A NOTE FROM THE PUBLISHER.

Some thought that was a promotional gimmick and asked for their money back when they discovered it really WAS hard. No money back guarantees if not satisfied. Why allow a LOSER to judge the value of our work? That's stupid. When subjected to our arbitrary standards NO ONE is likely to be satisfied at the outset.

We advertised very little. Six short campaigns in eight years. We NEVER used mail order; neither will we give or sell our client list to ANYONE - despite the offers I've had from numerous well known former system- now Method- sellers. We've held fast to our goal of NO MORE than 1,000 successful clients and have turned down as many as we've accepted on the basis of their incurable "horseplayer attitudes." The skeptic who says, "well, I'll give your method a try." No way. Thanks but no thanks. Ours is a Methodology NOT for the wisenheimer who thinks he knows it all but for those in need who admit their losing problems and are willing to approach non-mainstream concepts with an open mind. A few "horseplayers" got by my surveillance, but most have lived to become handicappers, despite themselves.

We have been enormously helped along the way by those who might nominally be called competitors. One might expect these people to scorn us. I have certainly been relentless in my disdain for some of their approaches. But no, these few fellow seekers of the ultimate handicapping truths did much to elevate my public status over this

IT'S AN EXOTIC GAME

Steven Crist is the Turf writer for the New York Times, and from this lofty vantage point, surveys the world of racing. He is one of the few writers who considers the wants and needs of the people who make racing go: the bettors. Besides being an excellent writer, Crist is also a very successful investor in parimutuel funds.

He started his parimutuel career investing in greyhound races, and that legacy of exotic money management has carried over into his thoroughbred betting. The "old line" says to never bet an exotic, the "new guard" says to bet little else. Steve Crist has managed to analyze the situation and present a rational way to use the potential of exotics to enhance, rather than replace, win betting.

This article first appeared in The Thoroughbred Record. After I read it, I was struck by both its balance and how well it meshed into the Methodology. We immediately made arrangements with Mr. Crist to reprint it in its entirety for you.

Five minutes remain before post time for the eighth race, and John Q. Horseplayer is starting to panic as he moves toward the front of the line at the betting window.

He's got the horse right here, number 1, but he does not know what to do with him. Baseball him with four others in the exacta and buy a smaller wheel for protection? Crisscross him in the late double with four horses in the ninth? Bet against him since he's already a singleton for a conso-five in the pick six? Key him first and second with six underneath in the triple, and then make the underbox in case the key runs off the board?

John Q. gets to the front of the line and begins rattling off combinations, hoping he does not leave something out and that the total of his bets comes out to not much more than the \$100 he planned to put into the race. The teller finishes punching, the amount due is \$108, and John Q. gets to the television monitor with

a fistful of tickets just in time to watch his selection score an easy victory. He barely watches the winner, instead unsuccessfully rooting the longest shot among his exacta hook-ups to hold on for a distant second.

As the result is declared official, he is disgustedly shuffling through his tickets, finding not a winner among them, and realizing his lone live tickets are a quartet of \$2 daily doubles that at best will get him back half his money.

He barely notices that his horse paid \$5.20 to win, and it never occurs to him that had he invested his \$108 that way, he would now be looking at a ticket worth \$280.80. He takes little joy in having picked the 1, a.k.a. Easy Goer, to win the Belmont Stakes (G1). Bet to win and root for your horse? He never even considered it. Everyone knows that you can't make money that way.

Such is the world of exotic betting, which is becoming less and less exotic by

the day as it becomes the staple of American horseplaying. Over the last ten years, exotic betting- any wager involving a combination of two or more horses, as opposed to win, place and show bets on an individual runner- has come to dominate the mutuel play and mindset at virtually every American track. The exacta pool almost always exceeds the win pool these at tracks from coast to coast, and every track in the country has significantly expanded its menu of bets.

The last few holdouts against what were once quaintly called "gimmicks" have given up. The pick six has become part of "racing as it was meant to be" at Keeneland Race Course. Oaklawn Park, whose owner once vowed to keep out the exotics, now offers an exacta on every race. Last month, stately old Saratoga Race Course began offering a second trifecta every afternoon.

Bettors have encouraged and welcomed the expansion of the exotics, and many would find little appeal in the racing game without them. Once a bettor has cashed \$100 exactas and \$1,000 trifectas, or flirted with \$10,000 pick sixes, he finds it difficult to get inspired about \$5.20, \$2.80, and \$2.40 across the board.

Also, the exotics make virtually any race playable, which gives both bettors and track operators more action. A race with a 1-to-5 shot becomes attractive as bettors focus on who will be second or who will win the other half of the daily double. A race in which the three top contenders outclass the field but cannot be separated becomes a natural three-horse exacta box instead of a pass.

The increasing popularity of the exotics has changed the way that many fans play the game, and not all of these changes by the bettor are for the better. The biggest drawback is that bettors are losing more than ever before because most states exact a higher parimutuel takeout on exotic bets than on straight ones, and the bite increases with the exoticness of the bet. States that take between 17% and

20% on straight bets often take between 20% and 25% on exactas and from 25% to 35% in trifectas and pick sixes.

The thinking is that the bettors will never notice the difference between a \$75 and a \$68 exacta payoff, or sense that a \$12,000 pick six should have paid \$15,000. In the long run, though, such differences make winning seasons into losing ones, and will eventually bankrupt some players or send them into forms of gambling with lower overhead.

Many horseplayers, and track operators, also seem unable to distinguish between the different forms of exotic bets, each of which offers distinct advantages and disadvantages. Horse players such as John Q. seem increasingly drawn by the sheer action of being involved in numerous pools with no consideration of the shrewdest way to come out a winner. Tracks are similarly instituting virtually every form of exotic betting without much forethought as to which bets will create and maintain fans while punishing their bankrolls as little as possible.

All exotics can be broken into two distinct categories: multi-race wagers, and multi-horse wagers within the same race. These bet types may seem similar, since they both involve combining horses, but they are very different propositions, in terms of both parimutuel significance and betting philosophy.

The most basic multi-race wager is the oldest of the exotics, the daily double. Originally conceived as a way of getting bodies through the turnstiles for the first race, the daily double continues to offer something that few other exotics do: a way to beat the parimutuel takeout on straight bets.

A study of early and late daily double payoffs in New York through the first six months of this year revealed that the double price exceeded a parlay of the win prices on the two horses by approximately 15%. In other words, a bettor would collect 15% more by betting

a daily double of his choices in the first two races than by betting the first to win and reinvesting his return with a win bet on the second.

This happens because the bettor faces the parimutuel takeout only once when he bets the daily double. The 17% cut is being taken once from a bet on both winners in the daily double instead of being taken on each of those races. A horse who pays \$9.60 to win would pay \$12 if there were no parimutuel take. By betting the double, the bettor is effectively getting a free ride on one of his winners. A parlay of two \$9.60 winners pays \$46. A daily double of two such winners will pay closer to \$57.60, the equivalent of a parlay of winners paying \$9.60 and \$12.

The same holds true for the daily triple or pick three, the fastest-growing of the new exotics. Here the player is beating the takeout twice in three races, and daily triple prices often pay twice what the parlay would. The drawback here, and to a lesser extent in the double, is that few bettors view this as an opportunity to improve on a pair of win prices. Many instead crisscross a handful of selections, greedily hoping to get in a couple of long-priced horses even if they lack conviction about such runners.

A typical play in the pick three is for a player to select three horses in each race. The cost of such a ticket, based on 27 combinations, is \$54 on a \$2 ticket. But if the favorite wins each race, the pick three will pay less than \$54- it has paid as little as \$10- and the bettor will lose as much as 80% of his stake for picking three winners.

The pick six is an entirely different proposition because no one plays it as a way to improve on a "six horse parlay"- a bet no one would make. The pick six is its own universe, a private poker game divorced from the straight odds. For some bettors, the pick six has become the raison d'être for playing horses.

The bet is a good one for those players, and as a way of generating

publicity for racetracks and racetrack betting when carryover pools reach high levels that will attract those who ordinarily steer clear of the bet. Every track should offer the pick six for those who wish to play it. But the bet is a trap for the majority of its fans because it is heavily biased in favor of high rollers.

No matter how good the handicapping skills of a small bettor are, he is not going to beat the bigger players by using one or two horses a race when the big fish can use three or four. The one time the bet is a boon for small players is when there is a huge carryover. The small bettor should play a modest number of tickets containing very logical selections, just in case it turns out to be that easy. If it does, he will get from 10 to 1 to 50 to 1 on his investment, whereas the big players will get burned, investing a lot and getting back relatively little.

The newest entry in multi-race betting is the automatic parlay, instituted last year by the New York Racing Association and, not surprisingly, copied by no one else. The prime advantage of the bet is that it saves a player from making an extra trip or two to the windows. He can put in one parlay slip that will automatically reinvest his money on as many as six win, place, or show propositions throughout a card.

That advantage is half the problem with the bet: it cannot be canceled, so a player cannot back out even if a thunderstorm changes the footing or his selection comes onto the track limping. The other half of the problem is that parlays subject the player to repeated parimutuel takeout bites- rather than saving him from them, as the daily double or pick three can. Officials of the NYRA say they have not put in a pick three because fans can design their own three race combinations through parlays. But the whole point of the pick three is to improve on the parlay price.

Perhaps the most attractive thing about all the multi-race bets, other than helping players beat the takeout, is that

they focus attention on what should be the primary challenge of handicapping: selecting the horse who will cross the finish line first.

Multi-race bets are being outhandled by what we might call the intra-race bets, largely because there are so many of the latter being offered each day. It is these bets, though, where many horseplayers may be getting themselves into trouble.

The exacta, also known as the perfecta, is a paradoxical proposition. The bet requires the selection of the first two finishers in exact order, but the two likeliest winners of a race are not necessarily likely to run first and second. Savvy players know that the two horses they might use in one race for daily double or pick six purposes often are a bad bet to take the top two spots in an exacta.

This may be for a variety of reasons. Perhaps they are both one-dimensional front-runners, and the one who gets the early jump will wire the field while the other will chuck it without a clear lead. Perhaps both are erratic horses, and while one or the other is likely to fire his best shot, it is unlikely that both will.

The most prudent use of the exacta is, as with multi-race bets, to improve on the win price of one's selection. A solid 4-to-5 shot may not stir the blood, but if the bettor thinks that only two other horses can be second, and those exactas are both paying \$12, he can bet them both. He would invest \$4 to get back \$12, and has more than doubled his price, from 4-to-5 to 2-to-1.

Few bettors approach the exacta this way, however. Most are so concerned about selecting the winning exacta that they begin covering too many bases. What if their choice runs second to one of the other two? So they also reverse their two exactas, putting their selection underneath the two other horses, and the investment is up to \$8. Now, won't they feel silly if the prime selection runs nowhere and the other two run first and second? So now

they "box" all three horses, a \$12 investment with a highly possible \$12 return.

The indiscriminate use of the box is the undoing of most exacta players. A four-horse box is reassuring, but costs \$24 for a \$2 unit. A player may feel like a winner if a \$36 exacta comes in on such a play, but he has turned the race into a 1-to-2 proposition.

Some tracks also offer a quinella, a low-rent version of the exacta that gyps players under the guise of saving them money. In a quinella, it does not matter which order your two horses come in: a 1-2 quinella is a winner whether the order of finish is 1-2 or 2-1. A bettor need purchase only half as many tickets to cover the same possibilities. A three-horse, \$2 quinella box costs just \$6, whereas the same exacta play costs \$12. Generally, a quinella pays half of what the exacta does.

The problem is that quinellas force the bettor into buying tickets he does not want. If the bettor is convinced he has the winner, and only wants to bet his exotics with that horse finishing first, he is effectively forced to play an equal number of combinations with the horse finishing second if he bets the quinella. Instead of offering a quinella, tracks should simply cut the minimum on their exactas in half, allowing the player the same bang for his buck but allowing him to be more selective in his combinations. It is astounding that the NYRA is the only major racing circuit that permits \$1 exacta bets.

Trifecta wagers remain the most controversial of exotic bets. California tracks, for example, bar them completely, while Florida tracks run as many as seven a day, and some smaller circuits now run on every race.

The bet's potential for large payouts and its utter unpredictability-payoffs range from \$50 to \$50,000- make it appealing. As a once-a-day promotional tool, a way of tempting patrons to stay for the last and worst race on the card, it has

its place. But the drawbacks of the wager are enormous.

The trifecta usually has the highest rate of parimutuel takeout at the track, something lost on patrons because payoffs are such a guessing game. Also, federal and, increasing, state withholding taxes take their heaviest toll here. Anything over \$1,000 on a \$2 ticket is subject to between 20% and 32% confiscation, regardless of how much a bettor has invested on that race, much less that day, week or month.

The trifecta also increases the illogic of all intra-race wagers, because it is rare for the three logical favorites all to fire and to take the top three spots. Yet, for most players, buying combinations that go beyond the first three or four choices in the betting becomes prohibitively expensive. So combinations involving the four favorites are heavily overbet, because those are the only ones that many players can afford.

Many small bettors make their biggest investment of the day on trifecta races, and at many tracks this means making your largest bets on the worst races. Most track operators cling to the notion that a trifecta on a 12 horse field is far more desirable than one on an eight horse field, even though the latter would be more playable and result in far fewer withholding-tax situations. So the one or two trifectas on the card are on those races sure to have full fields, which often means bottom-rung claimers and maidens.

Some of the tracks that have inundated patrons with trifectas say they are doing so to compete with greyhound racing, where up to 50% of the betting is

on trifectas. But, at the dogs, there are only eight competitors in a race, or 336 possible trifecta combinations. In a 12 horse race, there are 1,320 combinations. A field of 14 betting interests, as an increasing number of tracks now offer, means there are 2,184 combinations.

What is the worst exotic bet of all? Without doubt, it is the nation's only multi-race and intra-race bet, the twin trifecta or double triple. A bettor must hit two trifectas, getting one shot at the second one for each winning ticket he holds on the first. As a private game for high rollers, it holds some perverse fascination. But for the average fan, it is the worst investment in racing. To have even a remote chance of winning, one must buy dozens of tickets on each of the dozens of combinations in the first trifecta, well beyond the means of all but the richest bettors. With two 14 horse fields, there are 4,769,856 possible combinations.

Most fans who play the double triple approach it as a regular trifecta and end up holding just one winning ticket when they win the first half. That gives them one cold chance in a 14 horse field. The chances are better at winning a minor prize in the state lottery, and the takeout is not much different.

The best of the exotics allow a smart bettor to improve his odds while preserving the essential challenge of a bettable and beatable game, one that can be conquered with hard work, intelligence, and insight. The worst of them only turn the sport into a mechanism for generating numbers that pay off at poor odds. As racing embraces a future based on exotic betting, the difference should not be ignored.

In our initial matchup we see TWO EARLY HORSES: RUNNING and JOSIE. If either were a LONE Early it would weight appropriately heavy in our analysis because LONE EARLY horses in a SPRINT at ANY TRACK win at a higher rate than their projected times might indicate.

When we have TWO Early designates we must determine WHICH one will actually take the lead, subsequently forcing the other to fold. A quick linear-visual appraisal would indicate that JOSIE is the most likely candidate for "Lone-Early."

Let's see. We'll look at RUNNING'S Other efforts—especially that other BELMONT RACE in July of 1988:

While JOSIE is a confirmed EARLY, RUNNING shows two races where it ran sustained and S/P Presser. A look at this readout from your ENGEN should convince you that the only way RUNN can beat JOSIE is by running back to its RUN-3 race at MED where it ran as a S/P Presser with a 96 speed rating. AS highly deviant race. If you use that race you lose this one. Your ENGEN is telling you NOT to use that race or the JULY RACE at Belmont (RUN-JB) Neither should we consider the RUN-J race because of the disparate 3rd Fraction. This leaves us TWO Pace Line choices for RUNN: It's LAST race or the race 4 back. NOTE the similarity of %MED for those two races: 69.34 and 69.23% respectively. Within .11. JOSIE'S % MED. is 69.42% so the horses DO match-up.

TOTAL ENERGY

I know your next observation. "JOSIE'S RAW figures do not match up with RUNN'S. To help you overcome this bugaboo your ENGEN displays TOTAL ENERGY. In all cases it is LOWER than RUNN'S. That is because it has been running at SUFFOLK and ROCKINGHAM which are SLOWER tracks. The BELMONT RESULTS CHART shows that at TODAY'S track JOSIE runs with a TOTAL ENERGY of 56.33.

NOTE the Average TOTAL ENERGY figure when pitting JOSIE against RUNN:

This tells us that JOSIE earned an adjustment of the difference between its 54.92 and 56.12, which is: 1.20. 54.92 + 1.20 would give JOSIE a TOTAL ENERGY of 56.12 and make it competitive with RUNN, except for the RUN-3 race-its very BEST and MOST disparate race.

Both Synergism II and ENERGY make this adjustment AUTOMATICALLY. Synergism II produces the following result when matching RUNN against JOSIE.

DAILY VARIATIONS

Your ENGEN does NOT make adjustments for you because its primary purpose is in keeping a track WIN (and/or PLACE profile.) In keeping a profile from results charts we know that all horses ran in the same race on the same day at the same variant, so RAW figures are a requisite.

Your ENGEN supplies you with a TOTAL ENERGY figure so that you can make instant and highly accurate adjustments with little effort.

You can make these adjustments on the basis of DAILY variations by merely equating the difference from day to day.

EXAMPLE: TOTAL ENERGY: OUR OPEN ADJ. VARIANT

TRACK VARIATIONS

The JOSIE, RUNN race exemplified the procedure for making Track to Track Variant. We have used this procedure since 1976, so it is not new. But it has certainly taken a long time for clients to recognize. And I'm not sure ALL of you will recognize it even now.

For you who are using Phase 3, I suggest - in Southern California - Tom Brohamer's Variant service. Elsewhere, Huey Mahl's LV. We have long since given up the thought that clients will go to the extensive effort of making their own.

I must stress that such services are for PHASE III users only. Anyone using Synergism II or Energy who does NOT use the Auto Variant applications of these programs bought them in vain.

You are probably saying to yourself, 'why go to all this trouble, I could get this \$8.80 2nd favorite with ease just using Synergism II or Energy.' True. But this procedure will also get the HIGH priced winners you may tend to leave OUT of consideration.

It will also get you onto MY CARAVAN, the \$5.20 Place horse who triggered a \$47 TWO DOLLAR EXACTA.

Look:

Let's go back to our ORIGINAL ENGEN READOUT:

We have already established that RUNN cannot survive on the lead with JOSIE. The result charts demonstrate this. Josie took a short lead with RUNN in pursuit, and finally giving up at the Stretch Call. This is what our ENGEN predicted would happen. So we have established JOSIE as the most viable EARLY horse, and most likely WINNER.

Now, who will place?

From all of our research - and YOURS - we know that the designated PLACE horse has two outstanding characteristics.

(1) Counter Energy. i.e. If the Winner is Early the Place horse is Sustained or OTHER than Early.

(2) High APV and/or CLASS.

From the ENGEN Running Style (ESP) readouts above we can predict that the most likely PLACE horse will be BE MY or MY C. Tarnish is more likely to SHOW. This kind of Class drop frequently shows; almost to the degree of being a designated SHOW horse. So vying for PLACE will be MY C and the favorite, BE MY. Of the two PLACE Potentials, which is the COUNTER ENERGY HORSE

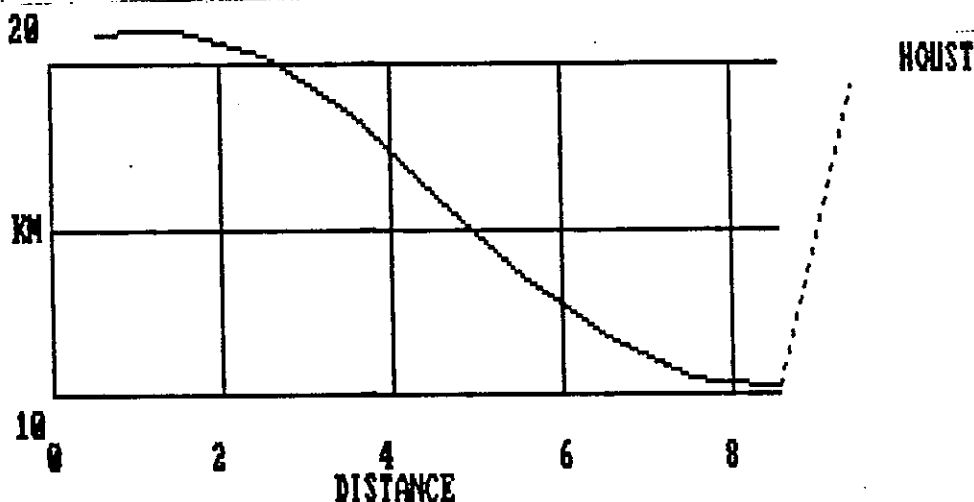

Since we introduced the Velocity ENGEN we've had a rash of questions that puzzle me. In essence, they all ask: Why don't the ENGEN numbers match the SYNERGISM numbers?

In asking that questions the inquirers are telling me that they STILL don't understand the basic concept of the Methodology. They are looking at only the numbers, with little thought as to their origin or meaning. Handicapping from such a mental state is almost a sure guarantee of losing.

Think about it. They're NOT SUPPOSED to match! If they did something would be disastrously wrong with one program or the other. One of the primary uses of the ENGEN is making a track profile from the RESULTS CHARTS. These profile numbers are essentially RAW. They do, however, represent the actual variant present in the race as run, since all the contestants came from the same race, same track, same moment in time. When that SAME race is entered into SYNERGISM, the AUTO ADJUST alters them to reflect the program's triangulated variant. So, OF COURSE they are not the same. The reason you subscribed to Synergism in the first place was to have it do just THAT: adjust the numbers to reflect a variant! Hence my utter amazement that so many people would cry out in despair because the numbers don't match.

EXAMPLE: 9th Race. Santa Anita. October 5, 1989. ALL PACE LINES SELECTED BY TOM BROHAMER - (So don't argue, or he won't mention you in his book.)

Note that the program is practically begging you to make your WIN investment on a SP/Presser! AND, your in-the-money wagers on an Early/Presser. WHY? Because the readouts demonstrate that the two EARLY horses cannot go ALL THE WAY! These are the readings for the first FOUR finishers-Results Charts.

Uniform Beaten Length values are NOT optimal to anyone wishing to advance beyond yesterday. The difference in the numbers will have no effect on anyone who is advanced in the Methodology. It had monumental effect on those wishing to linger in the dark ages. So, for them we changed the ENGEN and THEIR NUMBERS WILL MATCH THE PHASE III Readouts almost exactly. (within .04.)

* In the readouts seen we used MIDL'S Feb. 8th race. This was an errant prescription from Tom Brohamer, who corrected the pace line to Jan. 11. The Jan. 11 line is used in the ENGEN. The end result was quite similar ON THE HANDICAPPING READOUT EVALUATION.

The AUTO-ADJUST in SYNERGISM obviously alters the numbers markedly. This is to be expected. Why anyone wants them the same as raw is beyond me. Note that SYNERGISM points to the WINNER. It also points toward I'LL BE. If one scratches MIDL from WIN consideration ONLY because of its deviant 67.62 Med., then both the WIN and Place Horse become obvious choices when used in concert with the ENGEN.

In FOLLOW UP #17 we gave you instructions for using the ENGEN to make a track profile. In this issue we explain its use in sorting out lines from a variety of distances and surfaces. In the NEXT issue we'll demonstrate how to use it as a tool to select contenders BEFORE entering them into your handicapping program. And, YES, we DO KNOW that there is no TOTAL ENERGY Readout for Phase III or Synergism. My response is "so what," There isn't SUPPOSED TO BE! Use each tool as designed and above all, stop trying to match numbers that were never intended to be matched! Since about 20% of our clients are now ENERGY! users, for your benefit here are the ENERGY! readouts for this race.



Book Review

A Day At The Races by Barry Gifford. The title of this book caught Howard's eye as he thumbed through a catalog of remaindered books. Just that week he and I had finished a new manual with the same name. Until then, we had no idea the book existed. Howard ordered a few copies, and gave me one as a present to celebrate our new manual.

The book's title is a bit misleading. It isn't about just one day at the track, but rather about racing and racetracks in general. It consists of a series of interviews with all manner of folks connected with racing in every imaginable capacity. He talks with grooms, trainers, racing secretaries, stewards, jockeys, hot walkers and a host of others. Including a professional handicapper.

As I started in on the book, I found it interesting, and well written. Nice stuff, I thought. The talks with the groundskeeper at Golden Gate were particularly interesting. A quick, fun read. Then I got to the interview of one Buddy Eldorado, professional equine investor.

Buddy Eldorado (can this be a real name???) has been a professional investor at racetracks for more than 20 years. And no, he does not use the Methodology, or as far as I can tell, anything remotely like it. He bets almost every race, playing one horse to win, and manages to hit about 55% of his bets.

Before you get excited and want to send away for the Eldorado Methodology, the Cadillac of systems, know that he does not go into any detail on how he selects horses, and says he would not reveal the method he uses even if offered lots of money. An attitude much more typical of winning players than Doc's.

What I loved about the 20 page interview was the essence of professionalism that fills each page. Buddy speaks as if he were a high school dropout (might have a Ph.D. for all I know. He gives little personal history), yet he has solved the puzzle of racing. If I could bottle his mind set and give you each a sip, we'd all be winners. This is how it's done.

You have to have the mental fortitude, the discipline, because that's what this business demands: discipline. When you go to the racetrack you don't go with friends or relatives; you don't drink; you don't smoke; you don't eat. When you arrive, you've already made your selections; the only time you'll have a change in selection is if a horse is scratched, removed from the race for some reason at a late moment. If it's scratched in the gate, you get your money back and go on to the next race. That's the way you have to approach this business. I don't know of any other way to do it. Now I'm sure there are people who are very successful who would look at what I do and say, "Oh, hell, that's too much work." But I don't know any other way to do it.

An eloquent statement of the work ethic of the true professional. As page after page unfolded, I found myself saying over and over "Yes, this is right, this is absolutely right on." Proof positive that there are a great many ways of figuring out which horse will win a race, but only one winning attitude. What amazed me was how close he was to so much of what Howard has preached for years. Even his money management makes sense: I win a bit over half the races, so if I'm getting even money or better, I have an overlay. Howard was particularly enamored with the following passage:

There are as many ways to handicap horses as there are horses multiplied by the number of handicappers. I have never, even though I have the money, walked out to the track on opening day and started with a \$500-a-race bet. No way. Each year that I've been doing this I take a small amount of money and build it up. To me, there's a hell of a lot more gratification in taking a small amount of capital and watching that sucker build up than there is to walk out there with \$12,000 or \$15,000 to start with. That's easy; virtually anybody can do that. What I like to see are the books and programs by fellows such as Andrew Beyer and William Quirin, the experts. And don't get me wrong, these guys *are* experts. These people serve a purpose. Whether they're teaching the correct thing, I can't say. But for my purposes, speaking purely for myself, what they teach me is very important. And that is, whatever they say, do the exact opposite. That's a very valuable piece of information as far as I'm concerned. You need that. You cannot develop a pattern of success unless you know who the losers are. Once you know who the losers are, once you discern properly the pattern they are using, if you do everything but what they do you will probably be successful. This is basically what I've done in handicapping.

Almost sounds like the Doc wrote it himself, except for the vocabulary. And yet, this guy, as far as we know, has had absolutely no exposure to the Methodology, nor had we ever heard of him. A perfect demonstration of the process of parallel evolution, leading to an almost identical winning attitude.

I hope this book is still in print, and that you can get a copy of it. The rest of the book is fun to read, and gives you a lot of insight into those who dedicate their lives to horses, but the Buddy Eldorado interview is priceless. We can all learn from him. If you won't listen to Howard, to me, to the other PIRCO Charter and Teaching members, maybe you'll listen to good ol' Buddy Eldorado. Professional Handicapper extraordinaire.

Lately, I've realized the meaning of the saying, "desperation leads to inspiration." This was definitely ~~_____~~ situation. After having worked for a Fortune 500 Company for seven years, at a job that he believed he would retire doing, he was suddenly and permanently physically disabled while on the job. This was catastrophic for ~~_____~~. There was a profound sense of loss; it was almost as if someone in our family had died, and a period of mourning ensued.

After waiting many months, the employer's insurance company decided to retrain ~~_____~~. He spent ten months in a rehab. program in which he did exceptionally well. The only problem was that once he finished the program, he found that there was absolutely no job marketability in the field. My husband was faced with another major disappointment.

What was also disheartening is that he found he couldn't pick up just any job. When he filled out employment forms he had to claim the disability. He also found that many employers were leery of hiring someone with a Masters Degree in Business to flip hamburgers, check people into hotels or sell tickets at movie theaters. The combination of his disability and education had made him unemployable. Job counselors were sympathetic and encouraging, but no one could help ~~_____~~ find a job. At 35, he felt as if everyone had turned their back on him and he had been written off by the world. I wanted to help but was at a total loss.

But then, Sartin came along! And it was quite by accident!

Rather than to sit home and watch television, ~~_____~~ found himself frequenting the track and satellites. It was an activity that both of us had always loved to do. Sometimes we even won. But both of us really hated to lose. Although we were conservative in our attempts, neither of us had ever bought the theory that you had to lose. We believed that you could win, but that neither of us had enough skill to win consistently.

A friend had previously recommended your material to us. When ~~_____~~ saw the ad in the Racing Form, he decided to order the beginning material.


I saw the change in his attitude almost immediately. In the evenings, I found him asking me if we could take a walk to the Greyhound bus station to pick up the forms for the vendor at the feedstore. (Yes, we actually do get our forms at the feedstore). In the mornings, I found him pushing me out the door to go to work so that he could get started picking his ~~_____~~ lines. I would come home from work and he would still be sitting at his computer, spewing out something about Factor W and Sustained Pace. He was working ten to fourteen hours a day. He had begun working at this new job as diligently as he had the last. Even on dark days, I found him pouring over the Phase 3 Manual.

He says he is ready for more, and has signed up for a second class with you at the end of the month. Everyday he checks the mail for news about the availability of some new program called Synergism.

I am writing this letter to you, because I know that there must be times when you are discouraged with the caliber and commitment of some of your students. I am sure, however, that ~~_____~~ will eventually become one of your better students, although you might never know. He is pensive and reserved. I am also sure he will sit quietly in your class, and not give you the slightest clue as to whether or not he is even absorbing the material.

It is important to me that you be thanked for sharing your research. While it is true that ~~_____~~ has learned a skill that he will use to support himself, the more important element is the regaining of self-respect and the knowledge that I will respect him for his ability to overcome a tremendous setback, his dedication to his new career, and his sense of competence and mastery.

This letter came to us last month. When Jay first read it, she said: "Now that's what the Methodology is really all about."

In the beginning, that's the way it was intended; as something to offer help to the elderly on Social Security, the disabled, those who had been rejected by the job market and other conventional sources of income. It was never designed to enhance the fortunes of handicappers with vigor and innate skills derived from accepted procedures. I was not seeking to make converts, but rather to provide a tangible source of hope for those with little hope.

While the Methodology has since gained a lot of publicity and a lot of converts, or at least lip service converts, from the world of orthodoxy, my aspirations remain the same: to provide help to those in need of something to allow them to help themselves rise above the limitations that an orthodox society has inflicted upon them.

The Psychology of Winning

by Howard G. Sartin, Ph.D.

In 1986, I spent a little over a year on the road with Dick Mitchell in a series of lectures that he dubbed: Mitchell/Sartin Success Seminars. The main theme of Dick's presentation was a discourse on the three R's of handicapping success. They were: Reality, Responsibility and Regression. We both hammered home this theme to several hundred non-clients, who in turn applauded politely, then went on to pursue their handicapping exactly as they had before, ignoring the message.

By Reality, we meant, learn the facts about horse racing. Confirm what is true and what is myth. Ascertain the real facts about trainer manipulations, the role of the jockey, the actual importance of post position, inside-outside bias, the value of final time and daily variants based solely on daily track "speed." Dick stressed the reality of verifying one's opinions and precepts with the facts as expressed by the results charts. Of confirming fixed notions by what was actually happening. Avoiding the old "my horse would have won if it hadn't been stiffed" routine. Eliminating the "if onlys," "woulda, coulda, shoulda" and accepting only what actually happened. "Horseplayers" will **NOT** do this. They are confirmed rationalizers who insist upon being right even in the face of facts that proclaim otherwise.

By Responsibility, we meant that you and you alone are responsible for your handicapping and wagering decisions. Too often handicappers blame their computer programs or some other outside force for their losses. They misinterpret, or fail to read, their instructional material, or they try to use one aspect of their method while rejecting other parts; saying "Oh, I don't use that." They attribute their failure to a procedure they're only half using. In truth, they wish to cling to their established belief patterns, with which they have always lost, and accept only the part of the Methodology that fits those old frames.

By definition, a handicapper is someone who says "I can predict the future." I am a prophet. Having asserted such a bold position, one cannot blame the stars for failure, only yourself. You have proclaimed yourself a prophet, now take the responsibility necessary to becoming one. That entails full understanding of the concept of your procedure or method. Just picking a pace line at random and entering it into a computer, waiting for the readouts and betting the horses with the most 1's and 2's is NOT in keeping with the concept of your Methodology.

Those clients who understand the concept and take all the steps prescribed are winners. Those who take short-cuts are not. Most of the losers blame the Methodology or some other outside force for their

low proficiency. Others blame that old standby: "I'm not as smart as you," or "Back in school, I was always dumb at math." nonsense. Recent studies of intelligence by some very prominent authors in the fields of intelligence and learning show that the majority of successful handicappers scored low or barely average on standard IQ tests.

In this Methodology, NO MATH is involved. It is all done for you by the computer. Least you forget, I failed to qualify for grad school initially because of my deficiencies in math. (Editor's Note: Something that anyone who has ever seen Howard in action at the blackboard will attest to.) Had I known that this dull subject could make me a fortune, I would have done a lot better, I assure you. I made it up by taking a course in statistics and the logical method, which ultimately led to my involvement in horse racing.

Statistics is the basis for the third R, Regression. Record Keeping. Fred Davis and Bill Quirin used regression techniques as the basis of their books: *Percentages and Probabilities* by Davis and *Winning at the Races* by Quirin. They wrote of an age-old mathematical procedure known as Impact Value (IV), which they used to determine the true weight of any given factor or set of factors.

Advertising agencies do the same thing when buying print space or broadcast time. They may determine, for example, that while a radio message on a top rated rock station may cost X dollars per thousand listeners, only 5% respond with purchases. On the other hand, a Country-Western station with fewer listeners, charging less, produces a much higher rate of purchases. The reason is that the Country-Western fan is more loyal to the station and demonstrates that loyalty by purchasing the advertised product. Hence, while the rock and roll station has a much larger audience, the C & W station has a higher impact value. The only way the ad agency can know this is by keeping point of sale records and determining the source of customer response.

That is a regression. We must do the same thing. We must determine what factors in our own handicapping have the greatest impact value. We learn this by keeping meticulous records on our wins and losses; by going over each loss and determining what we could have done to turn it into a win. Then, having so learned, we must retain the information and apply it in the future. If, for instance, our regression proves that we do not do well in races carded for three year old fillies, we should stop wagering on such events until, through practice on paper, we up our proficiency.

This applies to any category of racing. Every one of you should be able, if asked, to state your win proficiency and return on investment over your last 20 races. If you're unable to do this, you should not even *THINK* of asking for help from Dial-A-Hat or any other PIRCO Charter member. It is inexcusable not to know! What if you're winning races, but are under the impression that you're a loser because you blow your profits on exactas, triples or other exotic bets. You must do a regression on your exotic proficiency before you start betting in that arena.

So, I'm going to make a rule: NEVER call me or any other PIRCO helper unless you have your win proficiency and ROI at the tip of your tongue.

Now, here's a holiday lesson for all of you who do not try figuring out the intricacies of the method for yourself. This lesson comes to us from Australia. As of this writing, there are NO fractional times with corresponding beaten lengths published Down Under. Yet, we have four clients, all *Follow Up* subscribers, in Australia who are eating the mutuels alive, who are paying all their living expenses and for all their luxuries through use of this same Methodology that baffles some of you despite all the comforts of our Racing Form information.

How do they do it? They used their ingenuity. They did not whine and ask "what can we do without a Racing Form." NO, they began hand timing races, either at the track or from video replays. While their fractional times may be less than completely accurate, they are relative. Most of their races are routes on the grass. They read our manuals citing the importance of Sustained Pace in such events and they use optimally what they do have without whining about what they do not have. As a result, they report they have an enormous edge over everyone else. They may well be the only people in the entire country using any type of pace concepts. Everyone else is either using class, breeding or some form of final time speed numbers.

The end result is, through their own application of the three R's, this method is producing for them a parimutuel edge that is phenomenal because they are the only ones doing it. Compare their ingenuity with an American client who recently told me he cannot win because the flag is up at differing distances from the gate at different tracks. Uggg! Rationalization at its worst. Blaming an outside factor that is of minute value.

Let our Aussie clients be an inspiration to you. Apply Mitchell's three R's yourself. And above all, remember that the fourth R, Rationalization, is your worst enemy. Perceive true Reality. Take Responsibility for yourself, and dammit, use Regression. KEEP RECORDS!!! Know thyself. Your strengths and weaknesses. And resolve, another good R, to be a consistent winner in 1990.

3 Weeks at Del Mar

with Jim Drukas

Jim Drukas, from the San Diego area, feels that Andrew Beyer's Washington Post syndicated column branding me a theorist and associating me with an Ivory Tower, was ill-timed. It was published within a week of this item in the San Diego Union.

Join the crowd — If you're not making money at Del Mar this summer, cheer up, you're in good company.

Andrew Beyer, turf columnist for *The Washington Post* and the man who wrote the book(s) on handicapping, got his first taste of Del Mar during the first three weeks of the meeting, then returned to the East yesterday.

From a handicapping standpoint, Beyer said he was "totally baffled" by the track.

"Whereas at Hollywood Park everything made sense to me, because it was almost like an Eastern track, here, my head was spinning," Beyer said. "Everyone had warned me about a track bias, but I didn't detect any until the last day or two."

Beyer, who deviated from his usual routine of taking in the summer season at Saratoga to sample West Coast racing this year, found Del Mar to be aesthetically a treat.

Ironically enough, as the "World's Greatest Horseplayer" fled the environs of Del Mar because he was "totally baffled" by the track, DRUKAS, an ENERGY CLIENT was having a typical 3 week win cycle. 68% winners over 60 races with an average mutuel of \$12.26. That's an R.O.I. of 2.44. He made 244% profit per 20 race cycle.

Beyer, who is alleged to have introduced the concept of "Bias" to the American "Horseplayer," says he did NOT detect any until the last day or two.

Drukas' ENERGY PROGRAM detected the so called "Bias" accurately 41 times in 60 races. That's 68% of the time. Chalk the 32% losers up to theory. 68% wins at a high average mutuel is supposedly impossible. Ask any expert.

And yet, this cycle was comparatively average for Drukas and a number of other Energy clients investing at Del Mar.

Note the extremely low percentage of Winning Favorites at Del Mar through August 25, the day after my own sizzling day there.

Only 23% of the favorites were winning, as compared to a scant 29% last year. This meat for our grinder. This is ENERGY'S strongest point: higher priced mutuels when they are available. At tracks like Canterbury Downs, where 38% of the favorites win at an Average Mutuel of \$8.00, a comparable win percentage R.O.I. would be only 136%.

It is interesting to note that the Union Column about Beyer is headed JOIN THE CROWD. It seems Andy was not alone in his negative experience. So were the newspaper's experts. Just review their picks at Del Mar. Andrew Beyer was very kind to me and the Pirco group in a series of syndicated articles about two years ago. I've always held him in great esteem. The point of this piece is not to ridicule Beyer, who after all, utilizes his handicapping skills to make a lot more money from horse racing than most of our clients, but to point out to those who are letting mainstream thinking influence that you should reexamine your ideas.

But let's look on the bright side. So long as I'm discounted by the most verbal of mainstream experts our, Cult Theories will be applied by cultists only, savoring average mutuels of \$12 plus. If being described as a cult disturbs you, remember, he said it. Besides, there is NO Racetrack near Jonestown.

Incidentally, since I DO live atop a hill with steep precipices on three sides, I'm considering naming my abode the IVORY TOWER. Problem is, we have no ivory.

I know a lot of you are in diversified businesses and professions. Could one of you get me a supply of Ivory wholesale. I need about 20,000 square feet.

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Reading ENERGY! Printouts

by Dick Schmidt

In the fall of 1986, at the Las Vegas seminar, Jim Bradshaw handed Michael Pizzolla and me a tape of the new program he and Howard had just finished the day before. They called it ENERGY!. Later that night, I loaded it into my trusty Sharp 1350 and sat down to try it out. I put in a race we had played that afternoon, and waited until it churned through the program, thus becoming the first to ever use the ENERGY! program. (Howard and Jim don't count; they wrote the program!)

"Well, did it win the race?" Michael asked. After studying the readouts, I could only answer: "I don't know." A while later, Michael tried out the program on another race, and he couldn't make sense of it either. We gave up on it for the time being, and concentrated on a new concept Michael had been working on. We finally developed what we jokingly called Mikie-Scan, a program that would predict how the race would run. This idea was later to form the basis of the Variegate in the ENERGY! program.

Later that weekend, Jim and Howard showed us how to read the numbers ENERGY! was generating, and we found to our excitement that when we ran Class/APV to get the top contenders (in one computer), then used Mikie-Scan to predict how the race would run (in a second computer), and finally ran the ENERGY! program (in a third computer!) and bet ENERGY! as Mikie-Scan had predicted, we won almost everything. It took forever to run a race, and the people at Sam's Town thought we were nuts as we frantically entered races three times (or more when ENERGY! crashed and Jim had to make corrections on the fly). In fact, developing this process was what Michael was doing when he spent his by now infamous night in a bathtub in Laughlin.

Since that awkward beginning, I have used ENERGY! exclusively. Within weeks, Jim had developed (and named) the much more elegant Variegate, and also smoothed out some of the early bugs that caused the original program to crash so often. This whole frantic week was brought back to me by a client who was asking questions about one of the races in the last *Follow Up*. He couldn't figure out which horse ENERGY! was trying to tell him to bet.

It took me back to that first race I ever ran, when I couldn't figure out if I won or lost. All those numbers in the 30's; all those strange terms. Since then, ENERGY! has gotten even stranger. It also works a hell of a lot better. Anyway, I thought I'd write a short article telling those of you not using the program how to at least read the printouts. I'll use the contenders from the seventh race at Saratoga, August 21, 1989, (Which race I use isn't really important, but if you want to see it, check out *Follow Up* # 17, the Problem Race or the *A Day At The Races* manual) and enter the pacelines underlined for each horse.

The printout I'm using is from an MS-DOS computer (IBM clone). The other computers give the same information, but it may look a bit different. I've drawn a grid on the printout, and numbered the various sections. We'll move through them one at a time.

Section 1 - Labeled: RAW. Most of you should recognize the first two numbers. Total is Total Energy, which is nothing more than the feet-per-second of the three fractions of the race added together. It is used, among other things, to calculate Percent Median, which is the second column. Most of you know what Factor X is, first and third fractions (in this case it is not divided by two).

The reason that Factor X is in the 60's is that ENERGY! gives you the percentage of Total Energy that each fraction represents. Thus the first horse, FURIC expends 65.73% of his Total Energy in the first and last fractions, leaving 34.27% for the middle (second) fraction.

As is obvious by the label, all of these numbers are raw, and not adjusted in any way. However, ENERGY! uses different values for beaten lengths at the various calls, and Total Energy and % Median may be different from what a Phase III or Synergism program gives you. ENERGY! users have a separate EnGen program to use in keeping their track profiles. When comparing the race to the track profile, you use these RAW % Median numbers.

Section 2 - At the top it is labeled with whatever type of adjustment was used. In this race, I used the ENERGY! program's built in automatic adjustment. ENERGY! has now adjusted Total Energy, and used those adjusted figures to compute an adjusted % Median. Lex is Late Energy, which represents the percentage of Energy used in the final fraction. The two always add to 100% (or very close, allowing for round-off errors). A horse that shows a large change between Raw and Adjusted, either up or down, is one that needs a very close look.

Section 3 - Labeled: Matchup. The same as the Match-Up block in Synergism or most of our other programs. The top line, labeled Pace, is the "Dream Race," consisting of the best number in each fraction from all the contenders. The obvious difference is that these numbers are in the 30's, and represent percentages.

One question I had when I was starting out with the program was that a slow horse can still have good Energy distribution. He may run 24 second first fractions, but still only use 34% of his Total Energy doing so. Jim Bradshaw assures me that this is taken into account, and that "old fashioned" velocity, or just plain speed, is used in some mysterious way in calculating these numbers. After a while, you get used to using them just as you currently use the Match-Up feet-per-second rankings given by Synergism II or Phase III.

In this case, PITIN has a significant first fraction advantage, while ICY has a big third fraction bulge. FURIC has the most "even" pace numbers, without owning any of the best numbers in any fraction. If you are just starting out in ENERGY!, it might help to think of these as velocity numbers, as you use them in very much the same way.

Section 4 - Labeled: Varius. Let me define some mysterious terms:

Emuv - Early Match-Up Variegate. This is an estimation of the Early Energy deficiencies of each contender. The numbers refer to Energy Units, and you just have to get used to them. They do NOT translate neatly into beaten lengths.

Smuv - Sustained Match-Up Variegate. An estimation of the Sustained, or Late, Energy deficiencies of each contender.

uXr - Units of Energy Recovered. The Emuv and Smuv ratings added together. This is one of the most significant numbers in the ENERGY! program. Howard has said that he would be content to handicap using this number alone. It represents an approximation of the Energy deficiencies of each contender. In this example, PITIN and FURIC have decided advantages, and if one of them does not win, it can indicate a very biased track. (ENERGY! has no choice but to assume that the track is unbiased and that the "bias" that exists in each race is caused by the Match-Up of the horses involved, not the track.)

Section 5 - We'll skip Paragon A and B for the moment, and look at the Energizer and the Variegate. The Energizer is the horse that the program feels the race revolves around. Usually this is one of the Early horses, but not always the #1 Early Pace horse. To put it another way, it is the horse that would most change the way the race would be run should it be scratched. At times, and at certain tracks, the Energizer horses place and show with amazing frequency.

The Variegate. Ah, here comes the magic. Variegate means how a race is colored or shaded. It is an artist's term, and is exactly right for its use here. Jim Bradshaw has many unplumbed depths. It is no less than the ENERGY! program's attempt to predict how the race will be run. In this case, it is telling you that one of the top two Early Pace horses should win the race.

As I mentioned earlier, the Variegate had its crude beginnings in Michael Pizzolla's fevered imagination. At first, I laughed at the whole idea, and said I would stick with my Model, thank you very much. However, I have since come to change my tune.

First, Michael proved to me that the concept was valid, and then Jim and Howard improved on our first crude beginnings to the point that it is now very unusual for me to go against the Variegate. I have learned to trust it implicitly, and rely on this more than any other factor when making my betting decisions. It has also taught

me, and others using ENERGY!, that tracks aren't as biased as we once thought.

Other users may rely more on other parts of the program, such as uXr, but I spent a year working on the Variegate concept, and now trust it totally. I look dumb once in a while, say when I bet a long grass race to run Early, but I've cashed too many tickets doing this kind of "stupidity" to change now. ENERGY! users use the Variegate in the same way that Synergism II and Phase III users use their Brohamer Models. As with the Model, it is an attempt to predict the future. Always a perilous enterprise, much given to making its practitioners look foolish. All I can tell you is that ENERGY! has achieved a remarkable success rate.

Section 6 - Labeled: Rankings. You all gotta know rankings. Most of us live and die by the rankings. The headings are: EP - Early Pace, PR - Presser, HE - Hidden Energy (second and third fractions), SP - Sustained Pace, LX - Late Energy, FX - Factor X. Most of these should be familiar to all of you, with Presser being a rough analog of Factor W.

Muv is a bit more of the magic. This is the number that is used to determine the Variegate. I used to know what Muv stood for, but I've forgotten. I do know that it is a numeric representation of running style, and I have no idea how Jim calculates it. Besides being crucial to calculating the Variegate, it can be used in much the same way as Synergism's estimation of beaten lengths at the second call. Many times the user will find that no horse is capable of winning with a Muv larger than "X". This is one area in ENERGY! where keeping a Model is still valid.

Sections 7 and 8 - Labeled: Paragon A and Paragon B. These are the horses that ENERGY! feels best "fit" in this race. Paragon A is more used when the Variegate is Early or Early/Presser. Paragon B for Presser, Sustained/Presser and Sustained. These rankings are used much like the Doctor Factor in Synergism II; to break ties and weight a close decision. Being #1 in both Paragons, as Furic is, is a very positive sign.

OK, that's as much of the ENERGY! program as we normally print in any of our manuals or *The Follow Up*. As a matter of fact, this is where Jim Bradshaw, who wrote all this wonderful program, planned for the program to end. He forgot who he was working for.

He sent Howard an experimental version of ENERGY! that incorporated a first step towards Deceleration. Howard liked it so much, he began to hand it out to clients using ENERGY! right and left. Next thing you knew, everyone wanted it and before Jim knew what was happening, this first look at deceleration was part of ENERGY!

We don't usually print it because it is still very experimental, and also because it takes up a lot of room and is hard to read. Anyway, though we're not going to print very often, I'll go through it with you quickly.

Section 9 - Labeled Early Exdc. This is a very poorly printed bar graph. Best my daisy wheel printer can do. What it is telling you is that TOWN has the best (least steep) deceleration curve in the Early part of the race. PITIN is second and FURIC third. Experience has taught me that I want to see my betting choices mentioned here if the Variegate is Early or Early/Presser.

Section 10 - Labeled Late Exdc. A crude graphic representation of deceleration in the late stages of the race. I look at Late Exdc when I look at Paragon B. In a couple of years, when the Deceleration program becomes a reality (assuming Jim and Howard can top ENERGY!), this will look impossibly crude, but for now it is the best we have.

Section 11 - Labeled Paragon B Match Up Exdc. To tell you the honest truth, I have never been able to figure out what this block of numbers represents. The graph is of the "connect-the-dots" variety, and Howard and others swear it gives an accurate look at the race if you connect up (preferably using different colors) each horse's relative positions at the three calls. It baffles me. It also has a few bugs in it, such as the one that made it skip part of the fifth line in this example. I'll wait for Deceleration, when Jim gets it together. I don't think its fair to judge how well the concept works on a first trial program that Jim never intended to release in the first place.

Section 12 - Labeled Paragon A Match Up Exdc. More of the same, this time for those races "biased" Early. More bugs, as it is impossible in this example to tell which is horse 5 and which horse 6. For now, connect the dots if you think it will help, and know that the Gnomes of Tulsa are busily at work.

In fact, you might hold yourself as privileged to look at the first crude beginnings of a truly revolutionary handicapping concept. Someday, Deceleration will represent as big a step into the future as ENERGY! does today. Now you know the kind of programs that we PIRCO members start with early in the testing process. ENERGY! itself was once this crude, and today is the most powerful handicapping program ever devised.

Wait for it.

* * * * *

A final thought. By now, it should be obvious that though I may use ENERGY!, but I don't really understand how the program actually works. This bothers a great many people; they demand to know how each number is calculated, and the significance of each, before they will use a program. Obviously, this is not one of my hangups.

I've told many people my reaction when I finally took the time to read the code of the Ultra Scan program. I burst out laughing. It can't work. No way in the world. Violates every mathematical and common sense dictum you can think of. Sure does pick winners, though.

Since then, I've accepted my role as that of a *USER*, not a writer of programs. I've mastered using *ENERGY!* to my satisfaction. If you're the sort who feels he *MUST* know what's going on, who considers it a duty to "improve" every program, to understand each and every step the program takes, this isn't the program for you. Just accept that it works superbly. (Mr. Bradshaw will be glad to discuss the necessity for this philosophical acceptance of the unknown at length. Please take all necessary precautions to protect your hearing.)

I don't have any real need to know what's going on in the computer. It works. I win! Isn't that enough???

* * * * *

THE TRUE VALUE OF A BEATEN LENGTH

The value of a beaten length has been argued for generations. The debate stems from differences of opinion as to the actual length of the average horse: 9 feet? Ten feet? Eleven or twelve feet. When reducing the value of a length beaten or gained into a mathematical formula based on the laws of physics governing such a value, the rate of velocity by race segment has nothing to do with an animal's actual length. The physics value, translated to mathematical algorithms, dictates that a beaten length is worth ONE FOOT PER EACH SIX-TENTH of a mile. Hence the following table:

SIXTEENTH

Per quarter of a mile:	4 feet per length.
Per half mile:	8 feet per length.
Per 3/4 mile:	12 feet per length.
Per 5 16ths:	5 feet per length.(final frac. 6.5 & 8.5 Fur.
per 6 16ths mile:	6 feet per length.(final frac. 7.0 & 9.0 Fur.
Per 7 16ths mile:	7 feet per length.(final frac. 7.5 & 9.5 Fur.

All of our programs beyond Phase III use these values and produce subsequent higher win averages. None of our imitators have thus far been willing to accept true length values because they continue to be linear-visual thinkers. (thank goodness.)

Interpretation of Readouts

by Doc Sartin

It seems that at long last clients have learned to pick appropriate Pace Lines. After an extended period of bewilderment they have found that following our prescription of practice, practice, practice, and trial and error, you have finally GOT IT! The Pace Line Manual and accompanying audio tapes finally sunk in. If you still have trouble in this area, I suggest that YOU take the same measures others have to overcome the problem.

When you enter only the true contenders from appropriate pace lines, ANY of our programs will produce NO LESS than twelve winners per 20 race cycle. This has been true for almost fifteen years now for Phase III alone. For those using more advanced programs. The rate should be more like thirteen to fifteen winners per 20 race cycle.

But alas, one final barrier is standing in the way for many of you. Like Macbeth's dagger, You HAVE the winner before you, yet you see it not. Why? Because instead of interpreting your readouts, you go for the ONE'S and TWO'S only, allowing the winner to escape unbet.

This new *Follow Up* series in seven parts is dedicated to ending that error for all time. WINNING HORSES are isolated by PATTERNS, NOT ranking numbers.

On the next page you'll see a visual interpretation of the three Basic Racing Patterns. Digest them.

PATTERN A represents the kind of horse that starts out very fast and then shows marked deceleration. The faster a horse runs the first segment of a race the slower it finishes. This is a natural phenomenon based on the laws of KINETIC POTENTIAL AND DECLIVITY.

PATTERN B represents the opposite phenomenon; The horse that starts more slowly but, by the readouts (though not in fact) appears to accelerate to the end of the race. This horse shows a high rate of LATE Kinetic Potential and a low rate of Kinetic Declivity.

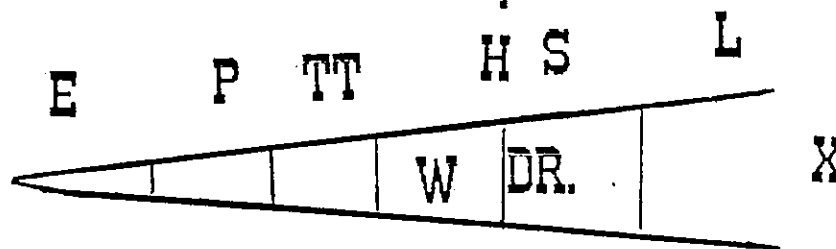
PATTERN C represents the PRESSER, whose Kinetic Potential and Kinetic Declivity are balanced relatively EVEN.

In the articles ahead we will show you how to look at each race as an triangle and to interpret readouts accordingly. Your VELOCITY ENGEN will assist you greatly in the task. For now, digest the three basic patterns and accept the fact that horse racing is not TWO dimensional (favoring horses with 1's & 2's in their readouts) but multi-dimensional, wherein a 3 or even a 4 might be more ideal depending on where it occurs.

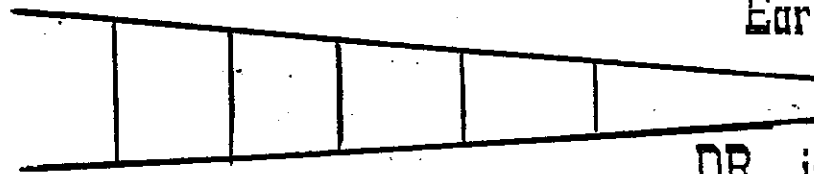

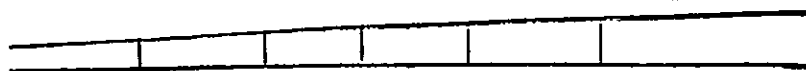

ANALYSIS OF A



PROBLEM

RACE

This column is designed to give you a bit of practice handicapping, usually while making a specific point about one or more aspects of the Methodology at the same time. The feedback I get is that most of you enjoy trying to work the problem race, and look forward to it. We plan to continue running them, and may feature more in future issues.

In this issue, the problem addressed is what do you do when you don't have a track profile and a model to help you. This is always a problem early in a meet, and my spys tell me that most of you handicap this way every day! How someone can entertain professional aspirations and not keep the most basic tools is beyond me, but I meet clients like that every day. They all plan to start "tomorrow," but somehow tomorrow never comes.

Anyway, enough lecture. For this race, I didn't have either a model or a profile. No one did. It was the first race of the first day of the Oak Tree meet at Santa Anita. Nice little mid-level claiming \$20,000 for 3 year old fillies. Since so many of you don't keep the records we tell you to, here is a race you can win without any other information other than what is in the Racing Form.

One additional point: I chose this race to also demonstrate the application of a "classical handicapping" maxim that we featured in a recent issue. I won't spoil your fun by giving any more hints, but I will warn you to be careful. There is a trap in this race just waiting for the unwary.

Those of you who follow the advice given in our article on picking contenders should have no trouble getting the winner in your top five. If you don't turn off your brain, the little trap in this race shouldn't bother you either. I'm hopeless at "classical handicapping," and I managed to identify the problem horse and avoid it. This race paid a ton, and this is definitely the way to start a meeting.

See you after you've gone through the race. As always, I caution you to complete the handicapping process all the way through. Write down your two win selections. This race did not offer any exotic wagers (except the start of the daily double), so getting the place horse isn't imperative. However, if you want to pretend you're in Las Vegas playing quinellas, be my guest.

Instead of starting in on the horses one by one, a mistake that most of us make all too often, let's start by looking at the race, not the horses. First, Class/APV shows us

As usual, there is a lot of overlap. For the moment, we'll keep all of the horses in both categories. Let's see if PBS or FFER (third fraction ratings) give us any guidance.

A bit better. We're starting to see the same names come up several times. Now, let's take a quick look at ESP and see if it can throw any light. A fast run down the ratings shows that we have 4 Early horses and 3 Early Pressers ready to do battle for the lead. We have only 2 true Pressers and no Sustained horses whatsoever. Not really an unusual mix for 3 year old fillies. Very few of them know how to rate at all. We'll pay especially close attention to the two Pressers, as the Match-Up of styles seems to favor them.

Now, let's start looking at the individual horses and see what's what. First off:

Nervous Wreck - Something went very wrong in the last race. Our bible, the yellow Phase III manual, tells us to accept maiden winners facing winners for the first time if their APV is close to 100% of today's purse. Nervous boasts only a 74, and coupled with that dreadful last race, I decided to toss her out.

Betsy's Theme - Good Class/APV, poor PBS in the last race. However, she has two legitimate excuses for the poor showing last out: she was bumped and she faced a really fast pace that she won't see today. Together they are enough for me to forgive the last and go one back, even for PBS. This makes her a definite contender. I used that second back as her pace line.

Frenchy's Chick - OK APV, poor Class, PBS and FFER numbers. Current form is bad. Out.

Peggy Hagen - I used this horse as the pacesetter when doing PBS numbers. Most of the time, I try to leave the pacesetter in as a contender to give a more honest look at the set up of the race. In this case, Peggy has the second best Class rating and is tied for 5th in PBS. This makes her easy to keep. I used the last line.

Pointedly - The "class of the field." This horse has been dropping like a rock down a well since she returned after a 6 month layoff. All her money was earned before she got hurt, and she has shown nothing since her return. I chose to eliminate her when it came time to chose pace lines.

Magic Kite - Poor Class/APV, failed against very slow route internal fractions last out. Out.

Startling - Good Class/APV, tied for second best PBS. I chose to not use the last line (though I did use it for PBS), as it is against a pace she won't face today. The second back seems good to me, so I used it.

Wink's Witch - Coming out of a tandem with Startling. Her very poor APV is a result of running at AC. The good Class rating says she ran well there. Again, I chose not to use the last line, as the pace is so fast. I went back one, noting that a easy wire to wire maiden win is not a very predictive pace line. I couldn't find a better one, however, so I used it.

Sail On Swaps - Good Class/APV, poor PBS. The PBS can be forgiven as it comes from Fairplex, a minor 5/8ths track, and is offset in my mind by the fact that this horse is one of our two Pressers. Since both of the last two races were plus races, I don't have any trouble going back to 8 Sept to use a Del Mar pace line.

Tropical Bouquet - OK Class/APV, ok PBS, ok FFER. This horse is just OK, but not outstanding. I'll let the computer deal with that and use the last line.

The Burn Card - APV is low, but has good Class, outstanding PBS and the best FFER rating in the race by 3 lengths. Also, she is our second Presser in the race. What more could we want? We'll use the last line.

Take a look at the ENERGY! printout on the next page. Not to hard to separate if you think about it. Burn Card stands out as #1 Sustained, with Sail On Swaps and Betsy's Theme tied for #2. Betsy's has much better numbers in the other rankings, so I break the tie in her favor and bet Burn Card and Betsy to win.

Easy race. Of course, if you do this, you lose, but it is easy, and you do come close. First off, let's take Doc's advice and eliminate any horse that doesn't have a #1 or #2 ranking anywhere in its rankings. That gets rid of Startling and Wink's Witch. Now let's take another look:

Still points to the same two horses the way I read the printouts. Our mistake isn't in printout interpretation, it's much more basic than that. Think back a couple of issues, back to issue 16, where Tom Brohamer warned us about horses that showed a "too good to be true" class drop. Now take another close look at your contenders.

Yeah, that's right. The Burn Card is dropping \$5,000 off a powerful winning performance. Why? That's the question you must ask yourself whenever you encounter this situation. Why is this trainer and owners selling a proven \$25,000 racehorse for \$20,000. Yeah, I can see they only paid \$16,000 for her, but she won at \$25.

Ask yourself, if you had just made a great claim and stole a \$25,000 horse for only \$16,000, would you then immediately turn around and offer it for sale for \$20,000? Or would you move it up to say, \$32,000 to protect your investment and your now much more valuable racehorse? I know what I'd do. Unless, that is, my trainer told me on the quiet that the horse was falling apart and was about to turn from a asset to a liability.

Then I might say: let's dump her while she's still worth something. Let's enter her for \$20 and hope someone takes her off our hands. Thus the warning signs are posted. Here is a horse that might as well have a big "For Sale" sign stuck to its side.

The Burn Card went off a solid favorite at 5/2 and took a lot of people's money with her when she ran 10th, beating only a horse that quit. The question is, had you been there, would she have taken some of your money along for a ride also? If so, go back and reread Tom's article in issue 16.

It can take a bit of courage to eliminate a favorite in a race that has all the top numbers from your program, but it pays off over even the short run. In this case it pays \$38, but even if Burn Card had one more race in her and won, we only lose a \$7.00 payoff. This kind of horse is consistently overbet, yet you see them several times each week at every track in the country.

Take a look at the second set of revised ENERGY! readouts and see how clearly they point to the winner and place horse. Now, I can't promise you a \$38.20 payday every time, but if you'll use your common sense in analyzing the motives of the owners and trainer of horses that seem to be "too good to be true," you'll be money ahead.

I was fortunate when I played this race, as I had just finished reading Tom's expanded chapter from his book a few days before, and the subject was clear in my mind as I handicapped. Here was an example of his warning that was almost classic. Thanks Tommie. I owe you a big wet, sloppy kiss, right on the lips.

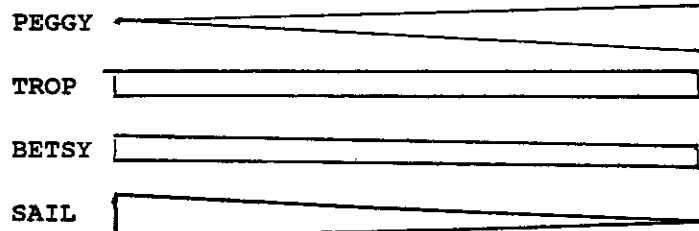

SAIL ON SWAPS, devoid of early speed, angled to the outside in the upper stretch, closed strongly while under left handed pressure to get the lead in deep stretch, lugged inward in the closing yards and proved best. BETSY'S THEME, a pace factor from the start, had a clear lead at the furlong marker, could not outfinish SAIL ON SWAPS but held on for the place. PEGGY HAGEN, also a pace factor from the start, did not have the needed late response. STARTLING, never far back and wide down the backstretch, came into the stretch four wide and lacked the needed response in the drive. POINTEDLY, outrun early, made a move to loom menacingly from along the inner rail a furlong out but then hung. FRENCHY'S CHICK, devoid of early speed, found her best stride too late. TROPICAL BOUQUET bobbed at the start and was wide down the backstretch. WINK'S WITCH, in contention early after an alert start, dropped out of contention after a half. THE BURN CARD, devoid of early speed and wide down the backstretch, failed to rally. NERVOUS WRECK had early speed and faltered badly.

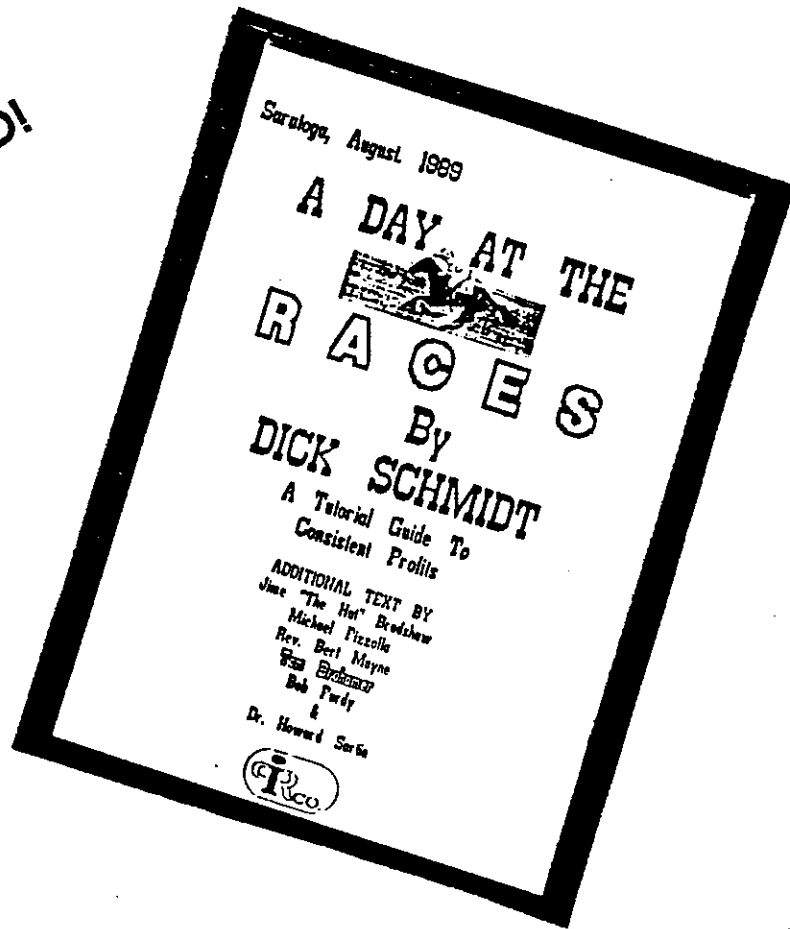
