turn, battled for command in the drive and gained the place. PAIN made the early pace, vied for the lead on the far turn and battled for command in the drive before weakening a bit in the final sixteenth. CHIEF PAL, close up early, threatened approaching the stretch while three wide but could not sustain his bid in the drive. SAFETY ROAD, never far tack, lacked the needed response in the last quarter. GALLIC WRITER broke slowly. STERLING EXCHANGE, wide down the backstretch, was five wide into the stretch. BUCKET HEAD was four wide into the stretch. TONY AGLO forced the early pace and gave way. FLEET FORM broke stowly and showed little.

The information from the first race looks like this:

(B.L. = beaten lengths at the first and second calls. Since the <u>Winner's</u> Energy exertion is being measured, there are never any final beaten lengths.)

The race was for older \$16,000 claiming horses at seven furlongs. The winner was Polysemous, rallying from off the pace. His position at the first call was 5th, 4 lengths off the lead. At the second call, he was 6th, still 4 lengths back. His Total Energy output was 68.16% expended at the second call.

Let me add some races from the two day's charts on either side of the 13th.

Our mini-database consists of 9 sprints at distances of 6, 6.5 and 7 furlongs, and is already large enough to provide conclusions about Del Mar racing.

The first conclusion is that three year-olds are still too immature to compete with their elders. The three races for 3YO's indicate a lack of finishing ability. Their % Medians were 69.76, 69.19 and 69.48. This is not a unique situation and is even more pronounced in the early part of the racing year. Three year-olds should be excluded from our main database and moved to one of their own.

A second conclusion can also be drawn. The winner's average beaten lengths at the second call demonstrates no real bias in running styles, except to perhaps eliminate the truly deep closers who try to come from 7 or 8 back. The % Median does indicate a slight preference for sustained pace, but horses may still go wire to wire.

- 1) 68.16%
- 2) 68.59%
- 3) 68.57%
- 4) 67.84%
- 5) 68.44%
- 6) 68.82%

6 races averaged: 68.40%

Range of performance: 67.84% to 68.82%

Range of acceptable performance: 68.16% to 68.82%. Deletes the aberrant 67.84% race.

5 races averaged: 68.51

The range of performance is set to capture the highest number of winners while eliminating as many entries as possible. Admittedly, this database is very small, but it does accurately reflect the 1989 Del Mar surface at the mid-point of the meeting. The 67.84% at 6 1/2 furlongs (race 4) was eliminated as an apparent aberration. Del Mar sprinters very seldom win with that number. The larger base confirms the conclusion. The Energy range for the meeting was consistently between 68.15% and 69.20%, with the ideal expenditure around 68.70%.

OK, let's put this new found information to work. The following race was run on August 20, 1989.

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The target Energy par (average) from our database was 68.70%. Horses near that number should be given preference in the selection process. The range we are looking for is 68.15% to 69.20%. I've indicated the pacelines I used.

Survive - A late running sprinter who shows no ability in the middle fraction of her races. She absolutely needs the Early pace and Pressers to stop in front of her to have any chance of winning. Both her wins were on an off track.

Super Avie - A nice filly with a Presser running style.

Table Frolic - Another late runner with no turn time ability.

This type of horse is at the mercy of the Early pace runners.

Kool Arrival - A top class three year old with an abundance of Early pace.

Skeeter - The layoff appears to have cured her faint heart. She rated kindly in her last, gained on the turn, and then went on to win. A very strong contender.

Defend Your Man - She seems badly outclassed. We'll leave her out of this.

Hasty Pasty - She was sharp for several races, but is now coming off two turf sprints, a 38 day layoff, and no works in 28 days. I tossed her out.

Miss Brio - Her presence is why this race should be especially attractive to the bettor. She's a top class mare, and earlier in the season was at the top or her division. Minor injuries have undoubtedly kept her out of recent racing. This is not her best distance, her condition's a question mark, and it is doubtful she is well meant here. Make it a practice to play against this kind of horse.

Behind the Scenes - A deep closer. Unlike most late running sprinters, she can move on the turn. She doesn't appear to be at her best, however.

Since the pacelines are all from Del Mar, % Median numbers are much more reliable, and current condition more dependable. Whenever pacelines are taken from today's surface, you can put much more faith in using the numbers without making any allowances or adjustments.

Let's take a look at what good ol' Phase III tells us. I'll look at the race completely raw.

In the past, when I've written about ESP running styles, I've always stressed analyzing a race in light of probable positions. The Early pace horses have to be identified first. They have the greatest effect on the eventual outcome. Kool Arrival is the only truly dedicated Early horse in this field. Skeeter's best style is to press the pace and come on late. The early lead must certainly go to Kool Arrival.

Velocity analysis shows Kool Arrival with a comfortable lead at the first call. She then extends her lead over the horses that can be close to her with a 58.97 Turn Time fraction. Only Behind the Scenes and Skeeter make a slight impact on the turn. Kool Arrival will be tough here. Now, let's examine the race in light of % Median.

Kool Arrival - Her 68.89% is very close to the target par of 68.70%. She's an almost perfect fit for the race. Her pace advantage would disappear if her % Median Energy expenditure was above the parameters for the distance. That's not the case here.

Super Avie - 69.06%. Her velocity figures are weaker than the other contenders. She does, however, have a definite strength. While her % Median expenditure pushes the upper limits of our range; in light of the late expenditure of the other contenders, she may have a secondary pace advantage. By distributing her Energy in an earlier manner than the others, she'll be closer to the early pace. She'll be in the "garden spot" to pick up a large share of the purse.

A unique feature of the Median Energy concept is that Energy expenditure often overcomes a deficit in pure velocity. When coupled with a velocity advantage (as with Kool Arrival), it can be overwhelming.

Skeeter - 68.36%. Her last win was aided by a pace battle. The 22.0 first call was followed by a turn time of 22.2! That strongly suggests Kool Arrival was asked for too much following her layoff. Skeeter's Energy expenditure, while within the parameters, is probably too late to win here. If she's asked for more Early pace, it will compromise her best style. The more total Energy that is expended Early, the less is available for a late run.

Survive - 68.28%. This horse epitomizes the one-run sprinter. She will lose ground to this field on the turn. She represents a

very weak bet under the best of circumstances. When this kind of horse occasionally beats you, just shrug it off and go on. Only on certain tracks, and under certain conditions, should she be bet. Her Energy number is acceptable; it's her style that's suspect.

Table Frolic - 67.95%. This is too late an Energy expenditure to be effective on this track. At Belmont Park she might be tough, but at this time in Southern California she'll need too much help from the pacesetters.

Behind the Scenes - 66.54%. She's not really in her best. form, and the % Median number is more likely to win a turf route rather than a dirt sprint. She may very well want to route.

In the final analysis, by virtue of superior Early Pace numbers, running style and % Median expenditure, we keep coming back to Kool Arrival. There is no stronger pace selection than this filly.

An interesting point in the outcome of the race is the finish position of Super Avie. A demonstration that running style can often overcome velocity numbers. That should not be surprising. The theme of the entire Methodology is pace analysis. Here is another case of the speed figure horse being beaten; this time for place.

Keeping a Step Ahead of the Pace

andicapping the horses is a complex art, and one of the most complex factors in the process is pace. How does the speed at which a horse runs the early stages of a race affect his final performance? If a horse can run the first half-mile in 46 seconds and finish six furlongs in 1:11, what will happen to him when he is forced to battle for the lead in 45 seconds?

Serious students of the game can debate pace-related issues at length, so it is attention-grabbing when Tom Brohamer, a Los Angeles-based handicapper, declares, "I think we've taken care of most of the pace riddle." This is like hearing somebody say, casually, that he's figured out how to correct the greenhouse effect or balance the national budget.

Brohamer was serious. He has been playing the horses for 20 years, and he recently took an eearly retirement from Pacific Bell—where most of his work involved computers and data—with the intention of devoting even more of his time to the thoroughbred game. He is at work on a book, "Modern Pace Handicapping," which is due to be published by William Morrow in 1990. But unlike some mathematically inclined handicappers who are ivory-tower theorists, Brohamer is a pragmatist whose racetrack friends and colleagues respect his ability to turn theory into practice at the betting windows.

Brohamer's early evolution as a handicapper resembled that of many contemporary horseplayers. He was intrigued by speed handicapping, started to calculate his own speed figures and found them a powerful tool. But he came to realize—as do most speed handicappers—that the final time of a race doesn't tell everything about a horse's ability. "So many high-figure horses kept getting beat," he said, "and it was almost always a matter of their not being able to keep up early."

Brohamer began to study pace. He became entranced by the theories of Howard Sartin, a theorist on the subject whose esoteric writings have attracted something of a cult following. But as the Sartin group has become more and more esoteric and involved with computers, Brohamer has remained more practical, so that his upcoming book might well make him America's guru of pace handicapping.

Consider a hypothetical six-furlong race at

Laurel. Horse A has run the distance in his last start in 1:11%. Horses B and C ran in 1:11%, D in 1:11%. Traditional speed handicappers would prefer Horse A—he's the fastest. But Brohamer would break down each of the horse's races into times for each quarter mile in this fashion:

Who's the best horse? Contrary to the evidence of the final time, Brohamer says Horse C would be a cinch in this matchup.

Brohamer argues that a horse's ability to run two consecutive strong fractions is one of the keys to pace analysis. "Any horse who can control two of the three fractions is usually a good play," he said. In the above example, both A and B can run a fast quarter mile, but they are essentially finished after that. Horse C can run a good first quarter and an excellent middle quarter of :23 flat. "I call the middle quarter in a sprint 'turn time' and it's very important," Brohamer said. "A horse who's unfit is just not going to run well on the turn. Better horses can beat the pants off you in the second quarter; the difference of a couple of lengths there is very significant."

To facilitate comparing horses who have run at different distances, Brohamer translates each horse's fractional times into feet per second, and adjusts it according to the condition of the track. Horse C's last race would look like this to Brohamer:

57.88 57.40 51.16

This may sound a bit unfamiliar and eccentric, but Brohamer said: "Feet per second are far more graphic. You can look at these figures and visualize a race very well." Armed with analyses of races in feet per second, Brohamer then studies the peculiarities of an individual track, trying to define its biases in mathematical terms. If the track gives an edge to horses with early speed, or late speed, he knows it. In general, though, he says that "the last fraction is the worst evaluator of a horse's chances." Early speed is paramount, especially if it is the right kind of early speed-distributed evenly over two different fractions of a race. Even if a horseplayer is not prepared to deal with all the intricacies of pace handicapping, this insight alone might be a very valuable one.

Tom Brohamer had some comments to make expanding on the content of this article. Since he is hard at work meeting Wm. Morrow Publishers deadline for his forthcoming book: Modern Pace Handicapping, he entrusted a written translation to me.

I certainly appreciate Andrew Beyer focusing his precious newspaper space on an interview with me. We met at Hollywood Park toward the end of the meet. Since his column imposes a word limitation, he could only publish the bare bones of our interview. The point I was trying to make is that a TURN TIME move, like the one made by horse C, almost always spells disaster for confirmed front-runners like A & B, who must have the early lead in order to win.

The nature of the running lines suggests that all THREE of these horses won wire to wire. This is an unreal and highly unlikely situation. However, if we follow this guideline we would still favor C looking at a raw Phase III readout.

If we accept my stipulation that only A & B were confirmed front runners, C's big move on the turn would eliminate B entirely as a play. B's 3rd fraction when winning on the lead is 26.1. If pressed at the 2nd call, the Methodology has consistently

demonstrated that a horse like B will fold and run, at best, a 26.4 final fraction. A's win on the lead offers a better final fraction of 26 even. History tells us that against B's early pressure and C's turn time move, A would most likely give up at least a fifth of a second and go 26.1+. About 65% of the time C would be the winner in the ensuing A, C matchup. That's good enough for my play.

A more realistic approach to this race is to depict A and B as inveterate front runners. C as an Early Presser and D as a Sustained, come from behind horse. To show this properly requires the addition of beaten lengths.

Here is a more realistic line PACE OF RACE: 22.2 - 45.4 - 111.2

- A: wire to wire pace line.
- B: O beaten lengths 1st and 2nd call. 1 Beaten length finish.
- C: Beaten 2 lengths first call. 0 2nd call & finish.
- D: Beaten 6 lengths 1st call, 3 lengths back 2nd call. Beaten 2 lengths at the finish.

This is a more realistic scenaro. In the revised race, ALL of our programs point to C as the prime play in this matchup. Two horse bettors might include A, but, if the public wagered as they usually do when viewing this matchup, C would probably go off at higher odds than A or B and possibly D.

So, I would back my play on C with a place bet twice the size of my win bet. My records - along with Howard's - indicate that C will win this race 65% of the time and place 82% of the time.

We have spent a lot of time with this race to emphasize the importance of a TURN TIME move. Some of you who are winning less consistently than others have failed to grasp the importance of such a move. I hope that Tom's point has influenced your future evaluation of readouts.

Utilize the power of your fractional readouts. Tom's first example, showing the race as run, points away from B and D. That's all you need. Learn to interpret ALL your readouts, paying special attention to TURN TIME (2nd Frac.) The results are worth the effort.

THEORIST???? by Jim "The Hat" Bradshaw

What is a theorist? According to Webster it's "One who forms theories." What is theory? According to Webster - "A supposition explaining something; a doctrine or scheme of things resting merely on speculation; hypothesis; plan or system, as distinguished from the practice."

To call Howard Sartin a mere theorist is blasphemous. It is like calling General George Patton a theorist. It is an insult to suggest that Howard bases the Methodology merely on speculation, when in fact he took it to the trenches and proved that it works.

Is the atomic bomb a theory? Ask the citizens of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Is the Sartin Methodology a theory? If the atomic bomb is only a theory, then the Sartin Methodology merely a theory.

I have been to tracks all across the country with Howard, and I proclaim him to be second to none in handicapping, and in parimutuel investing. He is a wizard at reading the tote board, and making everything possible from each race.

No one person has done more to help individuals earn their income at pari-mutuel investing than Howard Sartin. Ask the hundreds of people to which he has freely and unselfishly devoted his time and money to make them winners. These are not acts of a person who has a theory based merely on speculation, but of a person who practices what he preaches. This alone sets him apart from a theorist.

It has often been said: "Those who can, do; and those who can't, teach." The truth of the matter is that those who do, teach best. Not only has Howard developed a Method that works, but has taught this method to individuals across North America. Myself included.

No he is not a traditional handicapper, nor are his concepts endemic. Maybe this is the reason for the malarky from some of the so called experts. He is sure no theorist. He's a practitioner.

I consider myself to be a durn good handicapper, and all I have learned about handicapping was from Howard and the Sartin Methodology. He will forever be my pundit and Guru. Never will I consider him a theorist, nor a person with a theory.

With the Doc

We've received a great many questions on the subject of keeping a track profile. Happily most of them are answered in this edition's article: THE NEW ENGEN, VELOCITY VERSION. Keeping such a profile from the daily results charts by track, distance and surface has turned MANY clients around; made them winners. It will do so for YOU, too. Incidentally, Seattle area clients: The VALLEY DAILY NEWS is the only regional newspaper that publishes usable daily results charts. It costs a quarter. You'll find it at most newsstands in King and Pierce counties.

The second largest group of questions comes from users of SYNERGISM II who still persist in using impossibly SLOW horses and who go immediately to their sort, ignoring the Dream Race fractional readouts.

When you observe that your 4th and 5th ranked horses keep winning but you always seem to have the winner in your top 5, you are still missing the point. WHO ARE THE OTHER 4 horses in that top 5??? They SHOULD include the best Early horse which has a chance of going all the way, the best Sustained and the Best late. Since Pressers, by our definition, win 67% of all races, you must include the best Presser. When in doubt include the TWO best pressers.

This will give you FIVE entrants and enhance the value of your Brohamer Model. If you will practice your matchup and the YOU CALL THE RACE exercise we published in Follow-Up #16, you'll be wary of including horses that cannot compete in the Match-Up. Too many of you are entering horses just to see what they'll do. Bad procedure.

I have seen Bob Purdy continually get amazing results with Synergism II with Auto Adjust. I just had a session with a man whose last 20 race cycle with Synergism II was 88%. He heeded our advice to use the Fractional Readouts and the actual numbers in making his final decisions. NOT just the sort. His EXACTA proficiency also rose dramatically from extended analysis.

Another little trade secret. To get full value and fewer ties from your DR readout, do the race as prescribed

first, ranking on "W" when in doubt. Then get a SECOND readout by utilizing the program's

capability to let you re-rank by SUSTAINED PACE. SP enhances the viability of DR only. It takes a couple of minutes more, but it's well worth it in minimizing ties in the DR factor.

For the past few months because of illness, surgery, recovery and a general lack of energy, I have been remiss in dealing with individual questions, especially in the area of reviewing races lost be clients. Generally speaking, most of these races could have been successfully analyzed by the clients themselves. When you lose a race, review it. See if there is a pace line that, had you used it, would have turned the race into a win. Reevaluate your readout interpretation.

My experience has been that proper readout interpretation will cure most of your ills. With my diminished energy over the past few months, I have been using the readouts of clients who came up to say hello when I make it to the races. They will testify that in many instances, I made more money with THEIR readouts than they did. We have reprinted the YOU CALL THE RACE exercise in the Follow-Up several times. We'll go on doing so periodically until all of you get the hint that repeating this exercise over and over again will benefit you immeasurably.

Many of you are still guilty of regarding successful handicapping as a mysterious, ephemeral "thing" that can only be solved with a black box. This is not true. Predicting the outcome of a race is a progressive, logical series of steps that anyone not contaminated by myth can do well. Not knowing the value of each readout, regardless of which program you use, is as close to a sin as we can get in our field of endeavor.

Too many of you expect a horse that is number ONE Early to go wire to wire when the contender shows a deficiency in TT, SP & Late. Your Phase III/Synergism readouts begin with FIRST FRACTION performance and continue — in order — to LATE. ALL of our readouts lay the projected running of the race before you. THAT is the way to interpret them. Please stop using readouts as an obstacle to your success. Learn their individual significance in relation to the whole and you will no longer have to begin your letters with plaintive cries for "HELP."

All this, notwithstanding, I do apologize for failing to respond to some of these cries. Jim Bradshaw, who has turned so many losers into consistent winners, will continue this column for me in the next article.

The quintessence of the Sartin Methodology is to make it possible for individuals to win at the racetrack. In order to accomplish this goal, it is necessary to pick true contenders and the proper pace lines for each. I have found that these two areas are the stumbling blocks to success for more clients than any others. More has been written, and more tools provided for these two facets of successful handicapping than any other phases of the Methodology.

For the past few months, Howard and I have spent fourteen days at strange racetracks across the country, and on only one of these days did we fail to make a substantial profit. This success was achieved by entering only the true contenders with proper pace lines into the computer. This didn't happen by serendipity, but by the correct application of the Methodology. The following guidelines were applied to each race: 1) Class/APV, 2) pluses and zeros, 3) E.S.P., 4) PBS, and 5) pace line Match-Up. These tools produced the true contenders, and the proper pace lines.

It seems to me that for the last year, many clients have been going backwards, rather than forwards. This has been caused by improperly applying the tools of the Methodology. Many users have developed a "gamblers mentality," believing that every horse in a race has a "shot." These individuals would be better off playing roulette, where each number does have a chance of coming up.

A third area where people get in trouble is adjustments. It seems that the general public is adjustment happy. They want to adjust every aspect of a race. Not only distance changes and track to track allowances, but adjustments for class, daily variant and I don't know what else. We felt that with the introduction of Synergism, the Match-Up concept and finally ENERGY!, this problem would be solved, but many of you still want to mess around with adjustments and enter your own.

It's like waving a red flag in front of a bull when I get a call informing me that they are getting the contenders in the computer, but that their third or fourth horse is winning all the races. To me, this is saying: "Look, I'm doing great, but the Methodology is failing." In reality, they are making slow horses into contenders, and adjusting them above the faster horses. ENERGY! is a bit more forgiving of this than the velocity programs, but even with a triangulated adjustment, you can still beat the program if you insist on using slow enough horses.

The PBS and third fraction ratings were developed as tools to aid in the selection of contenders, and used as such both are very effective. Please do not misuse these tools and try to base your bets on them. This is reverting to Phase I, or even worse, system play. It is not using the tools as prescribed by the Methodology.

The handicapping profession that you have chosen is not easy, but neither is any other true profession. To become a success, you must study, learn the tools of your trade, and how to properly apply these tools. I would not encourage everyone to become a doctor, attorney, or teacher; and in good conscience I can not encourage everyone to become a professional handicapper. If you are unable to find the true contenders and proper pace lines; and chose to blame the Methodology instead of your own shortcomings, the best advice I can give you is to find some other profession. The Methodology is for WINNERS.

This is not to imply that most of you are having difficulty with the Methodology. We have hundreds of clients who are making their living at the track. They have learned the Methodology and how to correctly apply its tools. Those of you who are having trouble should return to the beginning, and correctly learn the Methodology.

There are many avenues to assist the novice, and those individuals who are sincere in their desire to learn. Each PIRCO Charter Member is dedicated to helping those who truly want to learn. The "Dial-A-Hat Hot Line" is available every day that I am in town. Remember, you aren't out there alone. There is lots of help available. But remember, that for us to help you, you must be willing to work to help yourself. The adage "You can lead a horse to water, but you can't make him drink," applies in this situation.

Many clients turned themselves and their handicapping around after the Match-Up manual was published. Even more were made over by the ENERGY! program. I have received hundreds of calls and letters to this effect. But there are those out there who still insist on believing, all evidence to the contrary, that the track is changed between races and management is "playing games" with them. They see one race run Early, the next Sustained, and they can't believe that the fault lies in themselves.

Believe me when I tell you that this is a load of "bull." The track could care less whether you win or lose. PIRCO are the only ones who care. We want you to win. Stop looking for excuses for your own failures. It's time to stop WHINING; and start WINNING!

The Psychology of Winning

The aftermath of the test we offered in Follow Up number 15 and continued in #16 still dominates my mail bin. (I asked you to bet \$5 a race for 20 consecutive races, and record your feelings as you went.) Your response has continued, and your insights have grown substantially as a result of taking that test. The diaries you faithfully kept and forwarded to me have demonstrated conclusively that you have become aware of the fact that periodic lapses into losing cycles or the apparent inability to properly interpret readouts are the result of inner anxieties and failure to deal with the INNER YOU.

Virtually without exception YOU acknowledged that the mental set, derived from these factors, affected your WILL, perverting it from a will to succeed to a will to fail. This is especially true in the cases of those who altered their investment decisions AFTER being subjected to the ambiance of the track or satellite wagering center and/or the verbalizing with others. A few clients were so disturbed over their failure to successfully complete this test that they abstained from betting altogether. A good move.

If you persistently failed that 20 race test, your handicapping will never show a consistent profit no matter how well you can predict the outcome of a race in the sanctity of your own home. Until you can overcome those demons you discovered as a result of failing the test, you should be a recreational \$2.00 bettor. Remember, God did not ordain that persons who cannot win consistently at the track are unworthy. Ours is a most difficult profession and not EVERYONE will cope with the anxieties inherent therein.

The purpose of these columns is to offer the best psychological principles extant to those who WILL cope. Many will NOT cope and describe the phenomenon as "CAN'T" cope. In the lexicon of psychiatry, "can't" and "won't" are almost always synonymous. When we fail, it is because we refuse to give up dependency on a behavioral pattern that has always given us some kind of REWARD!

Even if it is a perverse, negative kind of reward we NEED it. If our failures earned us sympathetic strokes from our mothers or aunts or whoever when we were infants, we are scripted to go on failing. If success in our early life stages was met with, "That's the kind of thing we expect from you," or NO RECOGNITION AT ALL, we tend to eschew success. Especially if we saw siblings or other children receive a measure of coddling as the response to behavior less than excellent.

Shaw's adage that those who can, do. Those who can't, teach has, for generations, served as an indictment against persons who are excellent teachers but who cannot successfully function in their chosen field. Take the drama teacher who cannot act because of stage fright. I have seen a similar phenomenon in the handicapping ranks. Brilliant writers and teachers who have given immeasurable help to

others but who cannot themselves make a living at the track. Their problem is indecision at the moment of truth. Their pre-race analysis is near perfect but the anxieties preclude them making betting decisions based on that analysis. They are possessed of a demon that somehow distorts their ability to follow through.

These people still perform a useful function and they should feel no shame. Perhaps their conditioning will forever keep THEM from the ranks of constant winners, but it does not impede their ability to help others. We have found that certain people do badly when they depend on their handicapping skills for a living; but who win consistently when they have a job that pays an adequate wage. Such people should continue their productive vocation until such times as the demons have been vanquished.

As parents, however, these ancient experiences should teach us to heap praise upon even the minor achievements of our offspring and be less coddling and forgiving of failures. That which we reward in our progeny will be the patterns they will duplicate. If we reward failure, then failure will be repeated throughout life.

Some of our Teaching members took the test and were most open with me about their reactions after each race. One word that particularly dominated one diary was "pissed." A revelation of intense anger — at himself — after each loss. This person's whole body language changed from relaxed to tense, his blood pressure was raised and his usually friendly demeanor became Mr. Hyde-like. His life conditioning was one of perfectionism and adherence to a given standard.

Somewhere along the line he was OVERLY conditioned to success; to adherence to a standard of perfectionism. One of the truly good aspects of Roman Catholicism is the catharsis of the confessional. Catholics suffer far less insanity that Protestants and Jews because of the Absolution and Remission afforded by confession. When we lose a race and suffer anger, we should remember that the gods are jealous of perfection. Instead of anger, laughter and open admission that we blew one should ensue. We must acknowledge to self and to the world that we fully expect to fail 30% of the time. If we fail less, we should be grateful for good fortune. If we fail more than 30% of the time, knowing WHY is more important that getting angry. Knowing WHY is essential. NOT knowing why should produce concern, but not anger. Dealing with your concerns is my principle role in this process.

Frustration and aggression are natural manifestations and in a healthy mind always complement each other. The natural response to frustration is aggression against the CAUSES of frustration. When aggression is characterized by anger -at self or others - this is thwarted, unhealthy aggression. Attack the problem, NOT the self or others.

The word "fault" is a moral judgment. Persons who use the term interchangeably with "BLAME" have been parental or pastoral conditioned to FIND FAULT and/or to FIX BLAME as the natural aftermath of any perceived failure. There are those among us who

cannot accept the reality of things going awry; whose natural reaction is ALWAYS to find fault or fix blame. If you are one of them you need to monitor yourself more closely.

Get yourself a copy of Rudyard Kipling's IF.

If you can keep your head when all about you others are losing theirs and blaming it onto you.

If you can trust yourself when all men doubt you, YET MAKE ALLOWANCE for their doubting, too.

If you can dream-and not make dreams your master; if you can think-and not make thoughts you aim;

If you can meet with Triumph and Disaster and treat those two impostors just the same.

If you can bear to hear the truth you've spoken twisted by knaves to make a trap for fools; . . ."

The bottom line is, IF you can, you're okay. My daddy raised me on that poem and the line from Scaramouch, "He was born with the gift of laughter and a sense that the whole world was mad . .." They have given me more support than any other source of conditioning. The most immediate cure for ALL psychological, and most physical ills, is the ability to laugh - loud and openly - at yourself and at all the sources of your frustration. Laughter is the greatest of ALL gifts. It costs nothing. Just let it start in your belly and rise to you mouth and let it out.

On the positive side, I must say that ALL of you are millenniums ahead of our initial clients who, without the benefit of your psychological insights, immediately blamed the Methodology itself for all THEIR shortcomings. We still get a few like this. They are the reason we have yet to hit our goal of 1,000 winners. They are inveterate "horse-PLAYERS", imbued with the unreal illusion that successful handicapping can come from information alone or from some "easy" system. They will never accept the fact that our destiny is written NOT in our stars, but in ourselves.

We must never lose sight of the fact that Handicapping, from our perspective, is not a hobby, pastime or mere avocation. It is a microcosm of life itself. Its financial rewards are merely ancillary benefits from the kind of total fulfillment achieved only by true prophets. It is not our religion; but it is a religious experience that supports our deepest religious beliefs. Those who regard it as solely a means of financial support will never appreciate the significance of the deeper truth. We have chosen to probe beyond the veil of mere reality. We seek the gift of continuous prophecy which, when finally achieved, removes all doubt, oppressive anger, and especially GREED. We become whole and giving individuals.

If this makes us a cult, then so be it.

Dear Dr. Sartin:

I am very grateful to you for your last article in the Follow Up on the Psychology of Winning. I followed your instructions to the letter and you have made me a winner.

My goal is to be a successful handicapper and to make enough money so that my wife will not have to work. Although I was successful in my business life - through bad investments in the Stock Market and giving too much money away, we ended up at retirement age with insufficient funds to live reasonably well without continuing to work - often at menial jobs.

I think my biggest fault was changing my mind at the track after having thought out the race at home. Your first instruction changed that. I wrote my selections in a small notebook and stuck to them. In fact I refused to take the Form with me to the track, so there would be no 2nd guessing.

I did not have many reactions during the exercise. I pretended you were looking over my shoulder and that kept me in line.

I lost the 1st race to a longshot and my 1st reaction was — did I err in not having him in my contenders. But upon looking it over at home, I still would not make him a contender. I lost another race (#4) because I know the horse and went against my figures. I learned from that loss. I counted #8 a win because the horse did not impede the other one. It was an unjust call. I felt rather proud of myself because several times I passed races when they just didn't feel right or the odds were too low. Just told myself there will be other better races.

I am just using a hand calculator - so getting all the figures is very time-consuming and I often don't get too much done. I hope to get a computer in the near future.

I go to the races feeling very confident now and know I can win overall. I also know I have so much more to learn - but I will and I'll get better and better - thanks to you. I will be forever grateful and God Bless you.

Turbocharge Your Bankroll

Though both Doc and Huey Mahl have told us of the great opportunities to be found in the place and show pools, it seems that not many PIRCO members take advantage of them. The main reason for this is probably the low payoffs and seemingly low returns compared to the win pool.

As I look further into the situation, it appears that there are two basic types of PIRCO members. The first is the handicapper who has the necessary experience and proven ability to make a full time income from the races. The second group, for one of any number of reasons, is still moving up the learning/experience curve and is not yet able to earn this type of income.

To the first group, I pose the following question: Would you be interested in discovering a way to pay all your daily expenses without doing any additional handicapping, so that all your current track income could be net profit?

As for the rest of you, consider the following: On your way to making your riches at the races, wouldn't it be nice to start to make a "living" at the track using your current ability level?

I think it safe to say that the "yes's" are resounding through the ranks. The answer, my friends, is written in the alternate pools: place and show. I recently discussed with Huey his soon to be released Instruction Sheet L (available from his Length Variant office, \$20. 702 737-9117). In it he discusses how to dutch our top two horses to place. Huey estimates that the average proficiency for PIRCO folks should run about 80%, with a \$0.40 average payoff to one dollar.

When I queried Doc about his favorite conservative betting style, which he refers to as the "designated show horse." He estimates that the average PIRCO member (NOT the expert, but the average) should be able to achieve a 67% proficiency betting one horse with an average payoff to one dollar of \$0.90 (that's a \$3.90 average mutuel). One of the many advantages of the ENERGY! reports that users are contractually bound to submit is that it serves as an ideal method of record keeping and later verification of trends. According to Doc, few clients have noticed that an easily identifiable horse is showing with such consistency. For those of you who are curious (anyone???), the following three categories loosely define a "designated show horse" as the contender that:

- 1) Meets the Win Energy (% Median) requirements, but does not possess the necessary Total Energy to win.
- 2) Runs an even paced race throughout.
- 3) Dominates Early or Late.

You need to check your own records, or begin to keep records, to verify what your own results in this area are, but this should give you a guide or goal to shoot for. Using the larger study from Doc's ENERGY! reports (we'll look at Huey's place dutching in a future article. Meanwhile, buy Sheet L and experiment on your own), let's see what we have from a profit perspective using Doc's figures:

Proficiency = 67% Avg. Payoff (to \$1.00) = .90 Kelly Advantage = 30% % interest (10% bet) = 58%

A whopping 30% Kelly advantage, yet due to the low average payoff, we only make 58% interest on our bankroll (using the growth multiplier equation, Length Variant Instruction Sheet C) in a normal 20 race cycle. In dollars, given a \$300 beginning bank, our ending bank would be \$474 and our profit would be \$174 (300 x .58). I say "ONLY 58%" with tongue in cheek, as it beats the hell out of other investment opportunities. It is an interesting point to consider that due to the high expectation level of success in the PIRCO ranks, anything less than 100% interest per week is too often scoffed at as being unreasonably small. Keep in mind that this is a subsidiary investment from the show pools.

Without delving further into this extremely high expectation level, ready yourself for the real question of this column: What if I could show you a mathematically sound way of increasing this return by over 160% without changing a single selection? In other words, instead of making \$174 profit in 20 plays, you would reap about a \$459 (an increase of 164%) with the same plays, betting the same 10% of bankroll*.

How can you do it? Well, it's about time that you asked a question. The concept seems to be a well kept secret, thought up by Huey Mahl years ago and published in the High Rollers Newsletter. Huey dubbed it the "Piggyback Parlay," and it is a lot like riding a bike, in as much as it is quite a bit easier to do than it is to explain. But since you asked, I'll take a shot at it. Keep in mind that this is a product of the fertile mind of Huey Mahl, so if the following explanation takes a couple of "reads" to sink in, don't worry, it's worth it.

The Piggyback Parlay is where you take a normal string of bets, and instead of wagering on each bet individually, you make a series of two race parlays that overlap on another. They "piggy back" each other, hence the name. The following diagram and example will serve to more clearly illustrate the concept.

Let's assume that you go to the track on a given day and you have four playable races, each with a "designated show horse." In this example, those races are labeled R1, R2, R3 and R4. R5 represents the first show bet of the following day. You have a typical day for a PIRCO investor and catch three out of four, with R3 your only loss.

R1	R2	R3	R4	R.5
W	W	L	W	?

In normal proportional betting, you would make individual wagers on each race, adjusting your bankroll accordingly after each. To convert this into a Piggyback, you will make the following sets of parlays:

R1 to R2 to R3 to R4 to R5

Notice the circles denoting where possible overlap, or Piggybacking may occur. The reason I say possible is that if the first half of the parlay loses, then it is "dead" and there would be only a beginning parlay on the next race. (Hang in there, it gets easier).

Let's walk through it together. We begin by making our first parlay of Rl to R2 by placing a straight wager on Rl and awaiting the outcome. Rl wins, thus our parlay is "alive" and we take the total return from Rl, including our original bet, and bet it (i.e. parlay it) on R2. To make our second parlay of R2 to R3 requires that we make an additional straight wager on R2, which if it wins will be parlayed to R3 (hint: herein lies the "magic"). The parlay is now piggybacking our additional straight wager on R2. As we can see, in our example R2 wins, and thus our first parlay, Rl to R2 is a winner! We subtract our initial bet on Rl and add the profit to our bankroll.

It's now time for our third race to go off, so we parlay our return from our second straight wager on R2 to R3. Likewise, we place a second straight wager on R3. Our parlay from R2 is now piggybacking our straight wager on R3. Unfortunately, R3 is a loser, which means that our parlay of R2 to R3 is dead, and of course our straight wager on R3, that we hoped to parlay to R4, is also lost. We deduct our losses (only the money actually removed from our bankroll, not the "temporary profit" within the losing parlay) from our bankroll and size our next wager.

Our fourth and final wager for this day is on R4. Since we have no winning parlay, (i.e. no piggyback), we simply make a straight bet on R4, which, if it wins, we will parlay to tomorrow's first betable race. Our parlay results for the day are as follows:

R1 to R2 Win R2 to R3 Lose R3 to R4 Lose R4 to R5 ???

This certainly doesn't <u>appear</u> to be an improvement at this point, but we judge our results in 20 race cycles, not on a single day at the races. Furthermore, the point at this time is to explain the "how to," involved in implementing this concept. Yet, even catching only one of the three parlays, the day is still profitable, as you will see if you do the math.

The real benefit of the piggyback parlay, which you are about to discover, lies in the fact that it essentially transforms a high

win proficiency and a low mutuel into a lower win proficiency with a significantly higher mutuel. The net effect of this is that your return (percent interest on bankroll) is significantly enhanced.

To estimate your new piggyback profit potential for a representative 20 race cycle, we take your straight win proficiency and average payoff to one dollar and apply some simple statistical methods. Since the goal of this style of wagering is to win two-race parlays, or two consecutive races in a row; in order to calculate the probability of two independent events occurring consecutively, you simply multiply the two probabilities by each other. For example, the probability of heads coming up in a coin toss is .5 (a 50% chance). Therefore the probability of two heads in a row is .25, or .5 x .5. The goal for our show proficiency is 67%, thus the probability of two consecutive such occurrences is .67 x .67, or .45%. We can use this equation to calculate the odds to one of any two event parlay:

$$(0dds one + 1) \times (0dds two + 1) - 1$$

Where: Odds one is the odds of the first event.
Odds two is the odds of the second event.

In our example, we used an average odds of .90, so both Odds one and Odds two are equal to .90. This gives us:

$$(1.9 \times 1.9) - 1 = 2.61$$

This means that if your proficiency is 67% with a \$0.90 average payoff and you apply the Piggyback Parlay concept, your new proficiency will be 45% with a \$2.61 average payoff. To drop from 67% to 45% may not sound like good news to most of us, but the average payoff has increased from .90 to 2.61. This has a dramatic impact on the bottom line:

$$67\%$$
 at \$0.90 Kelly = 30 10% bet = 58% interest. 45% at \$2.61 Kelly = 24 10% bet = 153% interest.

So even though the Kelly advantage dropped from 30 to 24% (down 20%), the percent interest on bankroll (i.e. how much money you made) significantly increased from 58 to 153% (up 164%). So what is this magic, you ask? No magic, just a little slight of hand on the bet size. Earlier, I placed an asterisk (*) beside the words "same 10% of bankroll." Even though each straight bet was calculated at 10% of bankroll, because of the parlay action, you actually have a "hidden" bet of some proportion riding in the parlay, which increases your return a corresponding proportion.

Consider this: two identical car engines (20 race cycles) with the same horsepower (% interest on bankroll). You take the second car and add a turbocharger, which boosts the power (increases the % interest on bankroll). This is what we do when we apply this concept; we boost the power of our return. This analogy can be carried further, and here is the bad news and the warning that you need to carefully consider before trying this with real money.

Granted, with a turbocharged engine you enjoy more power; however when you have problems with a turbocharged engine, it costs you a <u>lot</u> more to fix it (ask me how I know this about both cars and Piggyback Parlays).

Likewise, the Piggyback Parlay concept can significantly increase your return, but it does so by depending on streaks of winners, which convert into winning parlays. If your proficiency drops, the losing parlays can eat your bankroll in a New York Minute. If proportional betting is a double edged sword, as Huey likes to call it, then Piggyback Parlays are a double edged chain saw! Forget watching out for fingers, guard your posterior with both hands.

The second and final warning I feel compelled to share with you is that when we converted the straight bets into Piggybacks, we only estimated the number of winning parlays, based on the laws of probability in the long run. We did not consider the evil villain, the "anti-parlay," more commonly known as "the chop." The chop is when you alternate wins and losses (W-L-W-L-W-ETC.) and in so doing you drastically reduce the number of winning parlays. The following chart shows the worst case scenario for winning parlays in a 20 race cycle, given the win proficiencies of 60, 65, 70, 75 and 80 percent.

Looking at the bottom of the 60% column, we find that the predicted number of winning parlays is 7.2 (calculated: $.6 \times .6 = 36\% \times 20 = 7.2$), but due to the chop, we only win 3, for a ratio of 42% of our estimate. Unlike regular percent of bankroll money management, where the order of wins and losses is irrelevant, in parlays the order is vital. What this does is bring an element of luck based on order into our profit picture that we do not have to contend with normally.

On the positive side, you will notice that the ratio of worst to predicted climbs as your proficiency climbs. Once again, this is due to the underlying fact that the parlay thrives on consecutive winners and perishes in the chop. For this reason, if you wish to employ this marvelous little secret to "turbocharge" your bankroll, pay close attention to maintaining a high proficiency.

Before closing, let me give you one last little gem of an idea to keep you awake nights. In this column, I have introduced the Piggyback Parlay concept as applied to show betting. However, it can also be applied to win betting with a 2 horse dutch, although the accounting does get a little tricky. To really blow your mind, consider the numbers racked up by our editor, Dick Schmidt. At the recent Saratoga seminar (by far the best seminar of any kind I've ever attended) while explaining money management, Dick reported that his win proficiency dutching two horses is about 70%, with a \$10.00 average mutuel. This roughly converts to an average payoff to one dollar of \$1.50 (\$10 - \$4 = \$6, 6/4 = 1.5, assumes a 50/50 dutch).

Now Dick readily admits he's not the best, or even one of the best handicappers in PIRCO. However, because of sound money management, he is one of the top money makers (thanks Huey, thanks Doc) in PIRCO. Running his numbers through the growth formula shows:

70%, \$1.50, Kelly = 50%, 10% bet = 276% interest.

Not bad at all. With a 50% Kelly advantage and by betting only 10% of bank, our fearless editor should average 276% bankroll growth in every 20 races. With a measly little \$300 bank, this totals \$828 profit. Way to go, Dick.

But wait, what if we turbocharge this puppy by applying our new found Piggybacks? Is it possible to improve on such an astronomical profit picture? Check it out yourself, using the previously supplied formulae:

49%, \$5.25, Kelly = 30%, 10% Parlays = 2034% interest.

Wow!!! The Kelly advantage dropped from 50% to 30%, but the percent interest on bank jumped from 276 to over 2000! This means an expected average profit of \$6,102 from a starting bank of \$300. Hi-Ho Piggybacks, away . . .

(Editor's note: SAY WHAT?!?!?!)

The New Engen (Energy Generator) Velocity Version

There are TWO versions of the Energy Generator, henceforth known as the Engen. One is for ENERGY! users exclusively. This one is designed for those using any of our VELOCITY PROGRAMS, Phase III, Synergism or Synergism II.

The ENGEN is the most productive supplemental tool in our arsenal. I say supplemental because it is not designed for handicapping itself but to augment your handicapping proficiency. It is a tremendous improvement over PARGENERATOR Plus, which was in itself a great tool, though seldom used by most clients. WHY? I'm not quite sure. Ferhaps we did not offer sufficient instruction. We will not repeat that mistake with this program. As much as I dislike recipe book instruction, I'll undertake it now. But DON'T TURN ON YOUR OVEN JUST YET.

STEP 1: Understanding the CONCEPT:

We are about to prepare a side dish that will turn a hamburger win cycle into a gournet feast.

NECESSARY INCREDIENTS:

- 1: A Computer Program called ENGEN. (accept no substitutes)
- 2: A newspaper or Racing Form with RESULT CHARTS that enumerate fractional times and beaten lengths at all calls. (Accept no substitutes.)
- 3: A table or desk of sufficient size to hold the above ingredients.
- 4: An absence of lethargy, malaise or laziness.
- 5: At least ONE THOROUGH READING of this recipe.
- 6: The Absolute Certain Ability to FROFERLY READ and apply the RESULTS CHARTS. So many of you demonstrated that you did not possess this ability during a recent Beaumont Clinic. The Procedure is explained herein by two pages from pages 71-72 the PINK MANUAL that came with our basic package.

READING THE RESULTS CHARTS

Keeping a track WIN PROFILE (and Place Profile if you're an Exacta wagerer) is an essential element of the Sartin Methodology. Since these profiles are kept through daily imput from the Daily Racing Form RESULTS Charts, or their facsimiles printed in most major newspapers, it is essential to know that we read the RESULTS CHARTS in reverse order from the PAST PERFORMANCE CHARTS.

I was shocked to learn how many astute handicappers DO NOT KNOW how to read these charts accurately.

EXAMPLE: Sprint

EIGHTH RACE 7 FURLONGS, (1,20%) ALLOWANCE, Purse \$27,000, 3-years-old and upward which have never won a race other than målden, claiming or starter. Weight, 3-year-olds 114 lbs.; older, Belmont 122 lbs. Non-winners of a race other than claiming since May 15 allowed 3 lbs. Of such a race JUNE 16, 1988 since May 1, 5 lbs.

Ignore the STRETCH CALL TIME. It is not available in the Past Performance Charts from which we handicapped the race.

IF YOU PLEASE gets 0 beaten lengths at the First Call and 0 beaten lengths at the Second Call. It is beaten at the finish by 13.25 lengths.

The winner, FESTIVE, is 5 plus a head (or 5.1 lengths) at the First Call, 3 1/2 lengths at the Second Call and 0 at the finish.

The place horse, GREG AT BAT, was behind 8.6 lengths at the First call, 6.5 lengths at the Second Call and 5.25 at the finish.

The show horse, SUPERB FLIGHT, was behind 1.1 at the First Call, 1 length at the Second Call and 9.75 lengths at the finish.

JUICE was behind 1 length at the First Call, 2.5 at the Second Call and 16 at the finish.

EXAMPLE: ROUTE

Here is an 8.5 Route Race Results Chart.

In routes we ignore the stretch call and we also IGNORE the quarter mile First Call. There is no Past Performance line equivalent for these calls.

Hence, the calls we use in this race are:

47.3 112.4 144.2

The Winner, SOLO SPORTING was 3 lengths behind at the half mile call, .6* lengths at the 3/4 mile and finished 0.

The Place horse WICKED WIKE is 4 lengths behind at the First Call, .7 at the Second and finished beaten 3.

SUGGESTED ADDITIONAL INCREDIENTS

Two cups of coffee or tea or whatever it is you drink in the morning, or while using the Result Charts.

A measure of quietude or whatever you feel necessary to insure twelve minutes of concentrated effort

A clock or timing device for clocking yourself. If it takes OVER 12 minutes to do ONE DAY of this recipe, you should practice by boiling water for a week or so until your ability as a COOK is up to par.

SPECIFIC PROCEDURE

Enter into your ENGEN program from the Results Charts the figures for the previous day winners. Do it SEPARATELY for each different distance and Surface. (Dirt-Turf)

the sure you change the TODAYS DISTANCE at the head of the program to the distance you are tracking!

With the opening menu you have the opportunity to either go straight to the ENGEN or to do AFV/Class figures on Yesterday's winners. ON THE IBM you also have the option of saving your computations onto disc.

The program defaults to 6F as the distance. YOU must change it for each different distance computed.

You must enter Times and Beaten lengths for the WINNERS at each distance and surface run. As a helpful hint, winners always have 0 (zero) final beaten lengths.

You will see a separate line for each horse. After you have Entered a GIVEN DISTANCE, the program will AVERAGE the readouts for that day.

If you wish to become a more proficient Exacta/Quinella investor, keep an ENGEN profile from the Results Charts for each PLACE HORSE.

THE FROMEN FOWER OF THE ENGEN TRACK PROFILE

From April through the first week in August I went on the road with some Pirco Charter Members. We visited 5 different Tracks and predicted, before the fact, 106 races over a 14 day period. We won substantially on 13 of those days, suffering one day at Aksarben where we made only \$8 (flat betting). The secret to our success lay in the fact that a Pirco Associate member at each track made us a complete ONE WEEK Track Profile from the ENGEN:

In Los Angeles Tom Hambleton's profile saved our bacon.

In Seattle Bruce Jorgenson's Profile made the difference.

At Monmouth our success came largely from the efforts of Joe Burkson withan elaborate, accurate Track Profile. At Aksarben we won 72% 3 of our 4 days thanks to the profile made by Tom Renner and Dave Lewis who preceded us to the track by three days.

In CHICAGO, Arlington, 2nd week, we faced a seemingly impossible card. Thanks to Bob Furdy and Michael Pizzolla who put a variety of shippers from as much a seven different tracks through the computer from a FROFILE made by Robert Cochran we went 7 winners in 9 races. Michael Pizzolla, the inveterate showman, stayed quietly at his computer and, along with Furdy, was able to demonstrate the readout most predictive of the winner. The Chicago crowd was particularly unruly -just a few bad apples in a barrel- kept shouting, "just give us the winner—!" Michael and Bob did. After the races there wasn't even a murmur of complaint. Without doubt, accurate track profiles made the difference between a successful tour and a one way ticket to Brazil. It worked for us under EXTREME pressure.

It will work for YOU!



The Handicapper's best literary friend, William Murray, scores again with this new novel, following the lives and times of Shifty Anderson and Jay Fox into a new adventure, set this time around Caliente Race Track near Tijuana, Mexico. With little urging from me, Murray's Race Track novels have long been must reading for most of you. This one may well top the list.

Shifty, the Michael Pizzolla close up magician-handicapper prototype, leaves the environs of Hollywood Park in search of a leech who steals a winning Pick Six ticket held by himself, Jay Fox and Fox's betting syndicate. What follows is high adventure involving good and bad trainers, fixers, transvestites and crooks of all variety, including a porno movie producer. Also, there is a delectable girl jockey who will ride and love her way into your hearts. Murray's first tale involving the two protagonists was Tip on a Dead Crab, followed by Hardknockers Luck and then When the Fat Man Sings. They are all in my library and I hope, in yours.


Murray has been improperly described as Runyonesque. Damon was a journalists. His characters, a la GUYS AND DOLLS, were made of cardboard. Stereotypes of "Horseplayers." Losers. Okay for a newspaper yarn, but certainly unreal to those seeking the truth about winning at Thoroughbred Racing. Murray's principal characters are much like us. Serious students of the Handicapping Arts and Sciences.

Jay is the figures man, the Tom Brohamer type pouring over charts, making variants. (Editor's note: you know really dull) Shifty is a little more on the intuitive side; influenced by Jay's figures but relying also on Bradshaw's "Eyeball Scan." Both characters are real, especially to us, because their true goal is winning, not just "action." Murray lets his characters win - most of the time. But he also lets us know that it's no cinch; that winners are engaged in a hard fought, continuing war.

Murray's insights stem from the fact that HE is a serious handicapper. He's never missed a day at Del Mar since he moved to the Greater San Diego area. He goes to the morning workouts; he analyzes pace, class and speed. He's on a first name basic with the trainers and jockeys. Like all of us, he HATES to lose.

He wins with this book. It's a hell of a yarn with some deep psychological insights that enrich his characterizations. They never get in the way of a fast moving plot, however. He's very knowledgeable about music - from opera to jazz. Incidentally, he's a very nice man, too. Even if he did go to Harvard.

Get the book. Get ALL of his books. They will help you keep the faith and reach your goal and entertain you at the same time.



About 15% of you are now using ENERGY!(tm). So it seems only fair that we dedicate about 15% of the Follow-Up to ENERGY!. While ENERGY! users stand on yet another hill overlooking the same information as other handicappers, there will be nothing so unique or esoteric in our ENERGY! articles as to exclude non-ENERGY! users from benefiting from the content. This article, based on material submitted by Bob Timmerman of Vista, Ca, deals with adjustments to ENERGY!.

As with Phase III users, my greatest fear for ENERGY! clients is focused on the subject of adjustments. The temptation to overadjust seems inherent in all handicappers. The original Phase III users enjoyed bonanza win cycles when the material was new to them and they followed prescribed procedure. Then they found out that they could make their own adjustments and the honeymoon was over until I could convince them NOT to over-adjust. To avoid the pitfalls of over-adjustment, Ultra Scan had an auto-adjust feature built in; as does both Synergism I and II.

With ENERGY!, we forbade any adjustments other than the AUTO-ADJUST. We have told users to wait for the ENGEN and the advanced manuals before attempting using the alternative adjustment option. There are occasions when an alternate might be optimal. We will address one of them in this article.

THE RACE

5th race from Sunday August 27, 1989 at Del Mar, a mile on the turf. The problem we encounter is we have horses coming from turf mile races at Del Mar and Hollywood Park, turf 9 furlongs at Del Mar, and dirt 8.5 furlongs at Solano. Step one: We go through ENERGY!'S Built-In Engen. We use PACE OF RACE for the tracks distances & surfaces in question. That's PACE OF RACE, NO beaten lengths. Consulting the TOTAL ENERGY differentials only, here is what the program shows us:

The Total Energy differentials would suggest that The HOLLYWOOD Turf Miler get 0 adjustment; the Del Mar Turf Milers get a plus 4.22. The Del Mar Turf 9 Furlong get at 5.05 and the Solano DIRT get 3.20. Were we to follow this procedure this would be the result:

Our initial Variegate would be Early/Presser. But Argalaxy, the original 0.00 MUV horse cannot possibly go wire to wire. We exercise the (C) Change Variegate option, removing Argalaxy from Variegate consideration and come up with the following: a Sustained Presser Variegate. We are left with three logical contenders: Rufjan, New Colony and Flippable. We could Box them and get the Exacta. We could play the Rankings and bet Rufjan and New Colony to win. In this case, we get the winner, but, frankly, I don't like what I see. It smacks of black box number crunching. Captain Vigors looks like a hopeless Late-only runner. Further, if I apply this technique in ALL mixed races, I'm in danger of warping ENERGY! all out of proportion and ultimately losing more than I gain.

Bob Timmerman, a veteran winner, chose to make tedious track to track Energy Adjustment for all distances, surfaces and tracks involved in the 1989 Del Mar meet. He did it from a long background in the Methodology. Here using his own adjustments, are his readouts for this 5th race:

Bob gets pretty much the same result as we did in the previous example. We wind up discounting Captain Vigors, No Commitment, Argalaxy and Sure Swift. Still, the figures are distorted and take away from ENERGY!'S TRUE POWER of exhibiting a race in near-perfect perspective.

The optimal alternative is to ENTER THE AUTO ADJUST NUMBERS using the Alternate Adjust feature. When this is done, the auto adjust goes equally onto each fractional component of the Race, as opposed to being distributed by Energy distribution percentage. Here is what we have when we use this adjustment technique:

As you can see on the next page, I've used the Auto Pace Adjustment, but have entered it manually. This is the secret. You enter it MANUALLY so that it is distributed equally on all three fractions.

With this adjustment having been made, we'll scratch No Commitment and Sure Swift because their pace seems to have no bearing on the race. We must leave Argalaxy in because it, along with Rufjan, wants to be the pacesetter.

We see a Sustained Pace Presser Variegate. While the readouts themselves are less pat than the previous ones, this time we see how the race really projects. As predicted, Argalaxy runs out of gas early. Rufjan fades next. Captain Vigors holds an Even Pace. Flippable takes up the slack from Argalaxy & Rufjan. New Colony begins pressing immediately. Its Rankings are 5-4-1-2-1, an almost perfect Sustained Presser deceleration pattern. The Paragon B Matchup Graph and the Late EXDC graph has the race in perfect order.

Although this readout requires a little more interpretation, it is optimal. It will prove more rewarding over the long haul because it will truly depict the Energy Dynamics of a Race.

I might also suggest at least a casual glance at the relative (turf) A.P.V.'S of these contenders. New Colony's 196%, compared to Argalaxy's 51%, suggests that New Colony should be able to be competitive with this field.

SUMMARY

Make NO ATTEMPT to employ the actual alternate adjustment at this point. The most viable alternative is to use the AUTOMATIC ADJUSTMENT, Manually Entered: As per this illustration:



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This issue's Problem Race is taken from the new manual we are just finishing up. It all revolves around a day we shared at Saratoga. Many of you who have attended one of the Saratoga seminars know that Bert Mayne always arranges for us to attend the races on the Monday after the seminar. We feast together Sunday night, then play together on Monday. Excellent tradition.

This time, enough clients were coming we needed to get two busses to hold us all. The entire PIRCO teaching staff came, along with 60 or 70 clients. Because this is not the usual "day at the office" that most of us consider a trip to the track to represent, we all spend a lot of time going over races for clients. This year, Michael Pizzolla and I offered to go over a couple of races, offering guidance to anyone who wanted to listen before the bus left.

One of the races we went over was the 7th. I feel that Michael and I did a very good job going over this race. Michael in particular did a masterful piece of analysis, both in eliminating an obvious favorite and in ferreting out the place horse. For myself, I was more than satisfied with the outcome. The winner was my pick of the day, and I was hoping for an \$8 or \$9 mutuel. Instead, I got \$19.80 on what I felt was a standout horse.

When I say we did a good job, that means we did a lot more than just pick the winner. We were trying to demonstrate the technique of handicapping using the Sartin Methodology, not just hit a race. The new manual, titled A Day at the Races, contains much more than just 8 problem races. The technique we used on this race, and indeed throughout the entire manual, is both effective and repeatable by anyone willing to do the work. The book has a complete explanation of the process we used to handicap each race and a description of the tools we used. I hope you enjoy pitting yourself against the "New York Sharpies" who let this horse get away, and against the race itself. If you like this sample, there's lots more where it came from.

As always, here is the race, unmarked and ready for you to work. I'll join you on the other side after you get through. Remember, to get the most out of this, or any problem race, work the race completely. All the way down to choosing the two horses you want to bet on and writing down your selections. If you want to try the exacta as well, write down your complete exacta strategy as well.

The second race the Michael and I analyzed for the folks before we got on the bus to Saratoga. We spent a lot of time on this race the night before, and Michael in particular did some nice analysis for the wondering multitudes.

When I first looked at the race, I decided that Pitino Ball would go out and get the lead, and that the only horse with a chance of catching him was Furicano. The more I looked, the more I liked Furicano's chances. If I had to make just one bet on this day, this would be the race and Furicano would be the horse. However, we just saw in the last race the danger of using "eyeball scan." When it works, its fine, but you miss too much. We have the most powerful handicapping tools ever devised. Use them. The horses:

Prospector's Bid - Terrible Class/APV (using one year. This is August, remember), poor PBS. For me a definite non-contender. Michael and several others liked the horse for place, and used him in exactas. I left him out altogether.

Township - Good enough Class/APV, and a surprisingly good PBS rating. Ah, the power of PBS at uncovering the "hidden" good race. The last line looks terrible at first glance, but really isn't so bad. Township just caught a very fast field. I went back one on him.

<u>Pitino Ball</u> - Good Class/APV, good PBS. Good horse. That was my analysis, and I used the last line. More on this horse later.

Icy Jr. - Again, good Class/APV, good PBS. Last line.

Furicano - Oh boy. OK Class/APV and the best PBS rating by 10 points. I like thise horse. Be careful when you do + and O on a horse like this. At first it looks like a bad race, good race pattern, with a bad race due today. Then notice that his trainer, Albert Einstein, has been moving him from routes to sprints and back again. All his sprints get +'s, his routes O's. Took a while, but ol' Albert finally did notice and kept him in a sprint.

Ben's First - A Finger Lakes horse. These figure to have poor APV. Notice that Ben's Class figure isn't bad at all. The horse is 9 for 12 in the money, with 5 wins. Must be doing something right. PBS is fine even with no adjustment for the slower track. I'll keep him for the moment out of respect Bert Mayne.

Poor Bert gets kidded unmercifully about his fondness for little Finger Lakes over the "big time" New York circuit. Many is the night he has lain awake, crying bitter tears. He doesn't do that much anymore. His bankroll was getting soggy. As Bert points out, the racing may be a bit slower than at the "big time" tracks, but the money looks about the same color if you keep it dry. I'll use the last line and see what transpires.

Detonated - I really didn't like this horse much. OK Class/APV, and a good PBS notwithstanding. It had been off since May, and had never shown much speed. I was toying with throwing it

out when I heard Tom Brohamer discussing the race with a couple of clients. He thought Detonated was the class of the race and the only question was whether he was in form or not.

This is more of a "classical handicapping" point of view, based on the class of the races the horse had been competing in. A horse that places third in a Grade III stakes should little problem with non winners of two by classical handicapping standards. On the other hand, our own measures of class show the horse to be less than outstanding. OK, but not a standout. To give the horse every benefit of the doubt, I went back and took its best race ever, 11 March.

Just like the doctor ordered, ENERGY! predicts the race will run Early, and my two horses are Pitino Ball and Furicano. Those are the two I got, and those are the two I bet. Nice hit. However, I didn't do as well as Messers Mayne and Pizzolla, who had the exacta.

On the way back to the hotel, Michael (after cleaning my clock at the computer version of Jeopardy) showed me in detail how he nailed this race and wowed the crowd back at the hotel. Remember, he did all this in front of 50 people 5 hours before the race was run. First off, he ran Pitino Ball through the EnGen program. By this, I mean he put all 6 races the horse has ever run into the program to take a closer look at the horse. Michael has been known to enter 70 or 80 pacelines when handicapping one race. Hard work can be a good substitute for common sense. On the other hand, he wins a ton of exactas.

Look at Pitino's record. In 1988, he had a very good first effort, followed by a slightly poorer second race. Then he is off for 6 months and comes back to destroy a Maiden field. That good race is followed by another, then a poor race. He is then off for 3 months, and in his first back after the layoff, wins a good allowance race in very good time. Now he's back again. Can we expect another good effort from this horse?

Michael thought not. This horse has always been at his best off a layoff of at least 3 months. Obviously a horse with health problems, yet the crowd was backing him heavily. Michael used the last line in analyzing the race, and bet some on the horse, but downgraded his chances both in his mind and at the window.

In light of this, Michael looked at his original readout, which was quite similar to mine, and asked himself a simple question. Can the 0.00 MUV horse win wire-to-wire? Almost always, the top MUV horse needs to wire the field to win. Our friend Pitino Bell was the MUV horse, so Michael was suspicious to start with. A quick glance at the Match-Up readout reveals his weakness. Sure enough, he is dominant in the first fraction, but four other horses can overhaul him in the second fraction, and he gets buried in the final two furlongs. (Remember, this is using his good last race.)

Michael chose to use a little noticed feature of ENERGY! and change the Variegate. What this does is leave the horse in the race,

but eliminates him from the Variegate calculations. At the same time, you can see that poor old Ben's First, another dedicated front runner, just doesn't have it against these other horses. We'll scratch him from the race altogether and eliminate Pitino from the Variegate. The ENERGY! program then gives you the second set of results.

ENERGY! now predicts the race will be won by an Early/Presser. Nothing much changes on the win side. You still get Furicano no matter what you do, but it severely downgrades Pitino Ball (still using that last good race, remember) and moves Township into a solid second spot on your dance card. Guess who finished second. Guess who had the exacta. Guess who didn't.

The horse that the crowd fell in love with was Icy Jr. I couldn't understand why he was getting so much action, when Furicano had such a stronger race at the same track and distance sitting right there for anyone to see. I forgot I was in New York. The Raggies were coming! The "sheets" apparently really loved Icy Jr. I don't know how to read the sheets, but I was told by a client who does that this was the reason for the big money coming down on Icy. OK by me. I have the horse fifth.

Synergism II also has Furicano very strongly. Of course, I didn't have a Synergism II model for Saratoga (I didn't have a model at all) but after the second race it should be obvious that the sprints were running Sustained. Using that as a starting point, you would set up the race using the two 7 furlong races from Saratoga, and tell the program to sort on Sustained Pace. This gives you Furicano number one and Detonated second. Township is the obvious contra-energy horse, as well as #2 Doctor Factor, so the exacta is just waiting there if you want it.

Anyway, the horse I really liked when we went over this race, who comes up with both ENERGY! and Synergism II, paid \$19.80 to win. I could kiss Len Ragozin on the lips. I normally split my bet 60-40 just like the Doc says to, but after seeing the weakness Michael pointed out in the horse, and seeing that he was 5-2 (when I made my bet. I had expected about 6 or 7 to 5), I decided to split my bet 50-50. Even if Pitino wins, I make a nice profit, and as it turns out, I do good. Of course, I didn't hit the exacta, but then I didn't really expect to, since I hadn't bet it.

Pssst! Want to spend a day at the races with Michael Pizzolla, Tom Brohamer, Dick Schmidt and Doc Sartin? Maybe chat with Bert Mayne and Jim Bradshaw, or ask Synergism II questions of Bob Purdy?
